# The Inspector-General of Police to The Kenorable the Chief Secretary.

Police Department, Inspector-General's Office, Sydney, 18 May, 1920.

Dear Sir,

In submitting the Annnal Report covering the operations of the New South Wales Police Force for the year ended 31st December, 1919, the outstanding feature to which attention might be drawn is the phenomenal increase in serious crime since the termination of the war. The experience of the State Increase in in this respect is similar to that of other parts of the world, and the position has been made more difficult serious crime. In New South Wales owing to the considerable shortage in the numerical strength of the Force. In shortage of addition to the vacancies created by men who enlisted, and of whom only a proportion ultimately resumed Police duty, there was, as might have been expected throughout the war period, little opportunity of filling ordinary vacancies and, at the termination of hostilities, the Department was faced with the prospect of meeting an increase in crime with a Force hundreds of men short of the authorised strength; nor at the end of the year had the position altered to any marked degree, notwithstanding the fact that the Government, in order to secure the right type of recruits, increased the rates of pay and lodging allowances. It was apparent throughout the year that other avenues of employment presented more inducement to the type of man needed for training in the Police Force. The large measure of success achieved by the Police in dealing with criminal occurrences is attributable to the zeal and attention to duty exercised by all ranks.

#### Criminal Statistics for the State generally.

Appendix A.

I would invite attention to the return contained in Appendix A. The figures shown therein embrace all cases which have been dealt with by the Police, either by apprehension or summons, and the following table will afford a comparison with the corresponding figures for the years 1916, 1917, and 1918:—

The figures for the year 1918 showed an increase on those for 1917 of 5,232 cases, and this year's figures show an increase of 2,447 in the number of cases proceeded against by the Police over 1918. Attention is invited to the details and chart appearing in Appendix A1.

Appendix MI.

With regard to the total number of more serious classes of offences recorded in the Police Gazette, the figures show an increase of 1,573 cases as compared with 1918 (details are included in Appendix B). Appendix B. The increase in 1918 as compared with the previous year was one case.

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Serious crimes

An analysis of the figures in Appendix B shows that increases took place under the following headings:—Murder, 22; attempted murder, 10; manslaughter, 3; robbery, being armed, 3; assault and robbery, 44; stealing from the person, 67; maliciously wounding and other assaults, 74; children found abandoned, 4; forgery and uttering, larceny, false pretences, and other miscellaneous offences, 573; burglaries and stealing from premis-s, 525; and watches and jewellery stolen, missing, &c., 343.

Of the increases indicated, the most serious are those referring to crimes of personal violence, viz.—murder, attempts, manslaughter, wounding, and robbery with violence. The increases under these headings are substantial, many of the most daring offences being committed by mere youths.

uvenile crime. Appendix B1 In view of the increase in juvenile crime, a return is included in Appendix B1, showing the number of arrests made in connection with "offences against the person," "offences against property with violence," and "offences against property without violence," committed by persons of or under the age of 21 years in the Metropolitan District. It is apparent that juvenile crime is largely on the increase, and no doubt the unsettling influences and lack of parental supervision during the war upon the community generally have been responsible for this increase. A marked tendency on the part of all classes to carry firearms has also become apparent, and this has no doubt constituted a factor in the increased number of crimes of personal violence which have occurred during the year. Legislation to restrict the carrying of firearms by unauthorised persons is urgently required.

In a very large proportion of the cases of serious crime the police have succeeded in effecting the arrest of the offenders and recovering the stolen property.

The principal decreases for the year are:—Rape and attempts, 6; carnally knowing and attempted criminal assaults on young girls, 7; indecent assaults on women, 7; bigamy, 4; embezzlement, 10; number of horses and cattle stolen, 242; reports of sheep stolen, 43; and horses and cattle maliciously killed, 6.

In quests.

Thirteen hundred and twenty-one inquests were held on the bodies of deceased persons as against 1,200 in 1918. In 110 cases death was attributable, either directly or indirectly, to intemperance. There were 114 inquests on fires as compared with 89 during 1918. Of this number (114) 16 were returned as wilful, 9 as accidental, and in the remaining 89 cases the cause was not specified.

Stoc': stol n.

Five hundred and ninety-eight head of large stock were reported as stolen during the year, as against 838 in 1918. Of this year's total, 258 have been traced. Taking into consideration the continued high values of stock, and the vast area of the State to be protected, stock stealing may be said to have been kept well in check.

Breaches of Imm'gration Restriction Act. Breaches of this Act show an increase of 7 over the figures of 1918.

Breaches of Section 463 of the Crimes Act by prisoners discharged on license show an increase of 32 as compared with 1918.

Prisoners released under the Crimes Act. Four hundred and thirty-one first offenders were discharged under the provisions of the Crimes Act, being an increase of 53. Of the total, 147 were convicted at higher courts and 284 at lower courts. There were 11 breaches of the conditions of release under the Act during the year, as compared with 4 in 1918.

Wife and child deserters.

There was an increase in the number of cases of wife and child desertions. It might be stated that the figures for the past few years have been—1916, 797 cases; 1917, 731 cases; 1918, 683 cases; and 1919, 912 cases.

Circuit Courts and Quarter Sessions. Extraditions. The committals to Circut Courts and Courts of Quarter Sessions totalled 1,335, an increase of 287.

One case of extradition—to New Zealand—occurred during the year.

Habitual criminals.

Since the date on which the Habitual Criminals Act was assented to (20th September, 1905) 82 persons have been declared to be habitual criminals, viz.:—

Thirty-one habitual criminals were under detention on the 31st December, 1919, including three coafied in the Hospital for Criminal Insane.

#### Important Criminal Cises.

The following murder cases dealt with during the year may, perhaps, be specially mentioned:—

The shooting by a Cingalese of a fellow-countryman with intent to inflict grievous bodily harm, as the result of which the Cingalese died shortly after admission to hospital, and the offender received a sentence of fifteen years' penal servitude; an affray at Watson's Bay, in which a Russian stabbed another in the chest, the victim dying a few hours later—the offender was sentened to four years' hard labour after having been found guilty of manslaughter; the murder of a man in a flat in Elizabeth-street, Sydney, by a youth. This case attracted a good deal of attention—the youth was committed for trial but acquitted; the murder of two children by a man with a razor—he was found guilty of murder and sentened to death, the sentence being commuted to imprisonment for life; the murder of a man as the result of a quarrel, the offender, who lived in the same room as the murdered man, being sentenced to ten years' penal servitude; the murder of a woman at Coogee; the death of a woman at Surry Hills as the result of a bullet wound alleged to have been inflicted consequent upon a quarrel—the offender surrendered himself to the police and has been committed for trial on a charge of murder; the death of a man at Surry Hills from

bullet wounds received as the result of a quarrel—the offender in this case has been committed for trial on a charge of murder; the case in which a returned soldier was shot dead in a Sydney lane by a well-known criminal—in this instance a probationary constable, who was off duty and in plain clothes, immediately pursued the offender, who fired upon him from a short distance, and although the constable was slightly wounded he succeeded in securing the revolver and with assistance overpowered the offender, who was subsequently committed for trial on a charge of murder; the murder of a woman at Port Stephens and the wounding of a man with whom it is alleged she had been living in adultery—the husband, who committed the crime, attempted to commit suicide. He was committed for trial, but found not guilty on the ground of insanity; the case of a man who after meeting another man at Wagga Wagga drove back with him to his hut at Rockleigh and there shot him at close quarters, death being instantaneous. The offender, who some years ago was a patient in Kenmore Mental Hospital, then left the hut, taking the gun and some cartridges, and proceeded to a residence some  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles distant where, with apparently no reason, he fired at and severely wounded a woman who was standing on the verandah. Her husband, after a severe struggle, secured the murderer and later handed him over to the police.

Two notable cases of abortion, in which death was the result, were dealt with by the Police.

Other occurrences which might be referred to are the accidental shooting of a farmer and his wife near Grafton, both being killed by the same bullet, which had been fired by a man about a mile distant who was shooting waterfowl on the river; the death of a woman in Kenmore Mental Hospital, who is alleged to have been poisoned by her husband by means of a biscuit; a daring attempt to hold up and rob the Forbes mail train near Horton Park by a youth masked and dressed in "cowboy" attire, also armed with a Mauser revolver, who boarded the engine as the train was leaving Perthville, but was disarmed after a severe struggle and subsequently jumped from the engine, sustaining minor injuries. The train was brought to a standstill and the offender picked up and handed over to the Police, a sentence of five months' hard labour being imposed at the trial.

### Import int Arrests, &c.

The following arrests, &c., by the Police are considered to be worthy of mention:-

The arrest of a man charged with garrotting—sentenced to four years' hard labour; the arrest of an offender who fired several shots at Noumean soldiers in Pelican-street, Sydney, and who was later arrested and charged with assaulting and robbing two of the soldiers and shooting with intent—sentenced to four years' penal servitude; the arrest of ten men for conspiring to cheat and defraud the Railway Commissioners and the Wheat Advisory Board of large quantities of wheat—four of the offenders were convicted and sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from six months to two years' hard labour; the arrest of a man for stealing from a dwelling jewellery valued at £100. This man's arrest was effected by a constable in spite of his life being threatened with a revolver—the jewellery was ultimately recovered; the arrest of a man against whom 107 charges of stealing in dwellings property to the total value of £1,000 were preferred, his method being to take lodgings and then ransack the belongings of the other inmates of the house; the arrest at Kogarah of an offender on charges of breaking, entering, and stealing goods to the value of £1,000; the arrest of a man in a cave at Middle Harbour on a charge of forging Commonwealth £1 notes.

Arrests were also made in connection with the theft of a large number of magnetos—in this case property valued at £350 was recovered. An interstate criminal was arrested for a number of cases of housebreaking committed on his return to this State immediately after his release from prison in Victoria. Offenders were arrested in connection with the theft of spirits and serge valued at £1,050; for thefts from wharves, where goods to the value of £10,000 were recovered; and thefts of motor-cars. Premises frequented by interstate criminals during the racing carnival were raided and thirty-five arrests made.

# Criminal Statistics for the Metropolitan District.

Having dealt with the position of crime as regards the State generally, the following observations are now presented concerning the figures for the Metropolitan District alone. During the year 26,984 persons were arrested and 6,734 proceeded against by summons, making a total of 33,718 (4,340 being females), as compared with 78,376 cases dealt with throughout the whole State. Last year a total number of 31,680 Metropolitan cases were dealt with. This year's figures, therefore, show an increase of 2,038 on the previous year. The total number of cases dealt with by the Metropolitan Police under the different headings are as follows:—

The increases are principally made up as follow:—

Offences against the person. -- Common assault, and cases of assaulting, resisting, or obstructing the police.

Offences

Offences against property with violence.—Breaking and entering with intent to steal, or attempts at, malicious injury to property and burglary.

Offences against property without violence.—Simple larceny, stealing from the person, stealing from dwellings, having possession of stolen property, and other offences related thereto.

Offences not otherwise included.—Additional offences against the Dog and Goat Act, Games, Wagers and Betting-houses Act, additional cases of lunacy, not complying with maintenance order, offences against the Metropolitan Traffic Act, Defence Act, Railway and Tramway By-laws, Government Railway Act, Liquor Act, and Quarantine Act. In connection with the last four increases it is pointed out that they were for the most part attributable to prosecutions for breaches of the proclamations issued in consequence of the influenza epidemic.

The decreases are mainly accounted for by :-

Offences against good order.—Drunkenness, indecent behaviour, and being idle and disorderly.

### Finger-prints.

Appendix C.

From the return furnished in Appendix C, it will be seen that 1,953 identifications of offenders were made during the year, compared with 1,740 in 1918.

Anger-prints as evidence.

Twenty-five cases in which finger-prints constituted the chief evidence were brought before the various Courts, and in every instance a conviction obtained. This is the greatest number for any year since the adoption of the finger-print system in the State.

Examinations.

During the year, 438 articles were brought to the Branch for examination for finger-prints, whilst 231 searches for finger-prints were conducted at localities where serious robberies had occurred.

Identification of deceased persons.

The finger-prints of 34 unknown deceased persons were taken and, by this means, 11 of the bodies were identified. In ordinary circumstances they might have been buried as "unknown."

Interchange of recerds.

Attention is invited to the statement contained in Appendix C, showing the extent of the interchange of finger-print records between New South Wales and other places, and the results achieved.

Criminal photographs.

The negatives of 601 criminal photographs were received from the Prisons Department with a view to the distribution of prints in the usual manner. Copies of these photographs were prepared, where necessary, and 1,309 were sent to the various States and New Zealand, while 7,665 were supplied to the city and country police in the State. Photographs numbering 1,936 were received from other States of the Commonwealth and New Zealand.

#### Water Police.

Considerable work was performed by the Water Police at Sydney and Newcastle consequent upon the arrival and departure of vessels and troopships, the ferry traffic, and work of registering aliens from overseas. Police launches, at Sydney, were also instrumental in rendering assistance to seven sailing boats which capsized in the harbour, crews numbering 77 being rescued without loss of life. Forty-four dead bodies were recovered from Sydney Harbour and other places.

#### Metropolitan Licensing Inspection.

Mctels

On the 31st December, 1919, there were 608 hotels in the Metropolitan District, being a decrease of four during the year, viz., three allowed to lapse and one surrendered.

Objections to licenses.

In fourteen instances, Police lodged objections to the renewals of Publicans' Licenses on the grounds of structural defects or because of the manner in which the hotels were conducted. Twelve renewals were granted and two withdrawn.

The number of additional bars has increased by thirteen during the year, spirit merchants licenses by one, and billiard licenses by one. Packet licenses have decreased by six, and colonial wine licenses by two. The number of brewers' licenses and registered clubs remains the same.

Improvement is being made in the class of buildings in the district, and apart from structural alterations insisted upon, a large amount of rebuilding and material alterations have been carried out by the owners of the buildings voluntarily.

Appendix D.

Attention is invited to the returns (vide Appendix D) showing the business, &c., dealt with during 1919.

## Traffic.

Incresse in traffic.

There has been a marked increase in motor traffic. Congestion of traffic in the City is daily becoming more apparent.

Street standards. Movable street standard signs have been adopted, which have resulted in temporarily reducing the congestion caused by "waiting" vehicles. The public have readily complied with requirements.

Fruit Barrowmen. Some difficulty has arisen during the year through obstruction of traffic on the part of these vendors. Arrangements have, however, been made by the City Council with the Police which have resulted in stands being located in more suitable positions.

Street bands.

The number of bands performing in busy centres at all hours of the day has been the subject of numerous complaints from business men. After several conferences with the bands concerned, times and positions have been fixed which should prevent cause for reasonable complaint, but the position is still far from satisfactory.

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The number of licenses for motor omnibuses has increased by eighty during the year, while the use of licensed horse omnibuses has decreased by eight.

Omnibuses
Accidents.

There has been an increase of thirty-nine in the number of accidents reported by the Police in the Metropolitan District, in which either trams, motors, other vehicles, or horses were concerned. The total for the year was 2,841, 51 persons having been killed and 1,623 injured. One hundred and twenty motor accidents

accidents outside the Metropolitan District were reported by Police, in connection with which 18 persons were killed and 94 injured. One thousand and seventy-five persons were taken to hospital by police as a result of accidents in the Metropolitan District alone.

Prosecutions took place and offenders were convicted for cruelty in 201 cases. This matter is kept Unfit horses, under close attention by the Police.

There has been a steady increase in the revenue from the registration of motor and public vehicles, Revenue. and in the proceeds from the motor tax. The totals for the years 1918 and 1919 are as follow:—

The employment for Police purposes of motor cycles and motor vehicles has been attended with Police cycles and excellent results during the year. The motors travelled 67,976 miles, at an average cost of 6d. per mile, motor vehicles. the motor cycles 127,477 miles, at an average cost of 2d. per mile. There are thirty-one motor cycles, thirty-one motor cycles, thirteen with side-cars attached, and 219 ordinary bicycles in use by Police throughout the State.

In the suburbs motor cyclists materially assist in the control of traffic.

Detailed statements are shown in Appendix E of the traffic work performed during the year.

Appendix E.

#### Miscellaneous.

Throughout the year there has been a steady increase in the volume of the work to be dealt with by General work of the Police. Notwithstanding the fact that there has been a considerable falling off in the work previously undertaken in conjunction with the Military Authorities, it has been more than counterbalanced by the ordinary expansion of the Department. There is still a portion of work undertaken at the request of the Military Authorities, regarding the character and movements of aliens, and inquiries concerning allotments of military pay, &c.

The Police continue to carry out the work incidental to the registration and supervision of aliens. Registration of aliens. under the Aliens Registration Regulations.

The return of troops, the Peace Celebrations, and other important functions, have necessitated the making of special Police arrangements, particularly in the Metropolitan District.

Considerable calls were made upon the efforts of the Police in connection with matters arising out Influenza of the influenza epidemic, and in many instances Police were called upon to carry out duties which subjected them to considerable risk of infection. A large number of police were themselves affected by the disease, and in several instances death resulted. Comprehensive arrangements were made with a view to effectively enforcing the various proclamations which were issued from time to time by the Government with a view to checking the spread of the epidemic.

There have been a number of industrial disturbances, but, with the exception of those at Broken disturbances, Hill and Sydney, they have been comparatively unimportant and of short duration.

#### Missing Friends.

An increased number of inquiries was received during the year relating to missing persons, due, no doubt, to anxiety on the part of friends and relatives for news since the termination of the war. A large number of persons were traced by the Police, and in many cases men who had deserted their families were found and induced to contribute to their support.

# Police on Military Service.

Particulars were included in last year's Report of members of the Police Force who enlisted for Police enlist-

Of the total number of members of the Police Force who enlisted, viz.—209, making, with 8 of Police returning the clerical staff, a total of 217, the greater part have now resumed their duties. Of these 49 paid the from Mil. supreme sacrifice. The following decorations, distinctions, and Commissions were gained:—Military Cross, 1; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 4; Military Medal, 8; Meritorious Service Medal, 2; Croix de Guerre (Belgian), 2; Servian Gold Medal, 1; Mentioned in Despatches, 2. Commissions—Captain, 4; Lieutenant, 18.

It has been ascertained, so far as has been possible to obtain particulars, that a total of 683 sons of war service of members of the Police Force and of police pensioners served in the war, 666 in the Military Forces, 15 in sons of Police. the navy, and 2 munition workers. Of these, 106 paid the supreme sacrifice, while 43 gained decorations as follows:—Military Cross, 8; Distinguished Conduct Medal, 4; Military Medal, 13; Distinguished Service Order, 1; Croix de Guerre, 2; Servian Silver Medal, 1; Order (3rd class) of Sr. Stanislaus, 1; Mentioned in Despatches, 13. In addition, 66 mined commissioned work including Lieuters Columbia. Mentioned in Despatches, 13. In addition, 66 gained commissioned rank, including Lieutenant-Colonel, 2; Major, 1; Brigade-Major, 1; Captain, 14; Lieutenant, 48.

On the 21st May, 1919, at Police Headquarters, Phillip-street, the Chief Secretary unveiled a Roll Unveiling of of Honour erected by members of the Police Force to commemorate the names of those of their comrades Honour Roll. who enlisted. The Chief Secretary's remarks on this occasion might suitably be here recorded in order to mark the participation of the Police in matters incidental to the Great War.

The Minister said that the Police had responded loyally to the first call for recruits, and so many of them enlisted voluntarily that it became necessary for the Government, in the public interests, to prohibit a further reduction of the strength of the Police Force—a decision in which the Military Authorities concurred. Since the outbreak of war, the Department, with a reduced numerical strength of police, had been

been called upon to perform multifarious duties of a difficult nature, which had been carried out in a manner reflecting credit upon the efficiency of the Police administration. The Police Force had been responsible, either directly or indirectly, for raising patriotic funds since the outbreak of the war, amounting in all to over £50,000. The memory of the men who had given their lives would not be forgotten, and the State Government would see that the dependents of those who had fallen would receive every consideration. He felt privileged to unveil such a fine Honour Roll, and congratulated the Force upon the steps that had been taken to perpetuate the memory of their comrades who had responded to the call of King and country.

Patriotic and Charitable Funds. The sum of £10,476 has been contributed by the Police to patriotic funds, &c., since September, 1914. In addition to this, a total of £43,160 was obtained at the various carnivals held in conjunction with the Metropolitan Fire Brigade during the years 1915 to 1919.

#### Establishment.

Appendix F.

On the 31st December, 1919, the Force numbered 2,598, as against 2,521 at the end of 1918. Details of the manner in which the Police are distributed throughout the State are furnished in Appendix F. At the end of the year there were 267 vacancies for which suitable applicants could not be secured. In order to supplement the efforts of the Police in some measure, the services of a number of special constables were continued. In the matter of further police recruits special preference is being given to suitable applicants who are returned soldiers.

#### Appointments.

During the year, 1,323 applications for Police employment were received – 785 were rejected for various reasons; 205 were rejected by the Police Surgeon; 232 were appointed; and 71 did not proceed with their applications.

The strength of Cobar (Bourke District) was reduced by two men, and that of Narrandera and Urana (Murray District) by one man.

## Health of the Police.

The Police Surgeon reports that there was a decided increase in the number of Police on Sick Report as compared with previous years. This he states is entirely attributable to the prevailing epidemic of pneumonic influenza.

#### Transfers.

Thirteen men were transferred from the Broken Hill, eight from the South-western, and three from the Bourke District to more congenial climates.

The Police Stations at Blackheath and Mount Victoria were transferred from the Western to the Eastern District.

The Eastern District headquarters were transferred from the Depot, at Redfern, to Parramatta.

#### Police Buildings.

In last year's Report attention was invited to the unsatisfactory position in respect of Police buildings and the necessity for special provision being made in the direction of erecting new buildings, purchasing sites, and carrying out additions and repairs to existing buildings. The position has not materially altered, and it has become necessary in several instances, owing to the bad condition of the Government premises, to replace married constables in charge by single men or to vacate the buildings and temporarily rent private premises.

The total amount at present being paid in renting premises is nearly £7,000 per annum, and this annual payment has each year to be added to owing to the natural increase in rent and the necessity for renting further accommodation. It is estimated that at least £150,000 would be necessary to satisfactorily meet the whole of the requirements of the Department in respect of providing suitable Police sites and premises.

Forage.

The expenditure on forage during 1919 exceeded that of the previous year by over £9,000. This is attributable to the high price of forage in consequence of the extended dry periods.

Ambulance and Life-saving Certificates.

In the Appendices G and H are given particulars of the number of men in the Force holding appendices St. John, Railway, or other Ambulance Certificates, and also awards granted by the Royal Life-saving G and H. Society.

Acts of Bravery.

Several acts of bravery on the part of Police have been reported. In a number of cases arrests have been effected notwithstanding the fact that offenders were armed. Bravery has also been exhibited in rescuing persons from drowning at Sydney and Newcastle.

# Functions at Police Depôt.

His Excellency the Governor presented King's Police Medals, Imperial Service Medals, and Royal Life-Saving Society Certificates and Medallions to members of the Police Force at the Depôt on the 19th March and 5th September of last year.

#### New South Wales Police Band.

Under Mr. A. W. Arlom, the Band has attained a high state of efficiency, and its services have been frequently availed of during the year in connection with public and charitable functions.

# General Conduct of the Police.

The general conduct of the Force has been exceptionally good; only in a few instances has cause for serious complaint arisen.
