## REPORT

Sir.

The Board of Fire Commissioners of New South Wales pursuant to Section 19 (2) of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1958, presents its report for the year 1960; being the fifty-first annual report.

#### THE BOARD

Mr. Alan Clarence Lackey, Assistant Australasian Manager of the Hartford Fire Insurance Company was elected by the Insurance Companies in terms of Section 9 (4) of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1958, as a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners of N.S.W., as notified in Government Gazette dated 15th January, 1960, in the room of Mr. C. J. Edwards, who resigned on 31st December, 1959.

## CONFERENCE OF FIRE AUTHORITIES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA

A conference of Interstate Fire Brigade Authorities of the Commonwealth of Australia was held in Melbourne on the 16th and 17th March, 1960.

The Board was represented by the President, Mr. B. F. Andrews, Mr. Fire Commissioners A. E. Shaw, A. C. Lackey, and was accompanied by the Secretary, Mr. W. O. Wiggins.

The results of the Conference were of great value and the opportunity of meeting representatives of other States collectively provided the means of interchange of views which will be of great benefit in the assessment of the many problems associated with the administration of the Fire Fighting Services of the Commonwealth.

#### ESTIMATES OF EXPENDITURE

The Estimates of Expenditure in respect of the various fire districts throughout the State amounted to £2,898,584 as shown in Appendix II. Of this, the estimate of the Sydney Fire District was £2,307,520 and the total for the 154 other fire districts £591,064.

The Estimates for 1961 total £3,475,184, that for the Sydney Fire District being £2,831,808 and for the other 153 districts collectively £643,376.

Thirty-five Municipal and Shire Councils in the Sydney Fire District contributed for 1960 and the percentage of their total contributions to that of the assessed annual value of all ratable property therein, as returned by them in 1959 was 3s. 9d. per £100. For 1961, the Council's contribution in that district will be equivalent to 4s. 3d. per £100. The total assessed value of ratable land within the Sydney Fire District in 1960 was £166,770,679, which represents an increase of £12,864,415 as compared with the previous year.

Two hundred and twenty-six Insurance Companies and forty-five owners contributed to the Board during the year. Their contributions represented 16.69 per cent. of the assessable premiums returned for the State of New South Wales.

#### FIRE DISTRICTS—ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS

Alterations and extensions were made to the boundaries of eight fire districts during the year, as follows:—

- St. Marys Fire District was dissolved and the area included in the Penrith Fire District, as on and from 1st January, 1961.
- Gundagai Fire District was enlarged to embrace the towns of Gundagai and South Gundagai, in Gundagai Shire.
- Hay Fire District was reduced in area to embrace the towns of Hay and South Hay, in the Municipality of Hay.
- Illawarra Fire District was extended to include Coledale Heights in the City of Greater Wollongong.
- Penrith Fire District was extended to include the township of Werrington in the City of Penrith, together with the area of the former St. Marys Fire District, as on and from 1st January, 1961.
- Taree Fire District was extended to embrace additional parts of the town of Taree, in the Municipality of Taree.
- Tweed Heads Fire District was extended to include the township of Tweed Heads South, in Tweed Shire.
- Wagga Wagga Fire District was reduced in area to embrace the town of Wagga Wagga and additional areas, in the City of Wagga Wagga.

The Municipality of Manilla and Mandowa Shire were united under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1919, as on and from 1st January, 1960, the area so formed being constituted as Manilla Shire. The Municipality of Narrandera and Yanko Shire were also united, as on and from the same date, the area formed being constituted as Narrandera Shire. The provisions of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1958 were thereupon reapplied to the areas in these shires which previously formed the Manilla and Narrandera Fire Districts.

The Coolah and Gloucester Shires were reconstituted during the year and the Fire Brigades Act was thereupon reapplied to the town of Coolah and the Gloucester Urban Area, in the newly constituted Shires of Coolah and Gloucester, respectively. The cities of Greater Cessnock and Maitland were reconstituted, as on and from 1st January, 1960. The provisions of the Fire Brigades Act were thereupon reapplied to the parts of the newly constituted City of Greater Cessnock which formerly comprised the Branxton-Greta, Cessnock, Kurri Kurri and Paxton Fire Districts. The Act was also reapplied to the part of the newly constituted City of Maitland forming the Maitland Fire District, together with the townships of Thornton and Millers Forest which form parts of the Lower Hunter and Raymond Terrace Fire Districts, respectively.

#### INCREASE OF STATUTORY LIMIT

For the erection of new fire stations at Coonamble and Canowindra and the high maintenance expenditure involved at Inverell, the consent of the Minister was obtained in pursuance of Section 34 of the Act to the previous limit of contribution based on the Unimproved Capital Value of all ratable land in those districts being increased to  $\frac{3}{8}$ d.,  $\frac{5}{8}$ d. and  $\frac{3}{8}$ d. in the pound respectively. Such consent was obtained in 1960 in respect of 1961 estimates.

#### FIRE STATIONS AND SITES

New fire stations were erected by the Board at Dorrigo and Avalon, the latter being provided with a residence. The Wakool and Blaxland Shire Councils and the Walgett Municipal Council built new premises at Barham, Wallerawang and Walgett, respectively, and were leased by the Board from those Councils as Fire Stations. Contracts were let and work commenced on the erection by the Board of new fire stations at Blacktown, Sutherland, Cabramatta, Rydalmere and Lawson, and a cottage at Junee.

Working drawings and specifications have been prepared for new stations at Liverpool, Campbelltown and Broken Hill.

Alterations and renovations were carried out to Mascot, Ryde and Pyrmont which were re-opened as active fire stations.

A new workshops building was completed in Five Dock at a cost of £44,500.

Cottage properties were purchased at Katoomba and Cessnock.

Sites for proposed fire stations were purchased at Gloucester, Boorowa, Uralla, Lawson, Forestville, Picton, Rydalmere, Sutherland, Tarro, Wollongong, Warrawong, Wyong and Unanderra and the Board was appointed Trustees of a portion of land at Laurieton.

For the purpose of development of Headquarters the Board purchased property situated at 139a Bathurst Street, Sydney.

The Homebush Fire Station, which has been closed as an active establishment since 1945, together with adjoining semi-detached cottages were sold, and a cottage at Alexandria was also offered for sale.

#### LEASES

Leases were entered into, in respect of the fire stations at Barham and Nambucca Heads with the Wakool and Nambucca Shires respectively, for periods of 21 years and with the Murrurundi Shire in respect of Murrurundi Fire Station for a period of 5 years.

The Board renewed the lease of portion of its site adjoining Boolaroo Fire Station to the Commonwealth Savings Bank for a further period of 5 years.

#### **FIRES**

In Sydney and Suburbs, 17,325 alarms of fire were recorded during the year being an increase of 6,446 compared with the previous year. The total number of calls comprised of 4,745 false alarms, 48 chimney fires and 12,532 other fires. Of the false alarms, 1,135 were classified as malicious, 646 needless, and 2,964 accidental.

The most notable fires were :-

In other districts the number of fire calls received by the Brigade totalled 8,205, being an increase of 2,942 by comparison to previous year.

Of the total, 7,500 were actual fires and false alarms accounted for 705. Of this number, 231 were classified as malicious, 192 needless and 282 accidental.

The most notable fires were :-

With regret it is recorded that burning fatalities were associated with outbreaks of fire at Arncliffe, Balmain, Bathurst, Broken Hill, Collaroy, Coniston, Cowra (3), Darlinghurst, Enmore, Forbes, Glebe, Greta, Hamilton, Kahibah, Mayfield East, Narromine, Newtown, Paddington, Parramatta, Patterson, Rozelle, South Curl Curl, Sydney, Wentworthville, West Tamworth, Woonona, Woy Woy.

#### **ELECTRICAL FIRE ALARMS**

Connected to Fire Stations in the Sydney Fire District are 1,106 sprinkler installations of various types, 426 thermostatic alarms, 83 special and 151 private fire alarms, also 106 exchange lines.

Six additional street fire alarms of the telephone type were installed at Leeton (1), Glen Innes (4) and Caringbah (1).

There are 301 telephones, 11 mechanical, 42 private and 23 special fire alarms connected to Country Fire Stations, also 204 connected to the telephone exchange. At Canberra there are 112 mechanical alarms connected to the station and 4 connected to the telephone exchange.

Telephone switchboards were installed at Avalon, Balgownie, Barham, Camden, Dapto, Dorrigo, Lithgow, Mascot, Nowra, Richmond, Ryde, Tweed Heads, Walgett and Wallerawang.

Automatic Fire Alarm installations are connected to fire stations at Albury (11), Bathurst (6), Broken Hill (11), Cessnock (12), Dubbo (5), Glen Innes (1), Goulburn (10), Grafton (2), Katoomba (2), Lismore (5), Lithgow (2), Maitland (12), Newcastle (94), Orange (5), Port Kembla (12), Tamworth (13), Wagga Wagga (4), Wollongong (23) and Canberra (56).

Electrically operated fire call sirens were installed at Braidwood, Riverstone, Barham, Ingleburn, Cobar, Wallerawang and Narrabeen.

#### THEFTS AND DAMAGES

The Board again records that the thefts of parts and damage of street fire alarms and instruments, continued during the year. The malicious interference with this apparatus cannot be too strongly condemned because of the serious danger to life and property.

The localities which were affected are:—Ashfield, Auburn, Bankstown, Bondi, Burwood, Campsie, Caringbah, Dee Why, Darlinghurst, Dubbo, Eastwood, Glebe, Goulburn, Guildford, Hamilton, Hurstville, Kogarah, Lakemba, Leichhardt, Lidcombe, Manly, Maroubra, Marrickville, Narrabeen, Newtown, Parramatta, Redfern, Revesby, Rockdale, The Rocks, Wallsend, Waratah and Waterloo.

#### OFFENCES AND CONVICTIONS

A man was found guilty to a charge of setting fire to a cottage at Wallsend and was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment.

As a result of setting fire to the premises of C. Ramsay, Lismore, a man was sentenced to imprisonment for 9 months. The same man was later charged and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment on two counts of arson having set fire to the properties of George Pope and Arthur Keech of Lismore.

As a result of a fire at 37 Barcam Street, Merrylands, a child was committed to an Institution for an indefinite period.

Two children were placed on probation to be of good behaviour for a period of 18 months and their parents ordered to pay compensation for setting fire and causing malicious damage to the Public School, Unanderra.

Three youths pleaded guilty to a charge of maliciously setting fire to premises in Lane Cove and were ordered to pay damages.

As a result of a fire at 40 Bonar Street, Arncliffe, two youths were found guilty of arson and placed on probation for two years.

For setting fire to a motor vehicle at South Grafton, a man was placed on a three year good behaviour bond.

Two children were found guilty to maliciously setting fire to the Methodist Church, Lewisham, and were released to the custody of their parents to be on probation for two and three years.

A man pleaded guilty to a charge of maliciously setting fire to a cottage at Carrington and was fined £5 and ordered to pay £4 compensation to the owner.

For setting fire to his own home in Mansfield Street, Balmain, a man was sentenced to five years imprisonment.

#### BRIGADES

The strength of the Brigade in Sydney and Suburbs ("A" Division) at present is 325 Officers, 1,027 Permanent and 322 Volunteer Firemen. In Newcastle District, 21 Officers, 56 Permanent and 112 Volunteer Firemen; in Broken Hill, 4 Officers, 9 Permanent and 27 Volunteer Firemen; in Canberra, 5 Officers and 26 Permanent Firemen; in Illawarra District, 8 Officers, 13 Permanent and 104 Volunteer Firemen; and in other districts 32 Officers and 1,999 Volunteer Firemen.

The total strength of the Brigade is 395 Officers, 1,131 Permanent Firemen and 2,564 Volunteer Firemen.

There was an intake of 146 Permanent Firemen during the year, whilst 110 Brigade personnel left the service by resignation, retirement, etc., a nett gain of 36 being thus achieved.

Four permanent Officers and 8 permanent firemen were attached to Mascot and Ryde Fire Stations respectively and 4 Officers, and 20 permanent firemen Pyrmont Fire Station. All these premises were re-opened during the year as active Fire Stations.

#### VOLUNTEER FIRE BRIGADES DEMONSTRATIONS

The fourth post-war Volunteer Fire Brigades Demonstration was successfully accomplished at Tweed Heads from the 10th to 15th October, 1960. Four hundred and thirty Volunteer Firemen representing eighty-one Brigades from all parts of the State, attended.

The demonstration was officially opened by the Honourable C. A. Kelly, M.L.A., Chief Secretary and Minister for Tourist Activities in the presence of the President and Members of the Board, Mr. Stevens, M.L.A. for the electorate of Byron, Councillor C. H. Lundberg, President of the Tweed Shire, the Chief Officer and representative visitors from all other States of the Commonwealth.

The efficiency and bearing of the Volunteer Firemen taking part was the subject of the most favourable comments.

Narrandera Brigade won the Webb Cup for the aggregate points obtained in all events.

Mr. Fire Commissioner Mallam in company with the Secretary represented the Board at the 1960 Urban Fire Brigades' Demonstration held at Geelong, Victoria, during March.

#### AWARDS

The Board noted with satisfaction the award of the Queen's Fire Service Medal to Chief Officer H. W. Pye, Deputy Chief Officer D. R. Hawkins and Captain C. Forde (Young), which were published in the New Year Honours' list.

#### FIRE APPLIANCES

Four new Motor Fire Appliances fitted with rear mounted pumps capable of delivering 350 g.p.m. and one new fire engine capable of delivering 500 g.p.m. were placed into service at Sawtell, Moss Vale, Walgett, Muswellbrook and Tweed Heads respectively.

Two smaller units having a pumping capacity of 200 g.p.m. for use as 2nd appliance were placed into service at Wagga Wagga and Tamworth.

The construction and delivery of these fire appliances is part of an extensive motor replacement programme which will continue during succeeding years.

Appliances having a pumping capacity of 630 g.p.m., 5/700 g.p.m. and 800 g.p.m. were placed at Mascot, Ryde and Pyrmont respectively. These Stations were re-opened during the year as active fire stations.

Exchange of engines of similar types were made at Berry, Junee, Lake Cargelligo, Tumbarumba and Tocumwal.

Exchange of appliances where a larger capacity was considered necessary were made at Coonamble, Raymond Terrace, Balgownie and Ingleburn.

The Board's motorised equipment now consists of 304 Fire Engines, 3 hose carriages, 1 CO<sub>2</sub> appliance, 5 salvage waggons, 7 turntable ladders, 14 bush fire tanker units.

#### HOSE

Sixty-one thousand five hundred (61,500) feet of  $2\frac{3}{4}$  in. and ninety thousand two hundred (90,200) feet of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  in. unlined hose and ten thousand (10,000) feet of 1 in. rubber lined hose was received during the year.

The total quantity of fire hose in service and in reserve at the end of the year was 3,150 feet of  $3\frac{3}{4}$  in. unlined hose, 588,080 feet of  $2\frac{3}{4}$  in. unlined hose, 179,959 feet of 1 in. to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  in. unlined hose, 14,304 feet of rubber yard hose, 54,120 feet of  $2\frac{3}{4}$  in. rubber lined hose, and 9,676 feet of suction hose.

#### BUSH FIRES AND BUSH FIRES ACT, 1949

The Board's liaison with the Bush Fire Committee constituted under the Bush Fires Act, 1949, proceeded with District Officer V. A. Lowther as a member of that Committee.

#### **BUILDING INSPECTION**

The work of a special staff to advise and report upon fire protection requirements under the Factories and Shops Act, and Theatres and Public Halls Act, etc., was continued and routine inspectional visits were made by Officers of the Brigade to premises registered under the Theatres and Public Halls Act as well as to Hospitals, Government Institutions, business premises, etc., in matters of fire protection.

#### WORKSHOPS AND FACTORIES

The manufacturing operations of the Uniform Clothing and Boot Making Departments of the Board continued with success.

The Workshops staff has been brought together into the one Workshops building at Spencer Street, Five Dock, and a noticeable improvement in the control through this change is evident.

The repairs and maintenance and servicing of the Board's motor equipment in addition to the construction of new appliances has continued.

The staff of the Electrical Department has maintained the electrical equipment at fire stations throughout the State, including telephone, light and power installations, automatic and street fire alarms, sirens and house bells, etc., at the desired state of efficiency. The manufacture and installation of new equipment has proceeded satisfactorily.

Two-way radio was connected to fire appliances installed at Newcastle, Hamilton, Tighes Hill, Stockton, Wallsend, Belmont, Waratah with the base station at Newcastle Fire Station.

Renovations and maintenance of the Board's properties have been carried out by the Architect's staff or by contract where possible in country districts.

Sketch plans, working drawings and specifications were prepared for new fire station buildings being erected by the Board, the same service being rendered in connection with fire station buildings erected by Councils for occupancy by the Board on a rental basis.

To maintain the Board's extensive Building Programme firms of independent Architects were commissioned to prepare working drawings and specifications for a number of the new building projects.

#### APPEALS BY INSURANCE COMPANIES AGAINST ASSESSMENT

Five Appeals were heard by the Appeal Committee established under the Regulations under the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1958 against the assessed contribution by the Board. In all cases the contributions were reduced by the Commission.

#### WORKERS' COMPENSATION (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1957

Four hundred and thirty claims were lodged under the provision of the Workers' Compensation Act with the Government Insurance Office of N.S.W. with which the Board again covered its liability.

#### FIVE WEEKS' ANNUAL LEAVE CLAIM

During the currency of the Station Officers' and Firemen's awards, the Union applied to the Industrial Commission for variations to increase the four weeks' annual leave to five weeks, annual leave in consequence of the Annual Holidays (Amendment) Act, 1958. The Board opposed the applications, and the Industrial Commission (Mr. Justice Beattie) refused the application, saying that grounds had not been established to justify variations in that respect during the currency of the awards. Subsequently, new awards negotiated from 1st July, 1960, for three years (see elsewhere in this report) retained the previous four weeks' provision for annual leave.

#### PUBLIC DEMONSTRATIONS, STRIKE AND PENALTY

Early in the year public demonstrations by Union Officers and members of the brigade were followed by a strike of Station Officers and Firemen members of the Union. A direction by His Honour, Mr. Justice Taylor, following a compulsory conference to resume work was disobeyed by the Union and its members, and the Board invoked the provisions of Section 100 of the Industrial Arbitration Act.

Following the hearing a Full Bench of the Industrial Commission found the offence proved and having regard to previous strikes and penalties, imposed on the same Union for similar offences, imposed the maximum penalty of £500 0s. 0d. and costs.

Notwithstanding that penalty, the Union and its members continued the strike, and the Board instituted proceedings for the cancellation of the registration of the Union. Work was resumed before the hearing of that application, and when the matter was listed the Union gave an unqualified undertaking to observe and adhere to the provisions of the law in the future, whereupon the Board was granted leave by the Commission to withdraw the application.

#### FIREMEN AND STATION OFFICERS—NEW AWARDS

The previous awards expired on the 30th June, 1960, having been varied a few months earlier by consent to bring up to 28 per cent. the amounts of marginal increase conceded by the Board since the 1st July, 1957.

A dispute having occurred as to what increase of marginal rates should be applied to Station Officers and Firemen from 1st January to 1st July, 1960, and private conferences having failed to settle the dispute, Mr. Conciliation Commissioner Herron agreed to act as a private arbitrator. His decision given on 30th June recommended that in addition to the increases voluntarily conceded by the Board, a further 10 per cent. increase was in his opinion equitable to both sides, having in mind recent amendments to the Arbitration Act, which no longer provided "minimum" rates but "just" rates. Increases ranging from 6s. 3d. per week for 4th Class Firemen to 23s. 9d. for Station Officers "A" Grade, were then granted by the Board.

Following this decision and the increases granted, all rates were generally reviewed for the purposes of two new three year awards and further increases were agreed upon and awards made by consent for terms of three years until 30th June, 1963.

In consequence of these two new awards, and although the Senior Officers' Association did not accept them in satisfaction of its own claims, the Board gave certain increases to District Officers and Inspectors on whose behalf the Senior Officers' Association had also submitted claims earlier in the year. Despite negotiations the Board and the Senior Officers' Association were unable to agree on rates and the Association filed an application to the New South Wales Fire Brigade Senior Officers' (State) Conciliation Committee for a complete new award in place of a previous agreement, the term of which had expired on the 30th June, 1960. With the Committee's approval, the parties agreed that the hearing of the application should commence on 31st January, 1961.

#### 28 PER CENT. MARGINAL INCREASE—BRIGADE WORKSHOPS

In consequence of the 28 per cent. marginal increase given to Federal Metal Trades Employees by the Commonwealth Conciliation and Arbitration Commission, the Board approved that the margins of skilled tradesmen be increased by £1 0s. 0d. per week, semi-skilled employees by 14s. per week and unskilled employees by 7s. per week as from the first pay period in January, 1960. These increases affected employees, being members of some 17 different unions in respect of whom a comprehensive Industrial Agreement operates.

Later in the year, in consequence of increases conceded to firemen, the Board voluntarily offered to renew the rates in the Industrial Agreement, the term of which was not due to expire until 1st January, 1961. A new agreement was arranged, but although submitted to the Unions for execution was not so executed before the year ended.

#### **VOLUNTEER FIREMEN**

Following an application by the New South Wales Fire Brigades Employees' Union to the New South Wales Fire Brigade Employees' (State) Conciliation Committee for an award for volunteer firemen, Mr. Commissioner Herron referred to the Industrial Commission questions as to whether or not volunteer firemen were employees of the Board, and whether or not volunteer firemen were employees under the Industrial Arbitration Act in respect of whom an award might be made.

The Industrial Commission (Mr. Justice Beattie) later decided to answer both questions in the affirmative and the Conciliation Committee has yet to deal with the award application.

#### FEDERATED CLERKS' UNION

A new Industrial Agreement was made for a period of three years to the 1st July, 1963.

#### LANDLORD AND TENANT (AMENDMENT) ACT

A further number of Fire Brigade quarters were exempted from the provisions of Parts III and V of the Act.

#### FIRE BRIGADE EMPLOYEES' (STATE) CONCILIATION COMMITTEE

The President, Mr. B. F. Andrews, was nominated by the Board as member and Messrs. Fire Commissioners A. C. Lackey and A. E. Shaw as alternate members.

#### FIRE BRIGADE SENIOR OFFICERS' (STATE) CONCILIATION COMMITTEE

The President, Mr. B. F. Andrews, was nominated by the Board as a member of this Committee with Mr. Fire Commissioner A. C. Lackey as alternate member.

#### CROWN EMPLOYEES APPEAL BOARD

The one outstanding appeal mentioned in the 1959 report was dismissed when heard, as also was one other appeal. Two appeals were withdrawn and four others (all cases where the appellant's services had been terminated because of physical incapacity) had not been heard when the year ended. A number of appeals all against the same promotions of certain officers to higher rank were also awaiting hearing when the year ended.

#### **BY-LAWS**

His Excellency the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council approved new By-laws made by the Board under the provisions of the Fire Brigades Act, 1909-1958. These By-laws were made in substitution of those which had been in force since 1928.

#### INSPECTIONS

Inspections of Fire Stations in Sydney and Suburbs and also in the Country Districts were made by the Board and the opportunity taken to present Long Service Medals and Bars to that award to Members of Volunteer Fire Brigades.

Representatives of Municipal and Shire Councils were met concerning Fire Brigade matters.

#### **AUDIT**

A satisfactory report of the accounts of the Board was received from the Auditors, Messrs. Robertson, Crane and Gibbons.

#### LOANS

In accordance with the terms of the loans of £20,000 and £100,000 to the Board in 1941, £200,000 in 1955 and £200,000 in 1959, one debenture each of £1,000, £5,000 and £10,000 and two at £5,000 respectively in connection with such loans were redeemed.

A loan of £200,000 was finalised on the 1st December, 1960, and debentures issued to the C.B.S. Savings Bank Ltd.

#### CONCLUSION

The Board in conclusion, expresses its appreciation of the ready co-operation of Government Departments, quasi Governmental Bodies and Local Government Authorities with respect to their association with the Board in the expansion and further provision of Fire Brigade services throughout the State.

Attention is invited to the report of the Chief Officer of Fire Brigades and other appendices which furnish additional information.

#### **ANNUAL REPORT 1960**

The following report on the work and operation of the New South Wales Fire Brigades for the year ended 31st December, 1960, is submitted for the information of the Board.

The number of calls received in the Metropolitan Area in the period under review totalled 17,325, an increase of 6,446 on the number for the preceding year. Included in the total were 2,964 fires in buildings, 26 ship fires, 48 chimney fires, 8,291 bush, grass and rubbish fires, 1,251 miscellaneous fires and 4,745 false alarms.

Amongst the most notable fires that occurred during the year were those at :-

Kriesler Aust. Pty. Ltd., 43 Alice Street, Newtown, on 28th January, 1960.

McMahons Ltd., 122-124 Pitt Street, Redfern, on 24th February, 1960.

Liverpool District Hospital, College Street, Liverpool, on 26th May, 1960.

Berkeley Upholstery Co. Ltd., 10 Underwood Street, Paddington, on 3rd August, 1960.

Transworld Agency & Importing Pty. Ltd., 91 Reservoir Street, Surry Hills, on 3rd September, 1960.

During the year, 112 members were injured at fires, of whom 81 did not relinquish duty. There were 2,624 cases of sickness and accident, and 109 members injured off duty. The total number of days lost through sickness and accident was 19,694, a rise of 3,212 on the total for 1959.

In the period under review, 98 trained personnel left the service by way of resignation, retirement, etc.

Recruiting is still proceeding steadily and there has been an increase of 113 in the number of applicants for appointment. It is observed that many applicants do not respond when called upon for examination, and of those who do attend, a large proportion fail to satisfy the educational standard or physical requirements of the service. Of the applications received in 1960, 146 Probationary Firemen were appointed.

Recruits continue to attend an eight weeks initial training course at Paddington Fire Brigade Training College and this training is augmented by further instruction to Probationary Firemen whilst attached to Stations on the standard roster.

The strength in the Sydney Fire District is to be increased in 1961, by 18 Station Officers and 59 Firemen, making a total of 116 recruits to reach the approved authorised strength.

There were no examinations for the rank of District Officer held during the year. Two examinations were held for the rank of Station Officer, with 40 members passing, and four Senior Fireman's examinations were held, 29 candidates being successful.

There have been no serious outbreaks of bush fires in the areas under the Board's jurisdiction during 1960.

A close liaison has been maintained with the Bush Fire Organisation which functions in areas outside the Board's boundaries under the Bush Fires Act.

District Officer V. A. Lowther, the Board's Officer-in-Charge, Bush Fire Organisation, is its representative on the Bush Fire Committee. He is also the Board's representative on the Blue Mountains, Lake Macquarie, Gosford, Wyong, Cessnock and Outer Sydney Fire Prevention Schemes and, as such, has attended several meetings of these Committees.

As a member of the Bush Fire Committee and a representative of the Fire Prevention Scheme Committees, several surveys of areas where access trails have been proposed, and in areas where they have been established, have been carried out.

A Bush Fire Training School was conducted at Heathcote by the Bush Fire Committee in 1960, at which the Board's Bush Fire Officer participated.

The Resident Country Inspectors have continued their duties of visiting and supervising the operations of Country Fire Brigades in their respective zones.

The Superintendent in charge of Country Administration, Mr. H. R. Barber, has visited and inspected Fire Stations in various country centres.

A State-wide Demonstration was held at Tweed Heads in October, 1960. Eighty-one (81) Brigades attended this Demonstration, indicating that the enthusiasm and efficiency of the Volunteer Fireme 1 is being maintained. The Demonstration was attended by the Chief Officer and Superintendents Barber and Guyer.

Special mention is made of the many letters of commendation and appreciation received from citizens and various organisations in recognition of the high standard of firemanship displayed at fires by members of the Brigade.

New Fire Stations have been completed at Barham, Dorrigo, Walgett, Wallerawang and Avalon and have been occupied by the Brigades concerned. Stations at Mascot, Pyrmont and Ryde have been re-opened as active Fire Stations.

Deputy Chief Officer D. R. Hawkins, Executive Officers H. W. Douglas, J. Jappy, Resident Country Inspectors A. Heasman, L. G. Thompson, District Officer J. Beale, Station Officers T. Nash, W. Williams, W. Hindle, J. Curran, B. Bain, D. Plumbe, T. Craig, T. Hynes, H. Sinclair, Senior Firemen B. Watters, C. Tucker and H. Crossingham retired from the service having reached retiring age.

Station Officers E. C. Byrne, D. Horne, R. Farmer, R. Westerway, Senior Firemen W. Horsington, E. Stanton, W. Fletcher, First Class Fireman H. N. McGilvray and Third Class Fireman K. Nisbet were retired on the grounds of physical incapacity.

The deaths of District Officer J. J. Richardson and Senior Fireman A. Harden are recorded with regret.

The Queen's Fire Service Medal was presented to Chief Officer H. W. Pye, Ex-Deputy Chief Officer D. R. Hawkins and Captain C. Forde by His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales in May, 1960.

New Fire Engines have been completed and installed at Wagga Wagga, Tamworth (Land Rovers), Sawtell, Moss Vale, Tweed Heads, Walgett, Muswellbrook (Bedford 350 G.P.M.), Garford Motor Appliances were replaced at Lake Cargelligo, Raymond Terrace and Coonabarabran.

No new Fire Engines were installed in the Metropolitan area.

#### FIRE ALARMS

There are now 659 street fire alarms installed in Sydney and Suburbs, and in the Country 299 telephone type and 123 mechanical type.

Following a survey, telephone fire alarms have been removed from Cessnock, Port Kembla, Wollongong, Bowral, Mittagong, Nowra, Lismore, Newcastle, Hamilton, Tighes Hill, Stockton, Waratah, New Lambton, Carrington, Wallsend, Boolaroo, Belmont, Toronto, West Wallsend, Ettalong, Maitland, Kurri Kurri, Weston, Abermain and Singleton.

Mechanical fire alarms have been removed from Katoomba and Richmond, whilst at Glen Innes, they have been replaced with telephone types.

#### INSPECTIONAL DUTIES

Inspectional duties associated with buildings coming within the purview of the Theatres and Public Halls Act, the Factories and Shops Act and the Height of Buildings Act, have been carried out by four Inspectional Officers specially detailed for these duties which are chiefly confined to the Sydney Fire District with periodical visits to the Newcastle and Wollongong areas. All plans for factories, theatres and public halls and buildings over 80 feet in height for the entire State are dealt with by these Officers.

Their duties have largely been extended in the Sydney Fire Area by various Councils seeking advice in relation to fire protection and means of escape in multi-storey residential development which is taking place in various suburbs around Sydney.

Similar inspectional duties in other districts are carried out by the Resident Country Inspectors and Resident Inspectors at Newcastle and Canberra.

#### LECTURES AND DRILLS

Lectures and drills have been given by the Board's Officers to the staffs of various firms and institutions. There has been a notable increase in the number of requests for this service.

#### RADIO TELEPHONES

The radio telephone system was being extended to Katoomba towards the end of 1959. All appliances in the Blue Mountains Fire District were finally completed in 1960.

The system was extended to include Newcastle (3 appliances), Hamilton, Tighes Hill, Waratah, Stockton, Wallsend and Belmont.

#### BUSH FIRE ORGANISATION

As a result of the bush fire risk having been reduced due to building activity in some areas, several Hose Box Posts have been withdrawn in the Metropolitan and Newcastle areas.

There are now 61 Hose Box Posts in the Metropolitan area, and 52 in the Newcastle, Illawarra, Blue Mountains, Leeton and Albury Fire Districts. The number of Auxiliary Firemen attached to these Posts is 857.

#### GENERAL

Concourse duty has been carried out at the Royal Agricultural Society Showground and at Sporting fixtures' etc., in accordance with the Board's policy.

New Fire Stations are being erected at Blacktown, Sutherland and Rydalmere, and the construction of a new station at Cabramatta will commence early in 1961 in addition to the erection of other stations in accordance with the Board's Building Programme.

#### COUNTRY FIRES

During the year 1960, there were 8,205 calls of fire given in Country Districts.
