

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

AUDITOR-GENERAL

ON

THE TREASURER'S STATEMENTS OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE OF THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND, AND OTHER MONEYS, FOR THE YEAR 1886.

(Under Act 33 Victoria No. 18.)

- 1. The Treasurer's Statements of his Receipts and Disbursements within the year 1886 were with the usual punctuality forwarded to me for audit on the 29th March. After examination certain emendations and corrections were suggested or required by letter of 8th of June, and the Abstracts, amended in the particulars pointed out, having been received back from the Treasury on the 27th of the same month, I have now the honor to lay the same before the Legislative Assembly, with the following Report and Explanatory Statements, as directed by section 38 of the Audit Act of 1870.
- 2. These Statements are substantially a reproduction, but in somewhat greater detail, of the Quarterly and Annual Accounts published in the Government Gazette, showing the progressive produce of the Public Revenue and the Expenditure of the same, the results, so far as the cash balances are concerned, being the same in both.
- 3. There being, however, nothing in these Accounts to show how far the public engagements have been met by the income of the year, it will, as on former occasions, be proper to state, as nearly as may be practicable, the relation between the Public Income, as given in these Cash Statements, and the Statutory charges upon it. This is all the more desirable as the balance on the Revenue portion of the Account has now reached so large a figure on the wrong side.

7. The appropriation of the estimated Revenue of 1886 not having been made until 25th October of that year, the Appropriation Act was anticipated by the usual monthly Temporary Supply Acts, nine in number, to the amount of £6,381,033, and the Public Works Loan Act, of corresponding date, was also anticipated by the same arrangement to the amount of £1,216,200. Of this latter amount, however, a payment of £1,999 14s. 2d. for Works at Lake Macquarie Harbour was not covered by the Loan Act, 50 Victoria, No. 28, and appears consequently as an advance out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund to be recovered out of a future Loan Appropriation.

8. The Supply Act, 49 Victoria, No. 4, also includes a second advance vote of £100,000 to the Treasurer, which is omitted from the General Appropriation Act, and was probably intended from that circumstance to be adjusted before the close of the year, and no doubt ought to have been so dealt with. A reference, however, to the Special Deposits Account, at page 101, will show that there was at 31st December a sum of £93,583 5s. only at the credit of the Treasurer's Advance Account, all of which, with £6,416 15s. in addition, was due to the Revenue at that date to replace the Advance Vote of 1885—£100,000.

A like omission occurs of the sum of £30,000, granted under the Supply Act, 49 Victoria, No. 3, for the service of 1885, as Fees to Licensed Surveyors.

- 9. As in 1885, the annual increases to the salaries of classified Officers under section 3 of the Civil Service Act for 1886, have been distributed throughout the various Departments where they occur. A separate vote (item No. 173 of the Appropriation Act of 1886) was taken for these increases in a lump sum of £66,500, but, the actual amount required being found to reach only £48,348 13s. 8d., the balance will of course be written off during the year. The detailed distribution of the vote is given in a Schedule to Appendix A.
- 10. By the Customs Duties Act of 1886, which came into force from the 7th April, certain additions were made to the Customs Tariff in three forms, the total produce of which has been calculated to be as follows, viz.:—

The apparent difference of increase in the total Customs collections for the years 1885 and 1886 is, however, only £308,616 13s., or, more correctly, deducting the Drawbacks and Refund of Duties from the respective years, £294,716 4s. 8d. These figures serve to show that but for the additional duties the Customs receipts for 1886 would have exhibited a decrease of (say) £70,828 11s. 9d.

- 11. The Stamp Duties Amendment Act of 1886 also changed to some extent the basis of taxation in the form of Stamp duties, but the precise effect of the change cannot readily be ascertained. The receipts, however, show an increase of £44,488 2s. 6d. in 1886 over the collections in 1885, the Act coming into force only on the 1st September, 1886. It may be proper to notice, in connection with this item of receipt, that in consequence of a large number of postage stamps being allowed to be used in lieu of duty stamps for stamping money acquittances a sum of £24,000 has for some years been annually credited to the Stamp Duties' Account by transfer from the head of postage as the estimated extent of the use made of postage stamps for stamp duty requirements.
- 12. It may be observed that the amount credited at page 17 as "Interest on Land conditionally purchased" is £129,968 4s. 5d. only, while the Collection of Instalments appears as £514,135 10s. 8d., but both these quotations are qualified by the fact that the annual instalments of 1s. per acre on the unpaid balances of the

Purchase Money represent both Principal and Interest, which could not be separated without very considerable inconvenience and expense. The amount shown as Interest only is mainly paid on early conditional purchases, not yet brought by the purchasers under the provisions of the Amended Land Acts.

13. The Postage Receipts show an apparent increase of £14,689 14s. 6d., but as large numbers of postage stamps are purchased or used for purposes of remittances, and large numbers are also employed on Public Service and paid for out of Votes of Parliament, the gross collections must be subjected to deductions in the above directions to arrive at the net sums contributed by the public at large to the Postal Revenue. A comparison of the receipts of the year 1886 with those of the previous year give the following results, viz.:—

14. The receipts "For work performed by Prisoners in Gaol," stated at page 19 as £4,649 8s. 6d., show apparently a very large reduction on the receipts of previous years. Under that head the

Upon inquiry it appears that these receipts are mainly drawn from the votes for Stationery and Stores; but the vote for 1886 having been exhausted otherwise by the close of the year, there were no means of meeting accrued claims to a large amount for work done in the respective gaols until further appropriations should be obtained in the following year.

15. Under "Miscellaneous Receipts" the amount shown as "Repayments to credit of Votes" is short by two sums repaid in December, on account of Issues from the Votes for the Volunteer Service of 1884 (£3,071 3s. 5d.) and 1885 (£2,620), in all £5,691 3s. 5d. These sums were improperly credited to the account of "Over Issues" in the Trust Fund Account, as they could not be required for reissue. This was pointed out to the Treasury, but the erroneous credit having already been published in the Gazette accounts of 4th January, my request for a correction in the Statements of Accounts for Parliament was not acceded to. The Revenue Account will consequently be deprived of this credit until the close of this year.

- 16. The mode of appropriating certain fines under section 128 of the Municipalities Act, 31 Victoria, No. 12, being rendered somewhat doubtful by the terms of the last clause of the section quoted, a reference was made to the Attorney-General for his advice. A copy of the case submitted, and of the opinion given by Mr. Attorney-General Foster, confirmatory of the practice followed since the Act came into force, will be found in Appendix C.
- 17. A contract was taken by the Department of Public Instruction late in the year for alterations to the building at Parramatta, which had been occupied as a Roman Catholic Orphan School, for the purpose of converting it into an Industrial School for Girls. The amount of the contract was £2,013, and towards that amount it had been proposed to utilize the votes of 1885 and 1886, of £500 each, for "Repairs for Roman Catholic Orphan School," but the Treasury demurred to that arrangement, and referred the matter for my decision, which was that the votes in question could not be diverted to a new service without the express sanction of Parliament.

The Department of Public Instruction, however, referred the matter to the Attorney-General, who gave his opinion to the effect that, under all the circumstances, the money could be expended as desired by the Minister for Education. (The papers are given in Appendix C.) The balance of the contract, £1,089 12s. 4d., was unprovided for, and was accordingly paid from the Treasurer's advance vote. It is observed, however, that no provision has been made on the Estimates to cover that balance, while a sum of £789 has been recently voted on the additional Estimates for 1887, for a further contract to that amount. This is one of the many cases which show how imperfectly the Estimates as submitted provide for known obligations.

- 18. The sums of £500 and £1,021, paid as compensation for loss and treatment of sheep in quarantine (Service of 1885, page 43), and the sum of £1,564 3s. 8d. for salaries and contingencies (paid out of Vote 608 of 1886, page 56), making together £3,085 3s. 8d., having been only temporarily paid from the Revenue Account, have now been transferred to the Sheep Account under Trust Fund.
- 19. The cost during the year of the Rabbit Extermination Service having, so far as paid, amounted to £86,014 18s. 5d., while the assessment under the Rabbit Nuisance Act contributed only £38,464 8s. 5d., a further debt of £45,814 16s. 3d. has been incurred to the Revenue, making now a total of £180,756 17s. 11d., repayable out of future assessments.
- 20. Among the sums embezzled by George Berner, late Chief Clerk in the Railway Department, were six deposits on tenders which, when applied for by the contractors on the completion of the works, had to be repaid to them, and the amount, in all £1,475, was paid under the authority of the Minister for Public Works out of the vote for the working expenses of the Railways. This unfortunate loss can hardly be legitimately classed as a "working expense," and should more properly have been covered by a separate vote, but as the Railway income must be considered in one way or other liable for it, as it is for compensations in the cases of accidents and for the value of goods lost in transit, &c., the result of making it a direct charge upon the general vote for management is practically the same as if specially voted. In another direction the same result is arrived at as the remainder of Berner's embezzlement, consisting of the value of certain season tickets, £522 5s. 7d., and a miscellaneous item of £15 paid to him, simply constituted a loss of income.

21. The unauthorized transfers of £275,000 from the Revenue to the Treasurer's Advance Vote, specified in my Report on the Accounts of 1885, were replaced to the Revenue Account on the 18th November. A Bill to indemnify the Colonial Treasurer, the officers of the Treasury, and other officers, in respect of their unauthorized action in this matter was introduced and read a first time in the Legislative Assembly on the 5th February last, but a change of Government having occurred the order for the second reading of the Bill was discharged on the 24th March. It is very much to be regretted that there is thus no recorded expression of opinion by Parliament as to the illegal action of the Treasury in laying hands upon the Public Revenue without Parliamentary sanction.

THE TRUST FUNDS ACCOUNT.

- 22. The transactions of the year have increased the total balance at the credit of the Trust Funds by the sum of £261,907 14s. 5d., being the net difference of increase and decrease under the various heads into which the Trust Fund Account is divided, and the details of which are given at pages 11 and 93. Many of these separate accounts are opened mainly for convenience, or to satisfy statutory requirements, and as may be seen by reference to the General Miscellaneous Receipts, page 20, portions of the balances are periodically claimed by the Revenue.
- 23. The larger half of the total balance or £1,393,925 4s. 1d. belonged to the Government Savings' Bank. Of that sum £385,666 13s. 11d. were invested in Debentures and Funded Stock, and for the remainder, while a floating balance, interest at 4 per cent. is paid by the Treasury under a specific appropriation annually taken on the Supplementary Estimates.
- 24. The Cash Receipts credited to the Civil Service Superannuation Account (page 86) were £90,495 10s. 7d., and exceeded the Disbursements within the year by £79,308 17s., thus increasing the Cash Balance of 1885 from £70,455 10s. 8d. to £149,764 7s. 8d.

From the Report of the Civil Service Board for 1886 it would appear that the annual rate of charge for 66 Pensions, sanctioned to the 31st December, was £5,620 5s. Sd., while gratuities under various sections of the Civil Service Act were paid at the Treasury to the amount of £5,426 8s. 11d. These figures show that the Account will admit of a very considerable addition to the Pension List before its amount can approach the, at present, large income derived from the 4 per cent. deductions from the salaries of Officers liable under the Act for that rate of contribution to the Superannuation Fund.

25. The Police Superannuation Fund, as assisted by the Police Reward Fund, has also an increase of £2,621 16s. 9d. in the cash balance at the close of the year, while the annual rate of charge for Pensions has been raised from £10,230 12s. 8d. to £11,361 14s. 4d.

THE TREASURER'S ADVANCE ACCOUNT.

26. The account of the Treasurer's Advance Votes is still in an unsatisfactory condition, notwithstanding that the illegal transactions connected with it, already referred to, have been disposed of by their transfer to the proper accounts, and that the Advance Votes of 1883 and 1884 have now been repaid to the Revenue. The Appropriation Act of 1886 afforded the means of also repaying the vote of £100,000

£100,000 for the emergencies of 1885, as well as the second advance of £100,000 taken under a temporary Supply Act for 1886. The balance at the 31st December amounted to only £93,583 5s., and is shown as at the credit of the Advance Account, while it was due to the Revenue, and ought to have been transferred to that Account before the year's accounts were closed.

27. It may be observed that the credits and recredits to this Account during the year are shown as reaching the very large sum of £1,248,937 17s. 3d., and the reissues as reaching to £1,192,976 18s. 10d. The first-named of those sums includes the recredit of £525,000, and the second includes the reissue to the Revenue Account of £525,000 in satisfaction of the Advance Votes of 1883 and 1884, and of the irregular drafts (£275,000) from the Revenue in 1885 and 1886. By this absurd operation the receipts and disbursements of the year on this Account are quite unnecessarily enlarged to the extent of £525,000, while there is nothing on the face of the accounts to show the extent of the Treasurer's liability for his Advance Votes.

The amount actually issued and unadjusted at 31st December was £206,416 15s., and consisted of—

respresents the three advances of £100,000 each voted to meet the emergencies of 1885 and 1886. The details of the above payments are given in Appendix D.

GENERAL LOANS ACCOUNT.

28. The General Loans Account, which was overdrawn at the close of 1885, was replenished during the year by the credit to it of the balance proceeds of the fifth Loan under the Inscribed Stock Act, and part proceeds of a sixth Loan of £5,500,000, negotiated in London in July, 1886, thereby converting the overdraft into a credit balance at Sydney of £2,299,639 7s. 10d. The whole proceeds of this last Loan having, however, been fully credited in London by the close of the year, the actual credit balance of this Account at Sydney and London on the 31st December was £3,782,454 15s., after allowing for payments there to same date for Loan Services, but not brought to account in Sydney until this year.

29. The additional issue of Inscribed Stock, to the amount of £5,500,000, in July realised in gross £5,247,692 2s., or at a rate of £95 8s. 3d. per cent. The charges for Bank commission, brokerages, and miscellaneous expenses, were £56,423 16s. 6d., and, with commutation of Stamp Duty, £34,375, reduced the proceeds to a net total of £5,156,893 5s. 6d., available for expenditure, and the rate per cent. of the principal to £93 15s. 3d., giving thus an interest-rate of

£3 14s. $7\frac{3}{4}$ d. instead of £3 10s., but, as it may be observed that in this case the Stock was inscribed with three months' accrued interest at date of negotiation, the annual interest rate should be quoted more correctly as £3 15s. $4\frac{1}{4}$ d. on net proceeds of £92 17s. 9d., showing an improvement of £2 18s. $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per cent. over the realized proceeds of the Loan of October, 1885.

The Fourth Report under the Inscribed Stock Act of 1883, 46 Victoria, No. 12, presented to Parliament in January last, explains the proceedings connected with the inscription of this sixth Loan.

- 30. A portion only of the Loan of July, 1886, having been brought to Account in Sydney, the whole of that Loan is omitted from the Statement of the Public Debt, as given at page 107, following the same course as in the previous year. As, however, the Loan began to bear interest from the 1st of April, and a half year's interest was actually paid thereupon in September, it cannot properly be excluded in reckoning the Public Debt at the close of the year.
- 31. The total outstanding debt at the close of 1885 was shown in that year's accounts to amount to £30,064,259 9 2 adding the further Loans of October, 1885 £5,500,000 0 0 July, 1886 5,500,000 0 0 £11,000,000 0 0

and allowing for the further reduction by £30,000 during 1886, of the million loan of 1867, and of £10 of the Interminable Debentures

the Public Debt at 31st December, 1886, became increased to £41,034,249 9 2 bearing an annual interest charge of £1,645,180 11s. 8d. from the 1st January, 1887.

32. So far as can be readily computed the above amount of outstanding Loans, together with the annual interest thereupon, is chargeable in the following proportions to the respective Services stated hereunder, viz.:—

33. The Public Works Loan Act of 1886, 50 Vic. No. 28, added £3,115,393 to the authorized charges upon the General Loans Account for Railways and other Public Works. The total amount of those charges as represented by unissued balances of Loan Service Appropriations at the close of the year was £15,984,213 19s. 11d. After crediting in full the net proceeds of the loan of July, and £14,485 2s. 3d., recovered from the Government of Victoria on account of the railway bridge at Albury, there remains a sum still to be raised of £12,108,196 4s. 4d. to cover authorized appropriations.

34. The Supply Act, 49 Vic. No. 2, provided £28,000 in anticipation of a Loan Vote as a further sum towards the "Railway—Albury to the Murray" apparently to relieve the Treasurer's Advance Vote of the charge upon it for the temporary defrayal of the half cost of the railway bridge at Albury recoverable from the Government of Victoria, and the vote was used for that purpose and otherwise in March, 1886. The same sum of £28,000 was again appropriated in the Loan Act of 1886 above quoted, without reference to the fact of its including the half cost of the bridge not chargeable to this Colony. The Act was passed on the 25th October, and the Government of Victoria repaid their moiety—£14,485 2s. 3d.*—in the following month, and the amount should have been credited direct to the General Loans Account as a surcharge on account of the erroneous appropriation, but it has been treated as an over-issue, and was accordingly placed in the Trust Fund, whence it has this year been transferred to the proper account.

35. In addition to the sums reported in 1884 and 1885, as improperly paid from the vote of £500,000 for "Alterations, Additions, &c., to Railway Stations," sundry other payments of a similar character have been disallowed in 1886 to the amount of £39,488 18s. 7d., making a total of £154,237 7s. 4d., for which the vote referred to was utilized by the Treasury contrary to the directions on the vouchers as forwarded by the Railway Department. The services so charged were as follow, namely:—

36. Provision having been made in the Loan Act of 1886 for all these services the whole of the above sums were transferred to the Account of that Act under their respective heads, (excepting £790 17s. 7d., disallowed in 1884, and which is in course of adjustment), and thus the General Loans Account appears twice charged for the same service without a corresponding credit. This requires to be explained. The Treasury having expended so much of the vote of £500,000 irregularly, was required to replace it, and taking advantage of the Account of "Over Issues,"—an account opened to prevent losses under Votes by accidental overcharges—credited that Account with the transfer, so that it might be available to meet proper charges for "Alterations, Additions, &c., to Stations" when presented, and the greater part of it had been so spent before the end of the year, but the transactions in the "Over Issues" Account Trust Fund not being detailed, the expenditure does not of course appear in that form.

In

^{*} The actual moiety of the cost of the permanent bridge was £16,259 19s. 6d., but the Government of Victoria having defrayed the whole cost of a temporary structure, one moiety thereof was payable by the Government of this Colony or £1,774 17s. 3d., making the net repayment £14,485 2s. 3d. as quoted.

In connection with this it may be of interest to state that out of the receipts and payments given under the "Over Issues" Account at page 101, the credits on account of "Alterations, &c., to Stations," in 1886, were £202,327 5s. 8d., and the reissues £201,014 12s. 10d., leaving a balance credit of £1,312 12s. 10d.

- 37. A branch line of railway having been constructed to the National Park from the railway line to Illawarra, which was not included in the plans laid before and approved by Parliament, the expense, so far as appeared in the Treasurer's Accounts, was disallowed, the amount being £519 5s. 7d. paid from the Loan Act, 44 Victoria No. 28, and £2,805 10s. 5d. from the Supply Act, 49 Victoria No. 5. This latter sum is now charged to the Loan Act of 1886—item "Towards completion of line Sydney to Wollongong and Kiama, £666,000," which sum, I am informed, includes £5,100 for the branch to the National Park, although it is not shown in the appropriation.
- 38. The partial cost of the temporary Water Supply which was paid in 1885, (£45,000) and disallowed as against the vote for the permanent works, has with later payments for the same service been legalized by the addition of the words "inclusive of cost of temporary supply," to the additional vote for the Sydney Water Supply Works taken under the new Loan Act. It is however uncertain whether or not the whole cost of the temporary Water Supply is intended to remain a charge upon the Loans Account. The amount is ascertained to be £75,894 15s. 5d.
- 39. It may be noticed that the appropriation of £300,000 by the last Loan Act for the "purchase of railway stores" appears paid in full, but, as in former appropriations of a like kind, it has been simply transferred to the "Railway Stores Account," under Trust Fund, as part of the capital, now with this addition, amounting to £600,000, employed as a basis for the operations upon it. The cash balance at the credit of the Account at the close of the year was £176,603 19s. 5d., the difference between that balance and the total capital, or £423,396 0s. 7d., represents nominally the value of the stores on hand; but as the operations on the Account recorded at the Railway Department and at the Treasury do not run on parallel lines, the cash balances and the estimated value of the stores at any one date of stocktaking cannot agree. An effort is being made, however, to reconcile the balances, with a view to their becoming in future more nearly in accord with each other.
- 40. The "Railway Stores Account" and the Loan Fund transactions, included now in "Over Issues," might with advantage be hereafter separated from the Trust Account and made appendices to the General Loans Account, in order that a better view might be thus obtained of the whole operations upon the Loans Fund than is now possible.

THE RAILWAY RECEIPTS.

The larger portion of that decrease, however, arises from the receipts for work done, and paid for out of votes of Parliament and other sources, having been reduced from £177,125 1s. in 1885 to £98,432 2s. 1d. in 1886, a difference of £78,692 18s. 11d. Allowing for this diminution of special receipts, the decrease of income from the ordinary tolls for public traffic in 1886 is reduced to £35,905 5s. 6d. The Tramway receipts on the other hand show an increase of £9,550 0s. 8d., which is not subject to a like correction.

42. The amounts collected by the Railway Department for work done and chargeable to various services are set forth in Appendix E. The following table shows the relations of these special collections to the total credit for Railway earnings and also the net income contributed directly by the public towards the working expenses of the Railways during the past four years:—

43. The inspection of the Railway Traffic Accounts at the several stations along all lines has been continued by the staff of inspectors attached to this Department with good results. The report furnished to me by the Inspecting Officer-in-Charge upon the work of the year gives full details of the very numerous points which the several inspectors found necessary to bring under notice for instructions as to queries for papers in explanation, or for authorities in support of action by the Railway officers. The questions raised were very much of the same nature as those noticed in my report upon the Accounts of 1885 and in the Appendix H thereto.

The Inspector's report for 1886 shows that the number of stations inspected was 219. In the majority of cases the results were more or less satisfactory, while in about forty the results were not of that character. To some of these it was considered advisable to direct the attention of the Commissioner, whose prompt action in some of the cases reported had more or less of the desired effect, as appeared in subsequent inspections.

- 44. In cleven instances the authority of the Governor and Executive Council was obtained in satisfaction of queries upon rates levied but not contained in the authorized published scales, while in some thirty cases of like variations no replies have yet been received to inquiries for authorities. The like authority was supplied for the relief of the Commissioner from surcharge in seven instances (details in Appendix J), but for fourteen other small sums, in all £103 14s. 10d., of a similar kind, the surcharges still remain unsatisfied.
- 45. Old outstanding claims for freight, to the amount of £7,047 15s. 1d., are still under query. As no reply has been supplied to many repeated queries on some of the items, and as the nature of the replies, where such have been given indicate difficulties in settlement, it seems probable that little of this sum will be recovered. In addition to these an old claim for £220 9s. 3d. was lost by the operation of the Statute of Limitations.

- 58. The following cases of default have come under notice during the year,

 Mr. W. Forbes, Warden's Clerk, Barmedman, embezzled £43 7s. 6d; tried, and sentenced to eight months' imprisonment.
 - Mr. Theo. Horton, Land Agent, Young, was convicted of embezzling £2,678 7s. 4d., and sentenced to seven years' imprisonment.
 - Mr. Colin Cooper, Railway Goods Clerk, Glen Innes, embezzled £651 9s. 8d., and on trial was sentenced to five years' imprisonment.
 - Mr. George Berner, Chief Clerk, Department of Railways, embezzled £2,012 5s. 7d.; was tried and sentenced to ten years' imprisonment.
 - Mr. E. V. Gamble, Goods Clerk, Narrandera, embezzled £73 17s. 2d. Action not known.
- 59. Subject to the foregoing remarks, and to the advances to Public Officers and others being adjusted in accordance with the heads of service to which they have been charged, I consider that the Statements of Accounts now submitted, correctly represent the Treasurer's Receipts and Disbursements within the year 1886. In their present form, however, and until the annual appropriations be made for the payments falling within each year without respect to date of service, these annual statements will not fully satisfy the intention of the 22nd section of the Audit Act, nor afford such an Account of the Income and Expenditure of the Colony as to be easily intelligible to the public at large.

APPENDIX C.

Opinions of Attorney-General.

(No. 1.)

Mode of Appropriating Fines under section 128 of the Municipalities Act, 31 Vict. No. 12.

Case for the opinion of the Honorable the Attorney-General.

CERTAIN fines imposed at the Courts of Petty Sessions at Newtown and Redfern under section 23 of the Act 2 Victoria No. 2 have been usually appropriated, one half to Police Reward Fund, and the other moiety to the borough in which the offence was committed.

It is contended that the 128th section of the Municipalities Act 31 Victoria No. 12 limits such

appropriation to cases confined to the specific enactments quoted in the margin of said section.

On the other hand, the practice has been based upon the terms of the latter portion of the 128th section 31 Victoria, No 12, namely: - "And so much of all fines fees and sums of money which by reason of the operation of the said Acts or either of them in for or in respect of any municipality shall be payable by any person as would if this Act had not been passed be paid into the Consolidated Revenue shall belong to the said municipality and shall be paid to the Treasurer or other proper officer of such municipality for the general purposes thereof.

Similar procedure as to appropriation of fines under 4 Wm. IV No. 7 and 17 Victoria No. 31, in reference to Sunday trading and riotous conduct, is also objected to on similar grounds, that the Act 31

Victoria No. 12 gives the municipalities no claim to moieties of fines under the Acts quoted.

The Auditor-General respectfully requests the opinion of the Honorable the Attorney-General as to the legal disposal of the fines in question.

Copy Opinion.

Ir appears to me that the advice asked is substantially whether the concluding part of 31 Vic. No. 12 is to be acted upon or not. It is therein accurately stated what fines, fees, and sums of money are to belong to each municipality, and it ought not to be necessary for me to transcribe the words. It must be fines, or fees, or sums of money, which by reason of the operation of 2 Vic. No. 2, 11 Vic. No. 44, 19 Vic. No. 10, and 17 Vic. No. 25, in, for, or in respect of any municipality are payable by any person, and it is restricted to such part of them as would, but for the Municipalities Act, be payable to the Consolidated Revenue.

No fees or fines, except those payable by reason of the operation of these Acts in the municipality in question (or for or in respect thereof) are affected by this Act.

Diversion of Votes for a specific service to meet a contract for a new work not in the voted Estimates of Expenditure.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, PARRAMATTA.

Minute for the Auditor-General.

Treasury, No. 392, 10 November, 1886.

THE Accountant of the Treasury informs me that under your decision of years past, constantly acted upon by us, an Annual Vote lapses at the end of the year for which voted, unless some contract has been taken.

A contention has arisen between the Treasury and the Department of Public Instruction in reference to the Annual Vote of 1885, "Repairs for Roman Catholic Orphan School, £500." The Minister desires to use this vote for a contract now taken or about to be taken, and relies upon the following words in the 15th section of the Appropriation Act of 1885 :- "No appropriation included in this Act shall lapse until the 31st day of December, 1886."

The decision of the Auditor-General is specially requested in this case, all the particulars of which

are set forth in the enclosed paper, Treasury number 8,141, of 14th ultimo. The Auditor-General, B.C.

Department of Audit, B.C., 8 November, 1886. THE 15th clause of the Appropriation Act was introduced to prevent the lapsing of votes for new works, when those votes were taken so late in the year as not to allow time for contracts to be entered into before its close.

Annual Votes of the class in which the vote of £500 referred to is included, are obviously not of the nature of new services, and when not expended are not entitled to be added to the corresponding votes of the following year, and thus make the expenditure double what was really provided by Parliament,

for the year's requirements.

Apart from this, however, the vote of £500 desired to be utilized, was expressly granted for "Repairs to the Parramatta Roman Catholic Orphan School," but as there is no longer such an Institution, and no contract has been entered into for such repairs prior to the abolition of that Institution, it is clear that neither the vote for 1885, nor the corresponding one of £500 for 1886, is available for the proposed purpose, without the express sanction of Parliament.

Copy Opinion.

I AM inclined to think, though the question is not free from doubt, that the sum mentioned of £500 may

be legally applied for the payment of this work.

The idea that this is not now the Parramatta Roman Catholic Orphan School, and that therefore the money cannot be applied for it, is, I think, an erroneous one. The term is clearly only one applied for the purpose of designating the particular locality or building upon which the money is to be expended.

The other question, as to whether the money, being for a new work, can be expended, is a more difficult one, but, under all the circumstances, I think it comes within the wording and protection of the Appropriation Act, and that the money can therefore be expended as desired by the Minister for Education. Legality of the collection of Railway Tolls fixed on the authority of a single Minister of the Crown.

Sir, I have the honor to enclose a case for the opinion of the Attorney General, as to the legality of levying railway tolls fixed otherwise than by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, as prescribed by the 100th section of the Railways Act, 22 Vic. No. 19.

Case for Opinion.

UNDER the 100th section of the Railways Act, 22 Vic. No. 19, the Governor and Executive Council fixed (among others) the rates of tolls to be charged for "excursion tickets," and fixed also the days on which such tickets were to be issued. The Commissioner for Railways issued excursion tickets on other special days, and at rates differing from those fixed by the Governor and Executive Council. Admitting the irregularity, the Commissioner sought and obtained from the Governor and Executive Council (minute No. 87/17, dated 28 Feb., 1887) an authority for "the Secretary for Public Works to issue special passenger tickets on the various lines of Government railways when necessary.'

It is held to be incompetent for the Governor and Executive Council to delegate their special functions, under the 100th section of the Act, 22 Vic. No. 19, of fixing rates of tolls to any single Minister of the Crown, or to the Commissioner for Railways, and that consequently any rates so fixed, which may differ from those published in accordance with sections 102 and 103 of the same Act cannot be legally

collected.

Précis.

Power of the Minister for Works to fix rates for Excursion Tickets on Railways at his discretion.

By Coaching-rate Pamphlet, dated 1st Jan., 1884, in force at the time the cases herein referred to occurred, and sanctioned by the Governor and Executive Council, under section 100 of the Railway Act, 22 Vic. No. 19, pages 6 to 17, certain excursion rates are fixed to be charged on the railways of the Colony for distances up to 600 miles.

At page 28 of same pamphlet a regulation is inserted limiting and defining the occasions as to day

and train on which these excursion rates shall be charged.

In October, 1885, the Auditor-General called for papers in support of a credit of 15s. 6d. at Goulburn, upon receipt of which it was found to be a refund based upon the issue of an excursion ticket on a day other than those named in the regulations.

The Auditor-General replied, asking the Commissioner for Railways under what authority excursion rates were taken on days other than those named in the regulations issued under the sanction of the

Executive Council.

In reply, the Commissioner forwarded an authority of the Governor and Executive Council, just obtained by him, empowering the Secretary for Public Works to issue tickets at excursion rates at his discretion on the railways of the Colony.

This authority was accepted by the Auditor-General as simply relaxing the regulation before referred to (which restricted the issue of tickets at the excursion rates named in the pamphlet), and

allowing the Minister to apply those rates on other occasions, as he might see fit.

In the meantime other questions had been raised by the Auditor-General as to rates charged, viz.:-

Query 910.—Rate of 12/-, 1st special fare, Sydney to Windsor Races.

948.—Rate of 8/-, 1st excursion 947.—Rate of 4/- and 2/-, 1st and 2nd class fares, Sydney to Liverpool.

all of which were special rates not to be found in the scale of fares fixed by the Governor and Executive Council, and the Commissioner was requested to obtain Executive sanction for such rates.

In reply, the Commissioner referred the Auditor-General to the general authority recently obtained from the Executive (and herein already referred to) as authority for the Minister to fix these special charges. The

The Auditor-General replied that the authority referred to manifestly only applied to the occasions on which the Minister might at his discretion issue tickets at the excursion rates fixed by the Executive, and could not give the Minister power to vary the rates fixed by the Executive under the 100th section of the Railway Act. Executive authority was again asked for for the rates objected to.

The Commissioner then minuted, on 23/8/86, that as the papers upon which the authority was obtained contained instances in which excursion fares had been charged, not only at rate-sheet rates, but at rates both above and below those rates, and as it was authority for the continuance of this practice which was asked for and obtained, he saw no reason for again seeking Executive authority.

The Minister for Works concurred in this view, and the papers were again returned to the Auditor-General.

The Auditor-General replied that the effect of such a reading of the Executive Council's minute would be to give the Minister power to fix what rates he pleased for excursion fares, which, it was contended, could hardly have been the intention in view of the 100th section of the Act, which expressly provides that the charges to be made are only such as "may from time to time be determined upon by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council." Secs. 102 and 103 were also referred to. The Commissioner was informed that the authority quoted could not be read as conveying a liberty which it would appear it could not legally confer.

Upon reconsideration by the Commissioner it was admitted that the authority referred to did not (as the Commissioner intended it should) confer authority for the Minister to vary the rates fixed by the Executive, and a fresh minute was prepared asking for a general authority for the Minister for Works to fix special excursion rates at his discretion. By an oversight the power was obtained in the name of the Commissioner for Railways, but upon this being pointed out by the Auditor-General a fresh Order-in-Council was obtained conferring the power upon the Minister for Public Works, and the previous order cancelled.

It is contended by the Auditor-General that, under the 100th section of the Act 22 Vic. No. 19, the power of fixing all rates of tolls chargeable on the railways is vested solely in the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and that therefore it is not competent for that body to delegate to the Minister for Works a general power to fix rates on certain or any occasions.

Copy Opinion.

ALL tolls or rates of passage-money must be fixed by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council, s. 100, and can only be legally collected when, having been so fixed, they are duly posted up, ss. 101, 102. The amounts must be fixed by the Governor and Executive Council in each case, and this power cannot be deputed.

I am not prepared to say that, if excursion rates are duly fixed, it might not be left to the Minister, or even to the Commissioner, to say when he would run an excursion train, but no Minister or Commissioner can legally determine the rates themselves.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th ultimo, intimating that you have taken the opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown as to the validity of the authority exercised by the Governor and Executive Council in delegating to the Minister for Public Works the power to issue excursion and special tickets at special rates fixed by himself; that such delegation has been pronounced to be illegal and inoperative; that it will therefore be necessary to obtain Executive authority for all rates which have been charged under this arrangement outside the formally authorized rates; and that you must not be understood to challenge the Executive minute of 4/5/86, which confers on the Minister the power to fix the occasions upon which excursion tickets shall be issued.

In reply, I have to inform you that I see no reason to question the interpretation placed by the Attorney-General on sections 101 and 102 of the Railway Act, as contained in his opinion, copy of which you have enclosed.

It is, however, absolutely necessary that some other measure should be adopted to obviate the inconvenience arising from a strict interpretation of the Act, which requires that Executive authority shall be obtained before any charges are levied.

Occasions frequently occur when the delay incidental to a strict compliance with the requirements of the Act in this regard would be fatal to the objects sought to be attained, and valuable traffic might be lost to the Department.

With a view to meet the difficulty, and at the same time avoid too frequent applications for authority, I propose, with your concurrence, to continue the present practice of issuing excursion and special tickets on the authority of the Minister, and periodically—say every three months, or oftener, if you would prefer it—to obtain Executive authority for all such departures from the sanctioned rates.

Executive authority will be obtained immediately for the special rates which have been charged in virtue of the minute which has been pronounced to be inoperative.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 24th June, 1887, having reference to the necessity of special and excursion fares for collection on the railways of the Colony being fixed by the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council, and inviting my concurrence in an arrangement whereby an ex post facto authority for all such rates should be recognized as sufficient.

In

In reply thereto, I am compelled to say at once that I could not possibly agree to a proposal which sets at naught the specific provisions of an Act of Parliament, and which, I feel sure, if submitted to the Crown Law Officers, would only elicit a repetition of the opinion already given.

It does not appear to me, however, that practically such great inconveniences would arise as are foreshadowed in your letter, as occasions must be few and far between on which other than excursion rates would need to be published to secure special traffic, and as authority is already given for the application of excursion rates to special occasions not noted in the rate-sheet. Moreover, any special occasion for which extra traffic might be secured in the way supposed must surely be known in sufficient time to make provision for it; and, besides, the scales of rates that might be applicable to such cases cannot be so very numerous or varied as to preclude the possibility of framing a scale to be authorized by the Executive for use as the Minister may direct, under the authority already given for occasions.
