### TWENTY-THIRD - ANNUAL- REPORT

OF THE

## AUDITOR-GENERAL

#### BEING ON

#### THE TREASURER'S STATEMENTS OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDI-TURE OF THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND, AND OTHER MONEYS, FOR THE YEAR 1893.

#### (Under Act 33 Victoria No. 18.)

1. The accompanying Statements of the Treasurer's Receipts and Payments during the year 1893 were received for examination on the 29th March, were returned for correction and suggested amendments on the 7th June, and were received back from the Treasury on the 16th July, but only partially corrected and amended as desired; some, if not all, of the points of difference will be indicated further on. I have now the honor to submit to the Legislative Assembly, as directed by the 38th section of the Audit Act of 1870, with the Treasurer's Statements, the following Report and explanations thereupon, so far as they refer to Receipts and Payments within the year 1893.

#### GENERAL STATE OF THE BALANCES.

2. The operations during the year 1893 upon the General Public Account of the Colony show the following gross results :—

The transactions in London from the 20th November to 31st December show, after allowing for unadjusted items of 1891 and 1892, £1,062 10s., a net balance credit of £201,963 2s. 6d., which has been brought to account during the current year.

3. The operations on the Public Account of the Colony, as kept in London at the Bank of England and the London and Westminster Bank, are of considerable magnitude, but while they are sooner or later embodied in the Colonial Treasurer's Public Account, as kept at Sydney, there has not of late years appeared among the Annual Accounts any separate statement of the Receipts and Disbursements in London. Inquiries on the subject having been made from time to time, I have considered it desirable on this occasion to supplement the Treasurer's Abstracts by a detailed account of the London transactions transferred to the Sydney Public Account during 1893 and of those that remained untransferred at 31st December last. [*Vide* Appendix B.]

5. The foregoing statement, while agreeing in the resulting general balance with that of the Treasury, differs in the gross totals of Receipts and Payments, by the omission of certain transfers in connection with the "Sundry Deposits" Trust Fund Account to the amount of  $\pounds 89,231$  6s. 9d., those transfers having been disallowed as will be explained further on.

6. A further deduction has been made from the gross receipts and disbursements of £200,000, being the amount of the Treasurer's Advance Vote for 1893 transferred *in globo* from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Trust Fund and the expenditure expenditure from the latter fund of a like amount that expenditure being at the same time treated as direct from the Revenue Account. This arrangement is necessitated through irregular action by the Treasury which will more properly fall to be explained when treating of the Treasurer's Advance Vote.

7. The transactions also in connection with Treasury Notes issued under the "Current Account Depositors Act of 1893" were of such a nature that they could hardly be classed as part of the Public Revenue and Expenditure, and so far as appears the provisions of clause 5 have not been called into operation. Moreover there is no provision for crediting the value of the Treasury Notes to the Public Account, nor the money received in redemption of advances on Bank Certificates of indebtedness to creditors; nor, again, for charging to the Public Account either the advances made in Treasury Notes or the application to the withdrawal of such notes of the moneys paid for the redemption of the Certificates. The transactions have been embodied nevertheless in the Treasurer's Statements, and in such a way as to involve the amounts being stated virtually twice over.

8. The Act quoted above authorised the issue of Treasury Notes to the amount of £2,000,000. From returns furnished by the Government Printer it appears that 254,540 notes, to the face value in all of £1,085,132, were printed, of which there were issued to the Treasury a nominal value of £367,000 only, but of these notes £8,500 worth were afterwards destroyed by fire along with the balance of unissued notes which remained in the hands of the Government Printer. The balance actually used represented therefore a nominal value of £358,500, the full extent to which advantage was taken by the public of the Act in question.

9. The first issue of the Treasury Notes was made on the 29th May, and the date of the last issue was the 11th August, 1893, the whole issue representing advances on certificates of indebtedness issued to their creditors in terms of clauses 2 and 3 of the Act 56 Victoria No. 17 by the following Banks, viz. :--

10. Those notes, however, on their issue represented no money as received by the Treasury, and only did so upon the repayment of the advances, made through their means by the recipients thereof. Such repayments were all made between the 20th of June and the 24th November, and, as it has happened they covered the whole amount of the nominal value of the notes issued, but as the repayments so received were only partially made in Treasury Notes, there remained at 31st December a sum of £12,054,\* representing the amount of notes in circulation at that date—the balance of £346,446 having been applied in the withdrawal to that extent of the original issue.

\* Reduced at this date to £1,171, it remains to be seen whether any portion of that balance will require to be issued in gold for redemption of Treasury Notes after five years' circulation as a legal tender under section 7. 33-U 11. The separate account presented by the Treasurer, and as given at page 51, shows the whole of the money transactions in connection with the "Current Account Depositors Act of 1893." But the wording of the entry on the debit side of that account, describing the receipts as a "transfer from the Consolidated Revenue Fund," is incorrect, as the money applicable to the withdrawal of the Treasury Notes was received direct from the parties who had obtained them, and moreover the entry is unsupported by any corresponding one of a transfer to this separate account.

12. The entries of £358,500 as "Other Payments" and of £358,500 as "Advances Repaid" are considered to be surplusage. They are not apparently justified by the terms of the Act under which they are claimed to be made, and thus only swell unnecessarily the total Receipts and Disbursements in the account of the Revenue. They are, therefore, with the disallowances above mentioned, excluded from the General Statement of the transactions in the Public Account.

#### THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND ACCOUNT.

13. The contributions to the Consolidated Revenue Fund income during the year consisted of :---

14. The income from "Receipts for Services rendered," given above as  $\pounds 4,415,786$  19s. 7d., includes among others the following sums paid from the Treasurer's Advance Vote :—

These payments to the Revenue were of course made in anticipation of Votes, but the effect of the operation is that the Revenue has got undue credit in 1893 for moneys which were not legitimately payable to it until the requisite Votes were taken in 1894. The Expenditure for 1894 will consequently be deprived of the usual set-off to the amount of those anticipated Votes. A similar irregular action occurred in 1887 in connection with the cost of Telegraphic Messages on Public Service (vide paragraph 29 of Report on Accounts of 1887).

15. Another irregularity occurred in connection with the conveyance of the unemployed. The amount voted for the service was £1,500 only, but this being far too limited a provision, sums recovered from the passengers were credited to Special Deposits Trust Fund as for "Government Labour Bureau," and were drawn upon to pay for new fares. The amount of such recoveries credited in 1893 was £2,621 2s. 5d., and with a balance from 1892 of £920 12s. 1d. = £3,541 14s. 6d. Out of this sum there were expended improperly for new fares £1,517 14s. 11d., leaving a balance in the Trust Fund of £2,023 19s.7d. The effect of that procedure is that the cost of conveyance of the unemployed in 1893 appears as limited by the Vote of £1,500, while the recoveries, £3,541 14s. 6d., are omitted from the Revenue, and misplaced to the Trust Fund. On representation the Trust Fund Account in question has now been closed, and the balance at credit transferred to the Revenue this year.

16. In consequence of Postage Stamps being largely used for Duty Stamps in stamping receipts, a quarterly transfer is made from Collections for Postage to the Stamp Duties Account of  $\pounds 6,000 = \pounds 24,000$  per annum. By a recent arrangement prepaid telegrams are stamped with Postage Stamps, the effect of which is that a large proportion of the Revenue derived from "Telegraphic Messages" appears as "Postage." To meet this diversion, the General Post Office Department has estimated that the apparent loss of the collections for Telegraphic Messages requires a quarterly adjustment of  $\pounds 30,000 = \pounds 120,000$  per annum. The Treasury has assented to this adjustment, and the first transfer was made accordingly of  $\pounds 30,000$  for the last quarter of the year on the 30th December.

17. On the other hand, the Railway Commissioners complained of the loss of Receipts in their Parcels Conveyance Enterprise by the introduction in October, 1893, of the Parcels Post by the General Post Office Department, and claimed one-half of the Parcels Post Receipts. From notes taken it was computed that those Receipts produced to the Post Office about £10,000 per annum, and one-third of that amount was offered to and accepted by the Railway Commissioners as an interim arrangement. The present rate agreed upon is £3,500, but no actual adjustment has been made until this year.

18. In regard to the Expenditure, also, two transfers have been made to the Trust Fund under the head of "Special Deposits," one of £17,449 19s. 10d., and the other of £14,325. These amounts appear as expended among the disbursements from

from the Revenue, but the greater portion remained unissued from the Public Account at the close of the year. The heads of service under which they stand as paid are :—

These transfers have been disallowed as having been made contrary to the express directions of the Audit Act, and for other reasons. The grounds for such disallowance in respect to the first transfer are fully explained in letter to the Treasury, dated 1st November, 1893, which will be found in Appendix C.

19. The second transfer is, moreover, opposed to the provisions of the Million Loan Act of 1867, as quoted above, and forms part of a procedure by the Treasury in connection with that Act to which exception has again and again been taken by this Department and been referred to in former Reports. The whole provision of  $\pounds70,000$  per annum by the Act 31 Victoria No. 11 was to be applied to the interest and extinction of the Million Loan authorised by it. Upon forwarding to the Treasury a copy of the statement as to the condition of that account, which is given in my last Report, page 196, the Treasury replied that all the balances shown in that Statement up to the year 1890 had been written off, with the addition of the extraordinary statement that to save the balance of 1891, £14,325, from being written off likewise, it was transferred to the Trust Fund for expenditure therefrom when required.

20. A long correspondence has taken place with the Treasury on the general subject of their methods of dealing with the provisions of the Act, 31 Victoria, No. 11, which appear to me to have involved not only a loss to the Revenue but also a failure to keep faith with the lenders. As the Treasury have declined to accede to my views on the matter, I have considered it desirable to append the whole of the correspondence to this Report, to which special attention is requested. [Appendix D.]

21. The amount of this second transfer remained unexpended at the close of the year, and also £5,429 Ss. Sd. of the first—making in all £19,754 Ss. Sd., which in the foregoing figures will be found to have been deducted from the Revenue Expenditure—the difference of £12,020 11s. 2d. being treated as so far a correction of the erroneous transfer to the Trust Fund, and placed as expended from the Revenue—the Trust Fund entries being reduced by the whole amount of the original improper credits, viz., £31,774 19s. 10d.

22. Another irregularity affecting the Revenue occurred in the refunds of certain Pilotage and Harbour and Light dues contrary to the Navigation Act of 1871. Masters of vessels, unless in possession of certificates exempting them from employing

employing a pilot, are required, under a penalty of £20, to obtain the services of a pilot into and out of port, and to pay in full the prescribed rates of pilotage. In cases of distress, or of coming into port for repairs, half rates only are chargeable in and out. The "Chiltonford," on a voyage from Cape Colony to Newcastle, put into Sydney under stress of weather and to obtain a tug. The master, not being exempt, took a pilot into port, and as a case of distress, paid half-rates, £18 6s. 2d. as inward pilotage, and £18 6s. 2d. as outward pilotage, but left the port in tow without obtaining the services of a pilot, incurring thus a penalty of £20. Nevertheless, the Collector of Customs recommended the refund of the outward pilotage, and obtained the concurrence of the Treasurer.

23. Upon the refund vouchers being sent for verification of the credit of  $\pounds 18$  6s. 2d., objection was taken by me that the proposed refund was illegal. This view was confirmed by the Crown Solicitor who, however, expressed an opinion that "a remission of this kind will require Executive sanction." An Executive Council Minute was obtained, and on that authority the refund was made. Feeling assured that the authority so given was *ultra vires*, the Treasurer was again written to on the subject, and after reference by the Treasurer to the Attorney-General, that officer, in his opinion upon the whole case, strongly emphasised the original objections to the refund being made without the sanction of Parliament. The last communication from the Treasury on the subject is to the effect that a sum is to be placed on the Supplementary Estimates to cover this £18 6s. 2d., and another sum of £5 3s. for a similar illegal refund of Harbour and Light Dues paid by the "Alexander Newton."

24. In the same connection a question of the remission of half-pilotage to the s.s. "Duke of Devonshire," which vessel called at Newcastle not for trade but to fill her bunkers only, was argued to be justifiable as a case of distress. The correspondence explanatory of these cases is instructive, and is appended for record and information. [*Vide Appendix* E.]

25. Since the year 1887, the annual expense for the general interest on the Public Debt has always been shown as a current year's charge. In the accounts now under review, it may be observed that a portion of that interest to an amount of £280,912 has been classed as an arrear of 1892. The sum represents a payment in London in September, 1892, and ought to have been included in the Treasurer's Statement for that year, but as the London accounts were adjusted only to 31st August, instead of as usual to 30th September or 31st October, the charge for interest in 1892 was so much less than it ought to have appeared, and thus the account of 1893 is over-burdened with the omission. It is, however, accounted for in the statement of unadjusted London accounts given at page 145 of my report on the accounts for 1892, but the omission affects the Treasurer's balances for 1892 and 1893, and so far prevents a fair comparison being made of the annual results.

26. It has already been abundantly shown that nothing whatever is gained by classifying expenditure as for arrears and current services, and until measures be taken to do away with such distinctions and to establish some uniform and intelligible principle on which they are to be prepared the Annual Statements of the Public Accounts will always be subject to a variety of readings.

27. The excess of disbursements over available income at Sydney on 31st December is stated above as £1,975,262 9s. 7d., but that statement does not of itself show the whole position of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and as a similar line in former reports has not been fully understood, it may be proper on this occasion to explain it. The statement of the receipts and disbursements to which the balance of £1,975,262 9s. 7d. is a sequel, as respects the Treasury Account at Sydney, is designed to show the condition of the cash account only, at the close of the year, irrespective of the temporary credit obtained from the Trust Funds by the issue to those funds of Treasury Deficiency Bills, but also allowing credit for the temporary issues, which are assumed to be recoverable in full. By that process the exact liability of the Revenue as a cash account only is shown, or, in other words, had the account closed at 31st December last the cash overdraft would have represented the whole deficiency of the Revenue, and may be stated thus :—

28. The appropriation of the Revenue, however, not having been made on a cash basis but on Finance Statements framed on varying principles, there has arisen another deficiency balance over and above the cash overdraft. That deficiency may be

be termed the Finance Deficiency as distinguished from the Cash Overdraft, and is made up of Votes and balances of Votes for the current and past years which remained alive for expenditure at the 31st December, but for which by reason of the cash overdraft there remained no funds.

There results a deficiency in cash and undischarged obligations of £3,713,731 18 10

29. The finance deficiency may possibly be reduced by the lapsing of a further amount of Votes in excess of requirements, but that contingency will probably be more than covered by Supplementary Votes required to adjust the Treasurer's Advance Account, and for other outstanding claims. An inspection of the details of the Treasurer's Advance Account [*vide Appendix* F] will serve to show that in many instances the Estimates of Expenditure must have been from some cause very imperfectly framed.

30. There still remain to be credited in reduction of the deficiency two items reported in last year's accounts, viz. :—

If reference be made to page 13 there will be found a credit of £18,607 14s. 10d. as for accrued interest on Treasury Bills sold in London. It is remarkable that the same principle of crediting the Revenue, and correctly, with the amounts received from the lenders as accrued interest in the case of the Treasury Bills should not be followed in the case of the moneys received for Inscribed Stock, which likewise include accrued interest. This is more remarkable from the fact that sales of Inscribed Stock (or Funded Stock) in the Colony are only made to bear interest from the date of sale.

31. But the fact that the Revenue actually pays the interest which has been received and credited as money raised for Loan Services ought to be conclusive as to the propriety of debiting the Loan Account with repayment to the Revenue of sums

so received. In another view of the matter the Revenue has been overcharged with the payment of interest for all the period during which it has been paid prior to actual receipt of the Loan money on which the interest accrued. In accordance with this view a surcharge is in course of preparation for recovery of the accrued interest erroneously credited as proceeds of Loans.

32. In further reduction of the general liability, the cost of premiums on the purchase of debentures under the Million Loan Act of 1867 should be taken credit for as surplus Votes, the amount being as stated elsewhere—£18,816 7s. [*Vide Appendix* D.]

33. The large dimensions of both the cash overdraft and the finance deficiency have suggested the preparation of a Return for the last seven years, showing for each year :---

- 1. The net amount of Revenue available for Appropriation to the Public Service;
- 2. The Statutory and Primary Liabilities thereupon;
- 3. The Liabilities under the Annual Appropriation Acts;
- 4. The relation of the total Appropriations to the net Revenue available; and
- 5. The relation of the actual Disbursements both to the Revenue and to the Appropriations thereof. [*Vide Appendix* G.]

This Return has been prepared on the principle that the Revenue, the Appropriation thereof, and the Disbursements, represent the operations within each year as cash transactions and without reference to periods of service in appropriation or expenditure, and thus serve to show how the cash and finance deficiencies have arisen.

34. The finance arrangements having, however, been made on a basis of an elastic character, the results arrived at in the Return cannot exactly tally with those arrived at under those arrangements; but they must, nevertheless, practically represent the same facts, the only difference being that on the one principle the Statements close at a uniform definite date, while on the other the dates of closing are so elastic as that the facts become distributed, and their true relations difficult of comprehension.

35. The Return shows, moreover, that with the exception of the year 1891, the actual disbursements were considerably less than the total appropriations for each year and for the whole seven years, 1887 to 1893, a net amount of £1,760,413 0s. 11d., showing thus that, if as so often advocated in former Reports, the appropriations of each year had been arranged to cover only the actual payments within each year there would have been no practical difficulty in the way of such an arrangement. It is remarkable also that the excess of appropriations over payments for the seven years exceeds the amount of the general outstanding liabilities of the Revenue at the close of 1893.

36. It should be also remarked that the cash overdraft and finance deficiency at the close of 1886, as per Report on Accounts of that year, was £2,902,372 16s., while the corresponding figures, as given above, for the close of 1893 were £3,713,731 18s. 10d.—a difference increase of £811,359 2s. 10d., attributable chiefly, it would appear, to excess of appropriations over revenue available.

## THE TRUST FUND ACCOUNT.

37. The General Trust Fund Accounts, which are still retained in the "Public Account," had at their credit on the 1st January a gross total of £3,906,300 3s. 11d., and subject to the reduction specified above of moneys irregularly credited to "Special Deposits" remaining unissued and accounted for as part of the Revenue balance to the amount of £19,754 8s. 8d., the closing balance on the year's transactions was £5,076,241 9s. 3d., showing an increase of £1,169,941 5s. 4d. (see page 115). To this increase the Government Savings Bank contributed £846,311 16s. 3d. This is remarkable, inasmuch as the corresponding increase for 1892 reached only £200,125 5s. 6d.

38. Of the total balance at credit there were invested in securities lodged in the Treasury chest (which were verified on inspection) to the amount of £3,599,401 12s. 3d., and £100 in the Bank of New South Wales (see page 5). The remainder consisted of advances to the Consolidated Revenue Fund £891,273 15s. 11d., and a working cash balance of £929,250 1s. 1d.

39. The Colonial Treasurer has this year added two additional accounts to his separate Supreme Court Funds,—the "Registrar in Bankruptcy Account," and the "Registrar of Probates Account." As these accounts are practically beyond the control of the Treasurer, and are not operated upon under the provisions of the Audit Act, there appears to be no object in having so many separate accounts current in connection with them. They might very fairly be summarised in one abstract, as the Special Deposits are dealt with and included with the "Trust Moneys Account," under the Act 20 Victoria No. 11.

40. Over and above the credits from the Revenue Account of £14,325, and of £17,449 19s. 10d., to the head of "Special Deposits," the objection to which is explained in foregoing paragraphs Nos. 18 to 21, transfers have been made to the same head of receipts from the Loan Expenditure London Account to the amount of £57,456 6s. 11d. The sums so transferred have been recharged in the Sydney Account to the Loan Service Account, showing thus a double expenditure from the Trust and Loan Funds of the same items. This is not a new arrangement, but on examination of the other matters already referred to in connection with the "Special Deposits," it was seen to be wrong in principle and the occasion of unnecessary entries in the accounts.

41. The explanation is that the Treasury considered that the Loan expenditure in London formed no part of the "Public Account" there, and that to bring it into the Sydney Account it was necessary in the first instance to transfer in Sydney from the General Loan Account to the Trust Fund "Special Deposits," so much as would cover the London Loan payments, and then charge the latter to the former account.

42. The Audit Act recognises only one "Public Account" for all receipts and payments, whether Revenue, Trust, or Loan Services, but because for bookkeeping purposes it was a convenient arrangement to have separate bank and cash sheets for the Loan Account, the "Public Account" came to be considered as consisting only of Revenue and Trust Money. Hence the useless practice which has hitherto been followed. The Treasury are now, however, on my representation, transferring the London transactions to their Sydney books direct. The transfers of this kind for 1893, £57,456 6s. 11d., have been disallowed, but as the same amount occurs on both sides of the account the balance is not affected, the expenditure resting in the Loan Account. 43.

33-X

43. The Civil Service Superannuation Account again shows an improved balance at its credit to the extent of £14,614 0s. 4d., the total balance in cash and securities having reached £478,990 15s. 8d. The ordinary income of the year, however, shows a decrease of £1,663 6s. 10d., while the expenditure shows an increase of £9,254 15s. 6d. These sums, with a less contribution from the Consolidated Revenue Fund for abatements of £5,585 9s., aggregate £16,503 11s. 4d., or the difference in the increase of balance less in 1893 than in 1892. The total ordinary net receipts were £88,328 17s. 5d., and the net payments were, for Pensions and Gratuities, £78,006 18s. 11d., showing a margin in favour of receipts of £10,321 18s. 6d.

44. The annual rate of new pensions that came on for payment during 1893 computes to £12,065 15s. 2d., while old pensions lapsed to the extent of £4,129 6s., thus leaving a net increase on the annual charge upon the fund of £7,936 9s. 2d. With this addition, the total annual rate of pensions under the Civil Service Act, inclusive of those specially chargeable to Schedule B, payable at 31st December last, was £74,446 15s. 8d. The gratuities paid amounted to £7,810 14s. 9d. [Vide Appendix H.]

45. The Police Superannuation Fund Account exhibits a deficiency of income, in relation to the year's expenditure, of £12,000 12s. 1d., while the Police Reward Fund Account shows a balance credit over the year's expenditure of £7,329 8s. 3d. New pensions came on for payment out of the former fund at an annual rate of £1,964 9s., and old pensions lapsed to the annual amount of £1,114 16s. 9d., an increase in annual charge of £849 12s. 3d. With this addition, the total annual rate of Police Pensions stood at £18,799 18s. 6d.

## THE TREASURER'S ADVANCE ACCOUNT.

46. The outstanding balance unadjusted on the account of the Treasurer's Advance Votes at the close of 1892 was £350,000. Of that amount there have been accounted for to the Revenue, within the year 1893, £50,000 on account of the Advance Vote for 1891, and £220,000 on account of the like Votes for 1892, thus leaving £80,000 for adjustment in 1893.

47. In consequence of an irregular procedure of the Treasury in regard to the Advance Vote for 1893, it became necessary to disallow the whole of the issues from it as charged to a Trust Fund Account. The circumstances are these: The practice for many years has been that on the passing of the Annual Vote of  $\pounds 200,000$  (advance to Treasurer), a Warrant for the whole Vote has been certified as legally available and applicable to the Service. On obtaining such Warrant, duly signed by the Governor, the Warrant was used for transferring the whole amount to a Trust Fund Account. Upon such transfer being made the Treasury requested and, on producing the usual credit voucher duly completed, obtained a second Warrant for the whole amount as payable from the Trust Fund.

48. In the present case, before the Governor had signed a first Warrant for its issue, the Treasury made the usual transfer by cheque on the Public Account, and for sixteen days thereafter proceeded to draw cheques for sums exceeding  $\pounds70,000$ , all of course without the sanction of the Governor's Warrant. The Treasury Treasury was informed in due course that those and any subsequent payments of the same kind, if made from Trust Funds, were and would be disallowed, but it was suggested that their error might so far be set right if the original erroneous credit was cancelled and a transfer be made on the 17th February, the date of the Governor's signature, but that, failing such correction, I should consider all payments under the Governor's Warrant of 17th February as made from the Consolidated Revenue Fund in terms of the appropriation. This was not acceded to, and thus no further Warrants were granted for recredits, the transactions connected therewith being wholly irregular.

49. The Treasury, nevertheless, proceeded to recredit recoveries of Advances to the Trust Fund, not however by way of correcting the original erroneous credit, but for the purpose of reissuing the same as usual. Warrants for such reissues were applied for, but in the circumstances certificates of legal availability in accordance with the Audit Act could not be given. Notwithstanding the absence of the Governor's Warrant for such reissues, they were continued to be made to the amount of £163,004 9s. 5d. Over and above these illegal drafts upon the Public Account, the Treasurer made use of the balance, £80,000, of his Vote for 1892 to the extent of £61,676 9s. 9d., preventing its adjustment until the present year.

50. As the whole of the operations on the Treasurer's Advance Vote were irregular, and have been disallowed, there is appended a detailed statement of them showing issues to the amount of £424,680 19s. 2d. [*Vide Appendix* F.] Inasmuch, however, as the Governor's Warrant for £200,000, under date 17th February, was issued as against the Consolidated Revenue Fund for drafts upon the "Public Account," and that sum is charged as one of "Other Payments" to be accounted for, credit has been allowed the Treasurer in his Certificates of Discharge for that entry. In other words credit has been allowed for drafts on the Public Account to the amount of £200,000 under the Governor's Warrant, such drafts being charged not as against the Trust Fund but against the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

51. The whole question of the mode of dealing with the Annual Advance Vote to the Treasurer has been opened up by the irregular action above stated. It had long been felt and acknowledged by the Treasury and this Department that the use made by the Treasurer of his Advance Vote was not in accordance with the purposes set forth in the terms of it. The Vote is granted in the following words:— "Advance to Treasurer to enable him (1) to make Advances to Public Officers; (2) to make Advances on account of other Governments; (3) to pay expenses of an unforeseen nature, which will afterwards be submitted for Parliamentary appropriation. The whole amount to be adjusted not later than the 31st December" of the year following the Vote.

52. A comparison of the actual payments, as set forth in Appendix F already referred to, with the terms of the Vote as just quoted, shows that in a majority of cases the payments actually made do not properly come within those terms, and the liberty given to the Treasurer to expend so large a sum as £200,000 over and above the sums finally voted on the General Estimates of the year has no doubt influenced the preparation of those Estimates and helped in a considerable degree to create the large deficiency now existing on the Revenue Account.

53. A different arrangement is so far being carried out with the Advance Vote for 1894, inasmuch as it has not been transferred to a Trust Fund in consequence of the representations which I have felt called upon to make to the Treasurer on the subject. As the question giving rise to this change is but a continuation of the controversy as respects the 1893 Vote, it appears to me that the correspondence should be appended to this Report, although referring to this year's operations. I have accordingly, and pursuant to clause 39 of the Audit Act, placed it with Appendix I, as it involves several important points, on which references have been made by the Treasurer and myself to the Attorney-General, and whose opinions form part of the papers. Special attention is requested to that correspondence.

54. I would again urge upon the attention of Parliament the consideration of the arrangement adopted by the Imperial Treasury for meeting cases of advances and other contingencies not covered by votes, and to which reference was made in paragraphs 33 to 35 of my Report on the Accounts of 1884. On this occasion I take the liberty of appending copies of one of the Annual Accounts laid before the House of Commons of the Imperial Civil Contingencies Fund, showing its operations. [Appendix J.]

## THE GENERAL LOAN ACCOUNT.

55. The year opened with a balance to the debit of the General Loan Account of £618,791 2s. 2d., and with an undischarged liability account, so far as related to balances of appropriations then unapplied, of £15,061,258 18s. 8d. At the same time the amount of securities outstanding for moneys borrowed and expended was £51,955,889 9s. 2d., bearing an annual charge on the Revenue for interest of £1,983,745 11s. 6d. Those figures have been modified during the year, as shown in following paragraphs.

56. The credits to the General Loan Account during 1893 were :--

The annual interest payable on the above balance of Public Debt from the 1st January, 1894, is computed to amount to £2,194,971 11s. 6d.

60. The distribution of this debt to the services for which it was incurred, as well as the interest payable from the 1st January, 1894, is shown in *Appendix* K, so far as such distribution can be arrived at; but, in the absence of any information as to the destination or application of the sums raised by the issue of Treasury Bills to the amount of £4,000,000 under Act 55 Victoria No. 7, and by the sale in the Colony of Funded Stock to the amount of £2,056,400 under Act 56 Victoria No. 1, it is impossible to say for what specific appropriations the securities for those two sums—£6,056,400 in all—were negotiated. This matter was referred to at some length in my Report on the General Loan Account for the year 1892, and it is to be regretted that this branch of the Public Account still continues in such an anomalous condition as has been repeatedly brought under notice.

61. An effort was made to obtain an authority for the specific application of the proceeds of sales of Funded Stock in the Colony under clause 8 of the Act 56 Victoria No. 1. The Treasury obtained an Executive Council Minute, assigning those proceeds to the two Loan Acts 55 Victoria No. 35, and 56 Victoria No. 24, but the total amount required to be raised to meet appropriations by those Acts reached only £2,070,082 0s. 1d. On this being pointed out, and a further authority requested

for

for the balance up to £3,000,000, or £929,917 19s. 11d., the Treasury withdrew the Executive Minute, or rather postponed the distribution of the proceeds of Funded Stock until the whole amount should have been raised. That arrangement can hardly be considered a satisfactory one especially as the further sale of Funded Stock has been recently stopped. [*Vide Appendix* L.]

62. The fact that large expenditure had taken place for Loan Services prior to loans for those services having been raised, suggested the question whether, until the money "appropriated" to Loan Services was actually placed to the credit of the Public Account, I was justified in certifying to the Governor that moneys asked for by the Treasurer in such circumstances were legally available and applicable to the purpose for which they were asked.

63. A case was therefore submitted for the opinion of the Attorney-General, and upon his reply further information was sought in relation thereto. The Attorney-General (Mr. Barton) advised that I could legally certify as to availability, notwithstanding the apparently adverse clauses of the Loan Acts quoted in the correspondence, but, as the question did not turn upon the fact, or otherwise, of funds being at the credit of the Loan Fund, the Crown Solicitor (Mr. E. A. Smith) advised that in such a case a warrant ought not to issue, but suggested a further reference to the Attorney-General upon the point, through the Colonial Treasurer. By letter, dated 12th January, it was intimated to me that as the Treasury did not intend to dispute the point raised as to certifying warrants for Loan Services in the absence of Loan Funds available therefor, the suggested reference to the Attorney-General would not be made. The correspondence on the subject will be found in *Appendix* L.

64. The apparently wide scope of the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879 has, it is to be feared, given rise to much of the anomalous and irregular proceedings in regard to loan moneys. The interpretation put upon the Act that it was meant to convey that moneys raised for one purpose were to be drawn upon for other and different purposes, merely because all such moneys were classed as loan moneys and lodged to one account, can hardly be maintained. The sole object of the Act referred to was to close nine separate Loan Funds which had been created under as many special Acts (quoted in the Schedule to it), and to prevent the opening of separate Loan Fund Accounts for any future loans that might be authorised, either in connection with the nine Acts quoted or with any future special Acts ; but, while providing for the unification of those nine separate Loan Funds, special care is taken that in drawing upon such unified or amalgamated fund no larger sum shall be drawn than " is or shall be expressly appropriated or set apart therefor."

65. It will be seen that the provision only applies to the sums of money actually borrowed, or to be hereafter borrowed, for only such sums as are actually raised can be "appropriated" or "set apart," and only such sums could be amalgamated into a General Loan Account. All the Loan Acts require that the sums authorised to be borrowed under them shall be "borrowed" and "placed to credit" as a preliminary step to their being "appropriated and applied" to the services for which said sums are borrowed. The obvious meaning of the amalgamation of the "Funds," not of the appropriations be it remarked, is that in reference to the nine separate funds a cheque drawn (say) for a service under 35 Victoria No. 5, or under 41 Victoria No. 7, shall be equally payable from the unified account, not on the ground that funds

at

at the credit of the one Act are available for expenditure under the other, but on the ground that funds are at the credit of the particular service drawn against. The same illustration will apply to all subsequent Loan Acts.

66. It need scarcely be said that it is a clear and well understood principle that a sum of money cannot be "appropriated" to two services at the same time, and this principle is enunciated in the proviso to clause 4 of the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act, which was intended to meet the objection which gave rise to the establishment of the nine separate funds, with their severely specific conditions, namely, that Loan Money if allowed to be mixed with Revenue Money was in danger of being diverted from Loan to Revenue services. Be that as it may, it will be difficult to show in the light of the circumstances at the time, or indeed without such reference, that the Act really authorises a double service for moneys raised for specific welldefined purposes.

67. The recent Loan Act, it is observed, introduces after the general terms of appropriation the words "and to other purposes as authorised by the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879." If the former part of the clause be carried out there can be no room for the latter part, and in view of foregoing remarks, I venture to submit, for the consideration of Parliament, that the words now for the first time introduced into a Loan Act are inaccurate, and contradictory to the principles on which the appropriation of public moneys has hitherto proceeded.

68. What is really wanted in the Loan Acts is a proviso for the application of any balance that may happen to remain unexpended of any Loan, by reason of the service costing less than the sum appropriated to it, or of the service not being carried out at all. Obviously, the first and natural course would be to carry such balance to the credit of the account responsible for the repayment of the Loan (of which such balance forms a part), that is the Consolidated Revenue Fund, there being no inherent obligation in such Loan balances to be expended for Loan Services. But, *if so enacted*, such balance might reasonably enough be applied to make good any deficiency that might arise in case a Loan should be raised at such a discount that the proceeds fall short of the amount required to meet the liability incurred under actual appropriation to service. In this latter case there is already provision for issuing securities to the amount necessary to secure the receipt of the total amount authorised by any of the Loan Acts now in force.

69. Adverting to the statement given above, of liabilities under "Appropriations," attention is again requested to the fact that of the sums quoted as for Railways and Tramways, £10,757,569, no less than £9,801,245 belongs to the Act 48 Victoria No. 26. The whole amount of such liability has substantially been actually raised, but as no authorising Acts have been passed under the Public Works Act of 1888 to give effect to the "appropriations," the money could not be spent as "appropriated," but has been spent on other services.

70. It is very necessary that some legislation should take place in regard to this matter. The Act 48 Victoria No. 26 was passed ten years ago; and it is all but certain that many of the services, for which so large a sum of money has been borrowed and spent otherwise, will not be carried out. In the circumstances it would seem necessary to repeal or amend the Act 48 Victoria No. 26, so far as not hitherto hitherto operated upon as regards expenditure, and reappropriate the amount improvidently borrowed to like services under subsequent Acts, for which no loans have as yet been raised. As it now stands, if any of the sums included in the Act referred to were to be authorised there would be no funds to carry it out, although the money has been borrowed for it years ago.

71. The additional loan of £2,500,000 was negotiated in London in October, 1893, bearing interest at 4 per cent. from 1st July, 1893. The gross receipts, as per tenders for that Loan, were £2,514,861 9s. 6d., from which there fall to be deducted the amount included therein for accrued interest from the 1st July to the respective dates at which the instalments of the Loan were paid in terms of the prospectus, viz., £42,643 16s. 8d. The gross proceeds of the Loan proper were, therefore, £2,472,217 12s. 10d; but being subject to the usual charges for negotiation and collection, amounting in this case to £38,288 6s. 10d., the net proceeds available for expenditure under appropriations were £2,433,929 6s. 0d., showing a net rate of £97 7s.  $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. per cent. for produce, and involving a rate of interest for a currency of forty years computed at £4 2s. 6d. per cent. nearly.

## THE RAILWAY ACCOUNTS.

72. The gross amount of collections for Railway and Tramway Tolls and Miscellaneous Receipts in connection therewith credited during the year 1893 is shown at page 10 as £3,253,271 11s. 2d., against which there have to be set off refunds under various heads, as detailed at page 40, £27,054 1s. 11d., thus giving a net income of £3,226,217 9s. 3d.

73. The expenditure out of Revenue for the same period for working and all other expenses chargeable to the Railways and Tramways Account, less recredits, amounted to £1,992,413 1s. Od., and shows a net credit balance on the year's operations of £1,233,804 8s. 3d. The interest upon the money borrowed and expended for the service of the Railways and Tramways for 1893 is computed at £1,451,762 8s. 6d., thus exceeding the credit balance on the year's income by £217,958 0s. 3d. This result is an improvement on the condition of the account for 1892 to the extent of £70,403 19s. 11d. [*Vide Appendix* M.] The account should, however, have the benefit of interest on the Railway Loan Redemption Fund created by the Act 53 Victoria No. 24, but while the balance at its credit is neither applied nor invested there are no means of allowing such benefit. The Fund in question is now in credit to the amount of £225,000.

74. Further payments for Railway Loan Services were made during 1893 to the extent of £1,143,330 5s. 1d., making a total up to 31st December of £38,560,649 1s. 3d.

## LOCAL INSPECTION OF RAILWAY AND TRAMWAY STATION ACCOUNTS.

75. By way of supplement to the foregoing figures which, according to the Treasurer's Statements, represent only the realised earnings and the expenditure, as actually brought to account within the year, the following statement shows the

76. The whole of the details making up the above figures have as usual been subjected to the closest possible scrutiny, the collections of tolls and charges for passenger and goods traffic having been carefully tested as far as practicable by the tariff rates fixed by the bye-laws published with the sanction of the Governor and Executive Council under the Railway Act. Changes of rates are necessarily often required to be made but for all such alterations special authority is obtained, and where asked for by query from this Department, the Railway Commissioners take steps at once to supply it. [Appendix O.] Indeed the relationship between the Commissioners and this Department continues to be of a very satisfactory character.

77. The number and situation of the collecting stations have been somewhat changed during the year, resulting in a net addition of 3 and now making 312 open to the end of the year. Of these 14 remained unvisited until the present year. It is gratifying to be able to state that the improvement noticed in last Report as having taken place in the condition and management of the business entrusted to the station-masters and their assistants has been more than fully maintained. Out of 312 visits only two cases occurred of grave complaint—a deficiency of £8 9s. 3d. appearing in one case and £4 6s. 2d. in the other—in both cases the money was recovered, one officer was dismissed and the other disrated. The general improvement is attributable doubtless, to the periodical inspections which are now applied under new arrangements to the station accounts by the Traffic Audit Inspectors, and by the Inspectors attached to this Department, but it is also due to the action of the Commissioners in retaining for the important duties of collecting the Railway Revenue the best officers available.

78. The Inspecting Officers furnish after the inspection of each station very full reports of its condition and new points of examination are continually coming under notice. In addition to the matters to which the Inspectors give their attention as described in last year's Report their work now includes a review of the extensive

170

extensive accounts of railway advertising, a source of Revenue withdrawn from public contract and carried on by the Commissioners' own officers since April, 1892. There are no sufficient means of ascertaining the advantage derived from the change, but the new arrangement is understood to be a much more profitable one to the Department than the former contract system.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

79. The usual Certificates of Discharge have been issued to the Treasurer under clause 28 of the Audit Act. The amounts disallowed are specified in *Appendix* P. Under the "Treasury Indemnity Act, 1893," 56 Victoria No. 29, however, the Treasurer has been relieved of those disallowances to the extent of  $\pounds 159,473$  0s. 8d.

80. The Mint Bullion Accounts and the Accounts of the Government Savings Bank have been examined and certified to agree with the books and vouchers representing the same.

81. The Statements of Receipts and Disbursements by the Commissioners of the Wollongong Harbour Trust for the period 1st January to 31st December, 1892, were compared on the spot with the Commissioners' books and supporting documents. Copies of those statements, with my certificate to their correctness, have already been laid before Parliament on 8th November last.

82. The following Special Statements are also appended for information, viz. :--

84. Subject to the above stated corrections, explanations, and observations, to the disallowances specified in *Appendix* P, and subject to all outstanding advances and queries being satisfactorily accounted for, the abstracts now submitted of the Treasurer's Receipts and Disbursements within the year 1893 are considered to be correct.

S5. The Statements marked F and G, together with the detailed Statement of the Public Debt, being, however, outside the requirements of the 22nd clause of the Audit Act, do not come under the examination and report required by the 36th clause, and their contents rest, therefore, on the responsibility of the Treasurer.

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir, With reference to your reply to my query on a transfer of £17,449 19s. 10d., dated 20th September last, forming Pay Voucher No. 33,028 to the Treasurer's disbursements from the Consolidated Revenue Fund for that date, I have the honor to state, for the information of the Treasurer, that I cannot recognise any sums that may be quoted in Statements of Ways and Means as appropriations of the revenue except such as form parts of sums included in the annual Appropriation Acts, or in any other Act which specifies and limits the sums to be expended.

As I have already had occasion to point out, there can be no balances of appropriations under the 5th clause of the Act 50 Victoria No. 22, nor under the 6th clause of the Act 54 Victoria No. 11, inasmuch as no specific sums are there stated to be set apart for the expenditure otherwise sanctioned by those clauses when claims may be ripe for payment, and consequently no book entry of merely estimated expenditure can be recognised as an authority equivalent to a specific appropriation by Parliament.

The sums of £241 11s. 9d. and of £1,141 1s. 10d. included in the voucher must therefore be disallowed on the grounds above stated.

On

On further examination of the transaction to which the above question has naturally led, I find that it is altogether open to disallowance. It is not shown that the Trust Fund has any claim on the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the payment to it of the sums set forth in the voucher, and I am not aware of any Act that provides for the paying away of any part of the revenue to a Trust Fund for any purpose whatever, or that provides for the payment of its obligations in any other way than directly from itself.

Moreover, the 14th clause of the Audit Act distinctly prohibits the issue of any draft or cheque except in payment of accounts, and directs that the Treasurer at the time of paying such accounts shall obtain from the persons to whom the same were payable, acquittances under their hands.

The same provision is made in the Appropriation Acts, and without personal receipts from the parties to whom moneys are payable no credit can be allowed the Treasurer for such payments.

It cannot, therefore, be contended that the statement of sums paid to a Trust Fund Account and a formal receipt for the same from the Treasury Receiver constitutes an account for payment of services due to persons, without the conditions above indicated being complied with as laid down in the Audit and Appropriation Acts there is no alternative than to disallow the whole transaction.

I am quite aware that transfers of this kind have been made at various times for many years past, and doubtless because of that circumstance they have been allowed to pass as a matter of course and convenience without question, and this is much to be regretted. On some occasions they have been shown among "Other Payments," but latterly they have been lost sight of, having appeared as final payments under their respective heads of service in the year in which the transfers have been made, although not actually disbursed to persons for a long time afterwards, or not paid at all, and to that extent had finally to be retransferred to the Revenue Account. There is no doubt that the whole of those transfers were irregular, and instead of that mode of dealing with outstanding Votes if, as was likely enough to have been the case, it was considered convenient to close the books, the Votes themselves should have been absolutely closed, and if necessary, re-votes taken for so much as was actually required.

Now, however, that it clearly appears to have been an irregular course to make transfers of this kind, any balances that may now remain in the Trust Fund of such transfers should at once be replaced to the Revenue Account, including the whole of the transfer now under review.

The following are copies of remarks by Treasury on the letters :-

The balance for 1890 (£15,205) was written off on 31st December, 1891, under approval of Mr. See. The balances of previous years were written off under former Treasurers. The balance of 1891 (£14,325) was written off on 31st August, 1893, but has since been restored and transferred to Trust Fund.—J.J.H., 14/9/93.

The balances up to 1890 inclusive, have, it is presumed, been written off with the approval of the Colonial Treasurer of the day. It is impossible for the present Treasurer to speak definitely. It would, it is thought, have been better had the amounts been transferred to a Trust Account, and this course has been adopted with respect to the 1891 balance.—F.K., 15/9/93.

There appears no advantage in the transfer to a Trust Account, but if so transferred, the amount must be all the same duly applied as directed by the law. The same course will have to be taken with the whole amount not yet so applied. The amount cannot be legally written off, and must, therefore, be restored.—E.A.R., B.C., 21/9/93. The 1891 balance has been transferred to Trust Fund, so that the amount can be available for the extinction of the Loan. The warrants quoted are inapplicable to the transaction disclosed by the voucher numbered 33,147, and which cannot be construed as sanctioned by the terms of clause 2 of the Act. Unapplied balances of the annual provision of £70,000 for the interest and extinction of the Million Loan of 1867, 31 Victoria No. 11.

Ir is submitted for the further consideration of the Colonial Treasurer that there appears to be nothing in the provisions of the Act 31 Victoria No. 11, to justify the transfer to a Trust Account of the appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue Fund towards the interest and extinction of the Loan authorised

authorised by it. The warrants certified for the issue of moneys under the Act in question must be held to be for the direct application of those moneys to the purpose for which the Act was passed, and the diversion of those moneys to a Trust Account will place the funds provided in a false position, inasmuch as the payment for Debentures purchased can only be legally made direct from the Consolidated Revenue Fund on which they are secured. The transfer will accordingly have to be disallowed if not replaced to its original position in the Revenue Account.

The Auditor-General regrets that he feels compelled to again urge his opinion upon the consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, that it is quite illegal to write off, in any circumstances, such balances as have arisen, from whatever cause, on the sums expressly set apart for the redemption of the Debentures issued under 31 Victoria No. 11, and, moreover, that to postpone the issue of those balances, and to make it dependent upon the obtaining of Votes of Parliament for the purpose some five years hence will be a direct violation of the conditions on which the Loan was obtained from the lenders. Seeing also that those Debentures now bear interest at 5 per cent. the delay in their redemption has already involved a loss to the public of upwards of £8,000 for interest, a loss that will, of course, be considerably exceeded by the proposed mode of arranging for the application of the outstanding balances.

It is assumed, of course, in this computation that the Debentures were redeemable at par, but, in no case, it is believed, has a purchase been made of those Debentures except at a premium.

The Auditor-General takes this opportunity of again pointing out, in connection with this matter, that the revenue has been quite unnecessarily charged with the cost over par of the purchase of Debentures of the Million Loan by obtaining Votes of Parliament for that cost.

Reference has more than once been made to this point in the annual reports to Parliament upon the Treasurer's Accounts, and also in letters to the Treasury, to which no answer has been received. The amount of such extra charges to the end of 1892 reached the sum of £18,124 15s. 6d., which undoubtedly ought to come out of the annual appropriation of £70,000, and should still be transferred to that account out of the balances already reported as unapplied, and thus to that extent relieve the revenue of a liability that ought never to have been charged to it.

It ought to be added that the course taken with regard to the cost of purchase constituted a further violation of the conditions of the Loan by so far applying to its redemption a larger sum than the Act has provided, to the disadvantage of the holders of the debentures.

#### MEMORANDUM.

Subject :- Extinction of the Million Loan.

The Treasury (Account Branch), Sydney, 20 October, 1893.

THE balance has been transferred to Trust Fund, so that it can be operated upon when the Agent-General thinks it opportune to purchase debentures. It is advisable that the accounts of each year should be closed within two years after its expiry, and it has been the practice to carry to Trust Fund the unexpended balances of votes which were likely to be actually required. To apply the amount appropriated for extinction of loan, arbitrarily, would perhaps entail a much greater loss in payment of enhanced premiums than the loss of interest alluded to.

The Agent-General cannot force the market. The 5 per cent. debentures are regarded by the British public as very good security, and they are loth to part with them; consequently a high price is demanded if they are sought.

The transfer objected to by the Auditor-General is a mere book-keeping transaction, and will not interfere in the slightest with the provisions of the Act 31 Vic. No. 11. In fact it will help to carry them out more fully than hitherto.

Legitimately, there is no necessity, in my opinion, for a warrant to transfer the amount to Trust Fund, and it is only for purposes of audit that it is allowed to be a charge against the warrants.

As to the payment of debentures direct from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, it may be pointed out that in cases where debentures paid off in London are chargeable to Loan Acts, the funds are transferred to Trust Fund from the Loan Account in Sydney, and the London payments are then charged to Trust Fund.

This shows that the Trust Fund is used as an agency for the General Loan Account in payment of debentures, and, in this instance, it is being used to perform the same office for the Consolidated Revenue.

Department of Audit, Sydney, 31 October, 1893. I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 26th inst., referring to the Treasury methods of dealing with the provisions of the Act 31 Vic. No. 11, for the extinction of the Million Loan raised under it for railway purposes, and to request that you will state for the information of Sir George Dibbs that I very much regret to be quite unable to concur in the views set forth in a minute accompanying your letter, and to which you inform me Sir George Dibbs has given his approval.

In the first place the provision of £70,000 annually for interest and extinction is not of the nature of ordinary appropriations made by the annual Appropriation Acts, but is an absolute dedication of the revenue to the specific purpose of redeeming the loan in question, and of paying the interest on such portions as may remain outstanding, and in such a way as to reduce the charge upon the revenue for the interest and principal.

No question of expediency as to closing accounts for book-keeping convenience can be allowed to operate against the express provision of the Act already quoted in the way of writing off sums not applied at any arbitrary date that may be fixed or in the way of writing them off at all.

Nor in the second place can the acknowledged difficulty of applying the moneys available for the purchase of the debentures afford any proper ground for absolutely paying away from the Revenue Fund to the Trust or any other Fund sums which can only be legally paid from the Revenue Fund for actual claims upon it, and for which receipts are required to be produced from the parties to whom such Funds may be paid.

Moreover, no warrants certified by me for operation on the funds provided by the Act 31 Vic. No. 11 can be legally used for such a transfer as has now been made, and as already indicated I must disallow any such a use of the said warrants, nor can I allow said warrants to be used for payments out of the sum so transferred to Trust Fund.

A third point is that the Revenue being always liable for the payment of interest and principal of the Debentures in question there can be no manner of use in employing the Trust Fund as a medium for discharging Revenue obligations. As the whole of the available funds have to be provided in London they ought to be placed there as a Revenue account for the purpose, whether by remittance from the Colony or by exchange of liabilities between the Colony and London, so that there be no intermediate channel by which the Revenue for this purpose goes out to its destination.

As to the cost of purchasing in the open market, while it is most probable that the question of paying premiums on such purchases was not contemplated when the Act was passed it is quite silent on the subject, but is read to mean that the purchases are to be made so far as the funds may suffice for the purpose when opportunities occur for such purchases-but not that they are to be forced at extravagant rates. But whatever the rates be above par, the excess undoubtedly is properly chargeable to the fund provided for the purpose unenlarged from any external sources.

I must therefore again request that the sums said to have been written off be restored as liabilities of the Revenue, inextinguishable, except as provided by the Act 31 Victoria No. 11, and also that the transfer of the balance unapplied of the 1891 provision to a Trust Fund Account be cancelled and replaced to the Revenue Account. I must also again urge that the Revenue be relieved of the amount already charged to it for premiums, viz., £18,124 15s. 6d. in excess of the annual provision of £70,000.

In another communication I have pointed out that the receipt for the payment of £14,325 from the Revenue, even if such payment were a legitimate one, is not such an acquittance as is required by the 14th clause of the Audit Act.

I am directed by the Colonial Treasurer to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 31st ultimo, in reference to the alleged non-observance by the Treasury of the provisions of the Act 31 Victoria No. 11 for the extinction of the £1,000,000 Loan raised under it for railway purposes.

In reply, I am to inform you that, as every appropriation by Parliament is an "absolute dedication" of a portion of the Revenue for a specific purpose, Mr. See cannot concur in your view that the amount of £70,000 appropriated annually for the purpose of paying interest on and for the extinction of the Loan in question is not of the "nature" of ordinary appropriations made by the annual Appropriation Acts.

The point as to whether the annual appropriation for interest and extinction of the £1,000,000 Loan is or is not of the nature of an ordinary appropriation is, however, not material, as the obligation to extinguish the loan-that is, so far as the Revenue Appropriations permit of its being done-still exists, and has been duly recognised and provided for annually by letters of credit forwarded to the Agent-General, which are held by this Department to be equivalent to cash remittances to London for the creation there of a Revenue Account. I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 10th instant, in part reply to mine of the 31st ultimo, on the subject of the extinction of the Million Loan of 1867, 31 Victoria No. 11, from which I learn that the whole amount of the annual provision of £70,000 for the interest and extinction of the loan referred to has been remitted to London in the form of letters of credit to the Agent-General.

I conclude therefore that to the extent to which such letters of credit have not hitherto been applied, the Agent-General has funds available to meet the amount shown by my letter of 16th August last to have been at that date unapplied in terms of the Act 31 Victoria No. 11, and, further, that such unapplied amount is now considered to be a still existing obligation to be discharged by the Revenue.

I desire to add that there is this obvious distinction between the absolute dedication of £70,000 a year by the Act in question and the annual Appropriation Acts, that the appropriations by the latter are limited by the words "any sum or sums not exceeding," and by the lapsing provisions of the 17th clause of the Audit Act, and the 15th clause of the Appropriation Act, limitations which do not exist in nor can I have, &c., E. A. RENNIE, be applied to the Act 31 Victoria No. 11.

#### MINUTE.

#### Subject :-- Extinction of the Million Loan.

The Treasury, Account Branch, Sydney, 17 November, 1893.

THE letter of credit does not convey the funds, but it invests the Agent-General with authority to expend the amount, his payments being chargeable through the Government Banking Account in London. There are, in fact, three letters of credit authorising payments in connection with the interest and extinction of the Million Loan, viz., for interest, for bonds drawn, and for bonds to be purchased.

It is obvious that it is impossible for the Agent-General to expend the exact amount set apart each year for such purposes, and balances must remain unexpended at the close of each year's account,

in our books, which are liable, under the Audit and Appropriation Acts, to lapse. It was to avoid such an occurrence that the £14,325 was transferred to Trust Fund to meet the extinction payments when they appeared in the London account.

The Auditor-General's contentions are raising difficulties, which I fear, as regards adjustment of the interest to be charged to each year under 31 Vic. No. 11, will place him in some confusion.

Can he now state how much interest on the Million Loan for each year, on account of the Appropriations, under Act 31 Vic. No. 11, was outstanding on 31st December, 1892, the interest paid being represented by the coupons of the Debentures issued under that Act, and charged to various years in accordance with their due dates, respectively.

I may state that the charging of the premium on bonds purchased to the Appropriation of £70,000 could not possibly have been contemplated in fixing that amount as the yearly contribution to a Sinking Fund (see statement herewith).

In acknowledging the receipt of your further communication of the 23rd instant respecting the operation of the Million Railway Loan Act, 31 Victoria No. 11, and the action of the Treasury with respect thereto, I have the honor to request that you will be so good as to point out for the consideration of the Treasurer that the views which I have already repeatedly expressed on the subject are not in any way met by the additional minute which, you inform me, has Mr. See's entire approval, but which I am compelled to say is quite at variance with the terms and directions of the Act in question.

I have already stated that the lapsing clause of Audit Act cannot possibly apply to any part of the annual appropriation of £70,000, for every part of is under contract for expenditure on behalf of the lenders of the Loan raised in terms of clause 2 of the Act 31 Victoria No. 11, and that it is beyond question illegal to write off any portion of the obligation thus entered into.

The occurrence at the close of any year of an unapplied balance during that year does not affect in any way the obligation to apply it in the next, or it may be a future year, but it must be held sacred to the purposes for which it is appropriated. To pay it away to a Trust Fund is a course of proceeding for which the Act in question affords no justification, and creates a difficulty which can only be overcome by a repayment to the Revenue Account of liabilities.

The balance shown by the statement first submitted in my letter of 16th August last, as then under obligation, is exclusive of any sums which may remain outstanding through the holders of the debentures not presenting their coupons at due dates. It is, therefore, quite beside the question at issue to import into it an imaginary difficulty which, I am happy to say, no contention of mine creates; the confusion entirely arises from what, I am compelled to repeat, is the erroneous treatment by the Treasury of the whole matter.

With regard to the question of charging the cost of purchasing the debentures of the Loan it seems unaccountable that the Treasury should continue to force the Revenue to bear such cost over and above the annual provision of £70,000, and in the state of the Revenue Account should not reduce its liability by transferring the cost to the unapplied balances which have been erroneously written off. As reported in my last letter, the amount so unnecessarily charged to the Revenue Account is  $\pounds 18,12415s.$  6d. To this has to be added a further sum of  $\pounds 69111s.$  6d., which has been unnecessarily charged to the Treasurer's Advance Vote.

In support of this contention I enclose a copy of an opinion furnished to me some years ago by one of the oldest and most experienced stockbrokers of the city, to which I would invite the Colonial Treasurer's special attention. It will be observed that Mr. Mullens is very clear as to the course of procedure that should be adopted, and that whatever the cost of purchase may be, that cost must come out of the annual provision of £70,000, to meet the Government's engagements to the lenders.

The whole question resolves itself into whether faith is to be kept with the holders of the deben-tures issued as a security for the Loan of 1868 by a loyal observance of the terms of the contract entered into with them under the conditions of an Act of Parliament, or whether such terms of contract are to be overruled by mere book-keeping arrangements of the Treasury.

In conclusion, I must again urge upon the Colonial Treasurer that his accounts of the Million Loan of 1868 be rectified by the cancellation of the entries which purport to be writings off of balances of obligation arising out of the annual provision of £70,000 made by the Act 31 Victoria No. 11, by the cancellation of the erroneous transfers to Trust Fund of £14,325, and by charging the cost above par of the purchase of debentures of the loan in the open market to the balance now remaining unapplied in I have, &c., terms of the loan.

The sum of £20,000 is devoted to paying off the debentures at par by annual drawings. This leaves £1,000 per annum free to augment the operation of the Sinking Fund by purchase of the debentures of the loan.

During this year the interest required is, in round numbers, £35,000, leaving £35,000 available for Sinking Fund, of which £20,000 has to be applied by drawing debentures for payment at par.

I am clearly of opinion that the balance is to be applied to purchase in the open market at whatever price the debentures may be. The Act is peremptory as to the obligation, and is silent about the Yours, &c., rate to be paid.

#### MEMORANDUM.

The Collector of Customs to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

I would like this matter referred to the Treasurer. If a vessel enters a port simply to take bunker coal, it is needed as a propelling power, and any vessel being without such steam coal should be fairly considered in distress, and it would be fair to remit half the rates; also, in the event of no service being rendered by a pilot, I do not think any pilotage should be charged if a vessel enters for bunker coal only.

I take it that we want to sell our coal, and it seems queer policy to shut and bar the door with a charge against the vessel requiring that coal.

I think, however, that it is necessary to insist that no vessel shall be entitled to any privilege in the way of abatement of pilotage in the case of service, or the total remission when the services of a pilot are not asked for-if such vessel shall enter port for any other purpose whatever, such as shipping cargo, passengers, &c., than that of taking bunker coal for propelling the vessel. I think the privilege sought is a fair one, and consistent with broad trade principles, if guarded

against possible abuse.

The Treasurer will no doubt recall his expressed intention to deal generally with pilotage rates specially in connection with the coal trade, and although the Auditor-General has lately taken up what I regard as a most untenable position in regard to refunds of pilotage and harbour dues, I hold the opinion that the power to relax the law by a remission of dues is vested in the ministerial head of the Department, supported if necessary by Executive authority, and that such authority should be supreme.

I have the honor to state that, in reply to a query as to why one-half pilotage rates inwards and outwards were charged to the steamer "Duke of Devonshire," the Collector of Customs says that "the Acting Treasurer (Sir George Dibbs) directed that vessels entering the port, requiring bunker coal only, should be allowed to enter and clear at half rates if the services of a pilot are engaged, and *free of* pilotage if pilot services are not rendered" (Treasury, 93/7,990).

I shall feel obliged by a reference to the provisions in the Navigation Act, under which pilotage rates in half or in full are to be remitted where no service is rendered by a pilot except in the case of a master of a vessel having a valid pilotage certificate.

Clause 60 of the Navigation Act of 1871 imposes, besides the fixed pilotage dues, a penalty of £20 when, except in the case just stated of the master being exempt, he either does not take, or refuses to take, the services of a pilot in and out of port. It seems to me, therefore, that until the law be altered, there is no power to remit the pilotage in any circumstances beyond the half-rate allowed to vessels in distress, such distress being extended to mean want of coals to prosecute a voyage.

It is also submitted for the consideration of the Treasurer whether recommendations in cases of this kind should not come more properly from the Marine Board than from the Collector of Customs, the administration of pilot matters being apparently vested in the Marine Board by the Navigation Act of 1871. ## Refund of £5 3s. Harbour and Light dues on ship "Alexander Newtown."

Department of Audit, 10 August, 1893.

No provision appears to exist in the act for the exemption of Harbour and Light dues while a ship is not working.

The clause 56, Marine Board Act, bearing on the matter, makes the rates payable half-yearly, from which it would appear that the intention is to spread the amounts payable over the whole year.

I think the Navigation Act 35 Vic. No. 7, sec. 55, is meant. This section, amended by sec. 9 of 36 Vic. No. 30, refers to half-yearly Harbour and Light rates imposed by the amended section, the charge being for any half year for the period of six months from the date of such payment. If the period expires during the time a vessel remained in port, I am of opinion that a new period of six months payment does not commence until the vessel clears for sea.—JAMES POWELL, Collector of Customs, 11/8/93.

There is nothing in the Act 35 Vic. No. 7, clause 55, as amended by section 9 of 36 Vic. No. 30, or otherwise, to show that the Harbour and Light rates do not apply to vessels laid up in port.—E.A.R., Department of Audit, 15 August, 1893. The Collector of Customs.

## The Crown Solicitor to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

Crown Solicitor's Office, Sydney, 31 August, 1893. I have the honor to return herewith the papers No. 7,157 submitted to me for opinion as to whether Harbour and Light dues imposed by 35 Victoria No. 7, section 55, amended by section 9 of 36 Victoria No. 30, are payable continuously by a vessel irrespective of whether such vessel be working or

laid up. The question has arisen in connection with the claim made by the owners of the "Alexander Newton " for a refund in respect of rates paid at the port of Newcastle.

It appears that the ship entered the port of Newcastle on the 28th July, 1892, having paid on the 28th January, 1892, the Harbour and Light rates (I suppose) at some other port. She was then laid up at Newcastle for nine months, and cleared for Sydney on the 10th April, 1893. When clearing the rates were demanded and paid for the whole period the vessel was laid up, and two separate receipts were issued, one covering the time from 28th July, 1892, to 27th January, 1893, and the other from 27th January, 1893, to 26th July, 1893.

The owners have applied for a refund of the first-mentioned payment, namely from 28th July, 1892, to 27th January, 1893, and that the second receipt be altered so as to date forward from the 10th April, 1893. The Collector of Customs has recommended this refund, but the Auditor-General has taken the objection that no provision appears in the Act for the exemption from Harbour and Light dues while the ship is not working.

Section 55 of the Navigation Act, 35 Vic. No. 7, which imposes this Harbour and Light rate is in the following terms :--- "There shall be payable and paid at every place at which there shall be a pilot establishment upon every registered vessel a half-yearly Harbour and Light rate of 4d. per ton, and the payment of such half-yearly rate shall be made on or before the 30th June and the 31st day of December in each year to the Collector of Customs."

By section 9 of the Amending Act, 36 Victoria No. 30, it is provided that the payment in respect J.S., 8/993. of any ship in pursuance of the provisions of the 55th section of the principal Act at any port of the half-Mr. Ross.-F.K., yearly Harbour and Light rate imposed by the said section, shall exempt such ship from any further charge at any such port for Harbour and Light rates for the period of six calendar months from the date of such payment.

Reading these two sections together it is, in my opinion, perfectly clear that what the Legislature has done is to impose on every registered ship, at any port, a half-yearly rate or tax, and that this rate is to be paid on or before the 30th June or 31st day of December in each year.

The payment so made exempts the ship from any further charge for Harbour and Light rates for the period of six calendar months from the date of such payment.

In the case submitted, therefore, in my opinion, the claim to a refund cannot, as a matter of law, be sustained.

As pointed out by the Auditor-General, there is no provision in either of the Acts for exemption from this rate simply on the ground that ship was laid up; but I understand it has been the invariable practice for twenty years and upwards to demand these rates only from ships as they enter and leave the harbour. The payment on entering the harbour would thus exempt a ship from any further payment in the event of her leaving within six months from the date of such payment. If she cleared outwards at any time after the expiration of such six months, she would only be charged one half-yearly rate, no matter how long an interval may have elapsed, and that without regard to where a ship has been laid up, or has simply been waiting for cargo or detained on other grounds. The Collector of Customs urges that to administer the Act in any other way would involve hardship and absurdities, that there are many ships which have been lying in Sydney harbour, for instance, for many years (in some cases for fifteen years), and it would be an absurdity if any one of these ships left the port she was charged fifteen years Harbour and Light rates.

Considerations of this kind may afford good ground for granting a refund in the particular case under consideration; but Executive sanction should be obtained, and it seems to me that the Act should be amended if it is desired to make it accord with the practice that has so long prevailed.

I UNDERSTAND the Auditor-General to demand the payment of Harbour and Light dues from vessels for any period during which they may be laid up in port.

This is a sudden departure from practice covering twenty-three years, and it appears to me an unreasonable and vexatious demand.

As I read the Act 35 Vic. No. 7, sec. 55, amended by sec. 9 of 36 Vic. No. 30, the Harbour and Light rate imposed is a half-yearly rate exempting any vessel for six months from the day of payment, whenever such payment may be made.

The Auditor-General now seeks to make the payments continuous without regard to circumstances, and according to his reading every ship now laid up may be liable to cumulative rates covering, in many instances, from five to twenty years.

On the old principle of payment for services only, I do not think it just to charge dues during the time a vessel is unemployed and laid up. JAMES POWELL,

We have the honor to direct your attention to the circumstances under which the "Chiltonford" from Cape Town, in ballast for Newcastle to load coal, was driven into this port to obtain a tug to enable her to reach the port of Newcastle, with a view to the refund of the money paid for pilotage.

The extracts from the daily papers, which are attached, will give an account of the difficulties the vessel encountered off the coast, and how she was compelled to run into this port to obtain assistance to enable her to reach the port of destination.

The vessel left this port in tow without the services of a pilot.

TRYING WEATHER OFF THE COAST.—Shipping bound to Sydney has found it hard to make the port lately owing to persistent contrary winds. In each instance yesterday the sailing vessels that arrived reported such weather. A power-ful steel-built four-masted ship, the "Chiltonford," launched from Elder's Fairfield Yard, and built alongside the great "Cunarder Campania," came into port, though bound from Table Bay to Newcastle. She passed Tasmania nearly a month ago, and has thrashed her way up the coast against heavy head gales. Just a fortnight ago yesterday Sydney Heads was seen, and a week ago she was in the parallel of Newcastle, but could not fetch in there against the prevailing winds off shore. With the southerly set of the current the ship found herself off this port again, and a slant occurring she stood in and anchored for a tug to tow her to Newcastle, where it is intended to load. An almost equally vexatious experience was that of the barque "Loongana." Fifteen days ago she was within a few hours' sail of this coast, but was driven off, and had to work back, making but a few miles per day. The "Borough Belle," also, from the Islands, reports similar weather.— S. M. Herald, 18th July, 1893. THE "CHILTONFORD—A TRYING PASSAGE."—Vexatious weather beset the progress of the powerful, four-masted.

S. M. Herald, 18th July, 1893. THE "CHILTONFORD—A TRYING PASSAGE."—Vexatious weather beset the progress of the powerful, four-masted, heavily-sparred steel clipper "Chiltonford," now on her first voyage to the colonies. She has been nearly a month knocking about trying to make Newcastle, but with the winds persistently off the land was unable to do so. The ship, therefore, put in here yesterday, and was to leave in tow of one of Messrs. J. and A. Brown's tugs during the night. The "Chiltonford" left Cape Town on 11th May. Experienced very favourable winds and fine weather from S. W. to S., with exception of one week of easterly winds running down the easting. She was off Tasmania on 20th June, and thence had strong gales from the westward and N.W., with very squally thick weather and a heavy head sea. Fourteen days ago she was off Sydney Heads, and just a week ago yesterday was off Newcastle. Had a hard job to make the land again with the light weather key winds. westerly winds, and the ship being in very light trim. She is to load coal at Newcastle for San Francisco.

Sir, I have the honor to retarn herewith papers No. 720, referred to me for opinion as to whether a refund of £18 6s. 2d., "half outward pilotage" should be allowed to the owners of the sailing ship " Chiltonford."

It appears that this vessel was driven into Port Jackson by stress of weather in order to obtain a tug to take her to Newcastle.

The ship has paid the pilotage rates prescribed by the Act in such cases, viz., half the inward and half the outward pilotage rates.

The owners now apply for a refund on the ground that the ship was towed out of Sydney Harbour to Newcastle without the services of a pilot.

There is no provision made in the Act for a return of pilotage rate so paid either inward or outward in any event of the kind mentioned, viz., that the vessel was towed out without the services of a pilot.

In my opinion the refund cannot legally be sustained. But I understand from the Collector of Customs that it has been the custom to charge these pilotage rates only in cases where the services of a pilot have been actually engaged, and it may be considered that this is a case in which a remission might be made.

A remission of this kind will require Executive sanction.

THE Auditor-General objects to the refund of £18 6s. 2d. paid by the agents of the ship "Chiltonford," from Capetown, bound for Newcastle. The contention of the Auditor-General is, "if the ship had paid full pilotage, being in distress, she would be entitled to a refund of half the rates, but as only half rates were paid, there is nothing legally available for refund."

But the ship *did not* pay full pilotage; half pilotage was paid when the vessel entered inward, because she entered in distress, and when she cleared again, half pilotage was paid on continuation of the voyage

The claim is made simply for the reason that the vessel left the port in tow, and did not take a pilot outward.

The Sydney shipping report attached to the papers states :-- "The vessel has been nearly a month knocking about trying to make Newcastle, but with the wind persistently off the land, was unable to do so; fourteen days ago she was off Sydney Heads, and just a week ago she was off Newcastle."

This must surely be admitted as a case of distress, and whatever the law may be on the subject, it seems rather hard to charge the suffering owners pilotage in and out at Sydney, and pilotage in and out at Newcastle, with Harbour and Light dues added, and then when the captain hires a tug to take the ship to Newcastle, he is called upon to pay outward pilotage, without having service of any kind.

I consider that I was perfectly justified in recommending the refund of money for which no service was rendered, and I was glad to receive the sanction of the Treasurer.

Whether legal or illegal, I consider the claim fair and reasonable.

"There is no provision made in the Act for a return of the pilotage rate so paid, either inward or outward, in any event of the kind mentioned, viz., 'that the vessel was towed out without the services of a pilot.'" "In my opinion the claim for a refund cannot legally be sustained." "But I understand from the Collector of Customs that it has been the custom to charge these pilotage rates only in cases where the services of a pilot have been actually engaged, and it may be considered that this is a case in which a provision might be made;" and to point out that there is a discrepancy between the alleged practice and the express directions of the law; therefore, may I inquire whether any steps will be taken to bring practice and law into harmony?

#### MEMORANDUM.

The Collector of Customs to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

THIS seems to me a very simple matter. The vessel entered the port of Sydney in distress, took a pilot, and paid half inward dues. She cleared outward for Newcastle, and paid half outward dues, but did not have the services of a pilot, being in tow of a steam-tug.

It is admitted that the half rates were chargeable both inward and outward. As a matter of fact, the rates were collected, and I would not have cleared the vessel unless the half pilotage rates had been paid.

The agents subsequently petitioned for a remission of the outward half rate, on the ground that the ship did not receive the services of a pilot.

I recommended the petition, and the Treasurer was pleased to remit the amount. The Auditor-General took exception to the Treasurer's act (I am writing from memory), and then, I think, recommended that Executive authority for the refund be obtained.

I am quite aware that the claim for this refund cannot legally be sustained. The refund is an act of grace, and "practice" has nothing whatever to do with it.

There can be no occasion to bring practice and law into harmony (as suggested by the Auditor-General) in this case. The question was first one of distress, and half the rates were (by law) remitted. The second question was one of law, and the half rates were collected both inward and outward, although no service was rendered outward. The third question was one of grace, and the Executive Government remitted the half pilotage outward.

The express direction of the law has been expressly obeyed, and the allowance made has been expressly sanctioned by the Executive.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 19th ultimo, respecting the refund of pilotage, £18 6s. 2d., to the owners of the "Chiltonford," and to request that you will call the special attention of the Treasurer to clause 60 of the Navigation Act of 1871, 35 Victoria No. 7, from which it will be seen that unless the master of a ship "holds a valid certificate of pilotage," he is bound to get the services of a pilot under a penalty of £20 for not so doing over and above the amount payable for pilotage if such pilot services had been actually engaged. But if the master holds a certificate of pilotage and yet engages a pilot, he must pay the ordinary pilotage rate. Provided, however, that in case of a vessel being compelled to return to port, or to put into port through stress of weather, or for repairs, only half the ordinary pilotage rate shall be imposed.

The Crown Solicitor has distinctly stated that the refund of the half rate was illegal, and the Collector of Customs admits the same. His recommendation for the refund was based on the ground that the ship did not receive the services of a pilot. The ship went to sea, therefore, incurring a penalty of £20, and the plea of distress was legally met by the payment of half pilotage only. There being no provision in the Navigation Act for remission of pilotage or penalty for not obtaining a pilot, and it being admitted that the refund was illegal, it seems to me that the authority given by the Governor and Executive Council to remit the half pilotage was ultra vires, and that to replace the illegal refund a sum should be placed on the Supplementary Estimates for that purpose. The Crown Solicitor having stated that he understood from the Collector of Customs that it has been the custom to charge the pilotage rates only in cases where the services of a pilot have been actually engaged, and it thus appearing to be a clear case that the practice and the law are at variance, the object of my letter of 11th ultimo was the endeavour to get them reconciled by an amendment of the law. It is no reply to that suggestion to argue that the remission in question was an act of grace, and that it was a fair and reasonable thing to sanction As already indicated, the law provides for such acts of grace by remission of half rates and the it. refund now made of the remaining half rate, because the law was not observed in the obtaining the services of a pilot when going to sea, will probably be quoted inconveniently as the ground for exemption from pilotage dues when not taking a pilot on going to sea. In this particular case there does not appear any extraordinary ground for the remission of a statutory due.

In reply to your letter of the 6th instant, requesting me to state for the information of the Attorney-General my reasons for regarding a supposed special appropriation of £260,000 for 1893 for "Revenue and Receipts returned" as an insufficient justification for certain refunds of certain Pilotage and Harbour and Light Dues, I have the honor to state,— 1st. That what is described as a "Special Appropriation" for Revenue and Receipts returned is nothing more than an estimate in Ways and Means Statements of the amount which may have to be refunded either under regulations or in reduction of receipts which mer he found to have

- to be refunded either under regulations or in reduction of receipts which may be found to have been erroneously credited, and that for such refunds there is no "appropriation" by Parliament.
- 2nd. That if there were a distinct vote of Parliament for such disbursements, which would obviously be an anomaly in itself, inasmuch as no appropriation can be made of an incorrect and accidental credit to the Revenue Account, such vote could only be applied to legitimate refunds of money that formed no part of the proper revenue of the Colony, and could not be applied to refunds of money legitimately due to the revenue and duly collected and credited thereto under Revenue Statutes.
- 3rd. That the refunds in question of Pilotage and Harbour and Light Dues have obviously been made without any legal sanction for the same, and have been so declared to be illegal by the Crown Solicitor as fully set forth in my letters of the 20th and 21st November last.
- 4th. That whatever grounds there may be as a matter of policy or otherwise for relieving shipowners of the dues imposed upon them by Statute, such relief can only be afforded by the same authority which imposed such dues, or, in other words, any disbursement of the kind out of the public revenue can only be allowed under distinct votes of Parliament. The same rule will also apply to cases where the dues, instead of being collected and then refunded, are not collected at all, although expressly directed to be collected under the Navigation or other Acts of Parliament.
- 5th. A further reason may be assigned for the disallowance of such refunds as are now in question, viz., that the revenue cannot be legitimately burdened with sums not appropriated by Parliament, nor be reduced either by illegal drafts upon it or by any operation the effect of which is to prevent its being credited with its proper dues.

#### OPINION.

THE question which I have to consider is whether "pilotage rates payable and paid" under section 54 of the Navigation Act, which have come to the hands of the Collector of Customs and gone to the Consolidated Revenue Fund in accordance with section 67 of the same Act, can be repaid, to the persons who paid them, without a special appropriation for the purpose by Act of Parliament. I am clearly of opinion that they cannot.

The expression "payable and paid" in sections 54 and 55 and the very specific words of sections 67 and 68 show that all these fees must actually be paid and come into the Consolidated Revenue Fund, to there appear as, and form, part of the revenue of the Colony, for the year in which they are paid. Having gone into the Consolidated Revenue Fund they must, if repaid, come out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund again. But all payments out of that fund must be found by the Auditor-General to be "duly authorised" (section 14 of the Audit Act) and that phrase is defined (section 15 of the Audit Act) to mean any account which is "in accordance with any existing law or regulation or directly sanctioned by a responsible Minister, or the Governor, &c., and if chargeable on the Consolidated Revenue Fund is covered by any Appropriation Act in force at the time of payment." This payment is a charge on the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and therefore should be covered by

an Appropriation Act.

I have been referred to an item in the special appropriations for 1893 as follows :--- "Revenue and receipts returns £260,000," as the appropriation authorising this refund. I do not think it does so. The expression "revenue and receipts returned" must mean revenue and receipts legally returned. It is not an authority to the Treasury to give away without sanction of law as much of the revenue of the Colony, up to £260,000, as they choose to give. On the proper interpretation of that item, therefore, I think the payment is not authorised. It should be more precise and show plainly the nature of the refund. The amount should, I think, be put on the Supplementary Estimates under some specific head, as, for instance, " amount required for refund of pilotage rates and dues paid under the Navigation Act." And if it is intended to continue the practice of refunding pilotage rates, there should be an amount, under some such heading as I have indicated, inserted in the Annual Estimates.

The intention of the Navigation Act is, however, so clear against these refunds-actually imposing a fine upon masters who do not use a pilot-that the course of collecting the dues under one Act and afterwards refunding them under another would seem rather inconsistent. It would be better, I think, to amend the Navigation Act.

# APPENDIX I.

### OPINIONS OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

### Subject :-- Modes of Dealing with the Treasurer's Advance Vote.

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

[Urgent.] Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 19 January, 1894.

In view of the Colonial Treasurer obtaining in the Supply Bill for this month an Advance Vote as on former occasions, I desire to intimate that unless such Vote expressly sanction the issue of it in full on the passing of the Temporary Supply Bill, I shall feel obliged to object to such issue or for any sum beyond what may be required for the exigencies of the month in accordance with the Audit Act. I shall not consider among such exigencies any supposed necessity to transfer the whole amount to a Trust Account as has hitherto been the practice, and which I fear has led to the use of the Treasurer's Advance Vote for purposes outside of the terms on which the advance is granted to the Treasurer. Moreover such issue reduces the balance at the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund unduly, and, so far, misleads as to its true condition in the Quarterly or other periodical Statements of Revenue. The Advance is granted for exigencies that may arise during the whole year in the same way as grants for other and ordinary services are intended for application as claims arise during the currency of the year. Any claims that may so arise must be set out in specific vouchers before cheques can be drawn in satisfaction thereof, and such cheques can only be legitimately drawn against the Advance Vote direct. A transfer of the Advance Vote in full to a Trust Account cannot be said to constitute a claim under either of the classes of expenses to meet which the Advance Vote is to be applied, and as the Trust Fund is not a claimant for services rendered by it, no acquittance can be given entitling the Treasurer to a The discharge for a payment from the Revenue to the Trust Fund.

The arrangement under which transfers of the kind referred to have hitherto been made was adopted many years ago as a means of providing for reissuable recoups to the Advance Account, which while dealt with as a Revenue Account, would not admit of reissues of recoups without Votes of Parliament. But for many years past also grave doubts have been entertained in this Department and elsewhere as to the propriety of the arrangement, and more recently as to the legality of it, inasmuch as advantage has been taken of it for operations which could not be characterised as coming legitimately within range of the purposes set forth in the annual grants for the temporary use by the Treasurer of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for such purposes.

I have no desire to embarrass the Treasurer, but I feel bound to state, in view of the foregoing observations, that unless supported by a legal opinion to the contrary, I shall have to object to certifying an instrument for the issue within one month, as explained in the 11th clause of the Audit Act, of the whole amount that may be voted for an advance to the Treasurer as hitherto described. Further, if any sums certified by me for issue from the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the purposes of the Advance Vote be used for transferring the same to a Trust Fund, I shall feel constrained to disallow the same as not having been used for the purposes for which it was certified to be legally available and applicable. I have frequently brought under the notice of Parliament the unsatisfactory conditions under which the Treasurer's Advance Vote is operated upon, and in connection therewith, I desire to draw the especial attention of the Treasurer to paragraphs 33, 34, and 35, of my report upon the Public Accounts of the I have, &c., year 1884, page 119.

In reply, I have to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that the views expressed in my letter were arrived at after much anxious consideration of the whole subject, and to repeat that I have no desire to embarass the Treasurer in the matter, but must, nevertheless, adhere to my former statement that without a legal opinion, that is to say, the opinion of the Attorney-General, to the contrary, I must decline to certify for the issue of the whole amount of the Vote of £200,000, which I perceive has been granted to the Treasurer on the usual terms.

Further, that without a similar opinion I must decline to recognise any transfer of the money voted for an advance to Treasurer to a Trust Fund Account for operation as hitherto.

I have, therefore, to request that in submitting for my certificate an instrument purporting to authorise the issue of the Treasurer's Advance Vote for £200,000 at once, as required for one month's service in terms of the Audit Act, the Treasurer will be good enough to accompany the same with the legal opinion I have asked for, or it will be my duty, on receipt of such an instrument, to submit the case for the opinion of the Attorney-General.

Perhaps I may be allowed to suggest for the Treasurer's consideration that while Parliament is in Session advantage should be taken of the opportunity thus afforded of obtaining Votes for unforeseen claims to which the Advance Vote is considered to be properly applicable only when Parliament is not in Session, and thus avoid the charging of the same to and reducing the amount of the Advance Vote.

I am desired to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 25th instant, and to inform you, in reply, that your sudden and unlooked-for decision to decline to certify to a warrant for the issue of the whole amount of the Advance to the Colonial Treasurer provided in the Supply Bill for the month of January instant is, in view of the precedents established and followed since the inception of the Vote, with your full concurrence, quite inexplicable, and is calculated to seriously, and, it would appear, needlessly, embarrass this Department.

The amount voted as an Advance to the Treasurer has hitherto been transferred to Trust Fund. and, as you are aware, used again and again as repayments to it were made.

This course is absolutely essential to prevent delays in making payments, and, if your attitude be maintained, it will be necessary to pay the whole amount to the Colonial Treasurer's credit in the bank, to form a separate banking account, where it may be operated upon in like manner to that now obtaining.

The above procedure will be objectionable for apparent reasons, but unless, as is hoped, you will, on maturer consideration, see your way to observe the precedents of the past twenty years-for which, as has already been observed, you, equally with the Treasury, are responsible-a resort to it will, in the public interest, be unavoidable. Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 1 February, 1894. I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 30th ultimo, on the subject of the Treasurer's Advance Vote. That the operations hitherto upon the Advance Vote have been irregular and unsatisfactory has long been recognised by this Department, and has also been admitted by the Treasury, although such admission may not appear in any extant correspondence on the subject.

The purposes of the Advance Vote are clearly set out to be to enable the Treasurer to do certain specific things, viz .:--

1st. To make advances-

(a) To public officers.

(b) On account of other Governments.

2nd. To pay expenses of an unforeseen nature (such expenses to be afterwards submitted for Parliamentary appropriation).

If all the payments during any year hitherto made from the Advance Vote, which could not be properly classified under either of the headings specified in the terms of the Vote, were to be deducted from the gross amount of payments, the result would certainly show that the amount of expenses legitimately chargeable to the Advance Vote would come well within the total amount of it without recoups and reissues. Moreover, a very considerable proportion of the payments arise from deficiencies in Votes, temporary transactions, and other purposes for which the plea of urgency might well be doubted, and which in their nature can hardly be said to come under the class of unforeseen expenses, and which are certainly never submitted to Parliament for appropriation afterwards.

The condition of the Vote just referred to clearly implies that the revenue is not to be employed for purposes for which no Parliamentary appropriation is necessary to be applied for to cover afterwards, or, in other words, not for any purposes except those of a strictly emergent nature, and occurring while Parliament is not in Session. It would be in very extraordinary circumstances that a sum of £200,000 could be required at once, and it is obvious that the drawing of a cheque, or the power to draw a cheque for such an amount, and not for a service rendered as proposed to form a Trust Fund, is a condition of things fraught with danger. As already suggested, the Advance Vote is evidently meant to provide for the emergencies of the whole year, and, apart from the restriction imposed by the 14th clause of the Audit Act, affords in its terms no justification for the draught out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the whole amount, and placing it where it might not be subject to all the restrictions which surround the application of the public revenue by the Constitution Act and otherwise.

I am clearly of opinion that all cheques for the purposes of the Advance Vote should be drawn as against the Consolidated Revenue Fund only for emergencies as they arise, and to the amount only in all of that voted by Parliament. Even in the case partly suggested by your letter, of the Vote being considered an "advance" "to the Treasurer," it could hardly be contended that it should be issued to him in globo and not in portions as required monthly. In conclusion, as suggested in former communications, if the Colonial Treasurer will obtain and forward to me a legal opinion, viz., the opinion of the Attorney-General, in view of the representations made in this and former letters, to the effect that the whole vote of £200,000 may be drawn at once from the Consolidated Revenue Fund and placed to a Trust Fund Account, or to a separate Treasurer's Advance Fund Account to be operated upon by drafts and recoups reissuable under further warrants to the amount of such recoups as hitherto under the Trust Fund, or under any arrangement by which the Advance Vote is to be applied otherwise than in the strict terms of the Annual Votes, and direct from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, if such opinion be given, you will be good enough to state, for the information of the Colonial Treasurer, that then, of course, however I might differ from such opinion, I shall feel under an obligation to follow it, reserving at the same time my right to report and explain the whole matter to Parliament. #### OPINION OF THE ATTOBNEY-GENERAL.

#### Attorney-General's Department, Sydney, 1 May, 1894.

Subject :- Re Auditor-General's objection to transfer the whole amount of the "Advance to Colonial Treasurer" from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to Trust Fund in toto.

THE question raised by the Auditor-General is one of considerable importance, and I have carefully considered it.

It turns, it seems to me, upon the true meaning of the terms in which the Treasurer's Advance Account is voted. These terms are as follows :---

"Treasurer's Advance Account.-To enable the Treasurer to make advances to public officers, and on account of other Governments, and to pay expenses of an unforeseen nature, which will afterwards be submitted for Parliamentary appropriation—the whole ... £200,000." amount to be adjusted not later than the 31st December ... ... ....

The first question is whether this £200,000 should be paid or credited to the Treasurer in one lump, or whether, as in the case of other votes, the provisions of section 11 of the Audit Act should be complied with. I see no reason why the latter course should not be followed. No doubt the Treasurer's Advance Account is a vote of a peculiar and special character, and it may be much more difficult for the Treasurer to forecast the amount likely to be required from it for a month in advance than in the case of expenses of a more regular kind, but if he can make a forecast, however general, I think that he should do so, and draw only so much as under such forecast he may estimate will be required.

The next question is whether the Treasurer should be allowed to place the amount so drawn by him to the credit of a Trust Account to which he may credit any refunds which he may procure when the amounts paid by him out of such Trust Account are subsequently voted. In other words, is he limited to drawing £200,000 in all, or may he draw more than £200,000 so long as he never oversteps the limit of £200,000? May he draw cheques only to the amount of £200,000, or may he, like a bank customer having an overdraft of that limit, draw cheques to any amount, so long as by his credits he keeps his balance within the allowed amount?

After careful consideration, I have come to the conclusion that the practice which, it appears, has prevailed for the last twenty years, is not illegal, and may be continued. I think that the words "expenses of an unforeseen nature" were intended to have a wider meaning than that which the Auditor-General-with very proper caution-appears to think that they may bear. I think that not merely expenses whose occurrence as expenses was unforeseen, but expenses which may have been, in one sense, clearly foreseen, but as to which it was not foreseen that they would be unprovided for, are included. That salaries will fall due may be known, but that no provision will be made for them when due cannot be anticipated. In short, I think the word "unforeseen" does not mean only "unforeknown," but means "unprovided for beforehand."

There is another consideration which seems to point to the same result. What is the meaning of "unforeseen"? It indicates, strictly speaking, the absence of a certain *mental* operation. Now, how is it to be proved that this mental operation has or has not been performed? Is the Auditor-General to say that the House foresaw certain expenses which the House has not provided for, or that the Minister foresaw them; or is he to have power to ask questions to find out whether the Ministers or Departmental Heads did or did not foresee them? Any such suggestion seems equally absurd and impracticable. How then is it to be known that this mental operation of foreseeing has or has not been performed? What is the evidence of it? There is only one test, it seems to me, which can be applied. Have the persons, whose duty it was to foresee these expenses, *acted* as if they foresaw them? Have they, in short, *made* provision for them? If not, as it is impossible to cross-examine such persons, it must be assumed that they did not foresee them.

If I am right in this interpretation of the words-and I feel very little doubt upon the point-it follows that payments may often be made by the Treasurer out of the Advance Account, which will shortly afterwards be voted by Parliament. I cannot see why, when that is done, the amount should not be recredited to the Account. If a temporary payment is permitted why should not its temporary character be admitted and acted upon?

The conclusion to which I come is this-that the Treasurer's Advance Account may be kept by the Treasurer as a bank customer's overdrawn account is kept. So long as he never exceeds at any one time the limit of £200,000, he may draw cheques in excess of that amount, and recredit any of such payments as may afterwards be voted or otherwise become legally available.

In short, I think the present system, which has so long prevailed, under which the Treasurer pays his Advance Vote into a Trust Account, is not illegal.

#### STATEMENT OF THE CASE.

#### Subject :- The Treasurer's Advance Vote.

THE position now taken by the Auditor-General with respect to this account makes it impossible for the Treasury Department to carry out its business without infringing the terms of the Audit Act.

For the last twenty years, since 1871, the amount of the Treasurer's Advance Vote has every year been transferred *in globo* to the Trust Fund, to be used as required for payments without votes, or for which, although voted, warrants had not been obtained.

When recouped, the money was again reissued, but no more than the original sum was actually advanced.

For some reason the Auditor-General now declines to sign a warrant for the whole vote, but that is of no great consequence. He also declines to sign a warrant for the issue of the money from the Trust Fund if the amount be transferred thereto as before. I think the Auditor-General is clearly wrong in the course he is pursuing, but if he is not some other means must be adopted to enable the Treasurer to use the money.

The wording of the vote is: "To enable the Treasurer to make advances to public officers, and on account of other Governments, and to pay expenses of an unforeseen nature." Up to the present the vote has largely been used for services not provided for by appropriations, which were in consequence regarded as unforeseen, otherwise provision would have been made for them on the Estimates.

Working, as the Treasury often does, under Temporary Supply Acts, in which provision is made only for services on the basis of those provided for in the previous year, it is necessary to charge all new services (although provided for in the Estimates) to the Advance Vote. When the Appropriation Act is passed, the amounts paid on account of these new services are transferred to the respective votes, and the Advance Vote relieved accordingly, leaving the money free for other services. It may happen that before the Appropriation Act is passed, as sometimes it is not passed until late in the year, nearly the whole of the vote has gone for new services, and for services for which no warrants had been obtained. If, however, the Auditor-General's contention be correct, and this Department was not allowed again to use the money, the intention of Parliament, which was to give the vote for services not provided for, would be frustrated. Furthermore, if the Treasury could not use the repayments from the votes to the Treasurer's Account it would be unable to meet the expenses usually charged thereto.

The Auditor-General is bound by the Audit Act to sign the warrants if funds are legally available, which, in the case of the Consolidated Revenue Warrants means an appropriation, and in the case of the Trust Funds means balances at the credit of the respective accounts stated therein.

# The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

Referring to my letter of 18th instant, I have now the honor to request that you will have the goodness to submit for the information and consideration of the Colonial Treasurer a précis of the points set forth in recent correspondence on the subject of the mode of dealing with the Treasurer's Advance Vote.

If, as I believe it is, the enclosed précis of the points at issue between the Treasury and myself be a correct one, then it is evident that the "statement of the case" by the Treasury Accountant, which I learn from your letter was submitted to the Attorney-General, omits all reference to the question raised by the 13th and 14th sections of the Audit Act, and introduces matter as to recoups and Second Warrants that are not discussed at all in my letters, which you inform me were also forwarded to the Attorney-General.

The "statement of the case," while thus differing widely from the view stated in my letters, is little more than a plea for infringement by the Treasury of the Audit Act, passed, be it remembered, "to regulate the receipt, custody, and issue of the public moneys," besides providing for "the audit of the public accounts," an Act whose provisions have been far from loyally observed by the Treasury.

The opinion of the Attorney-General is, consequently, limited to the subject matter of the Treasury Statement; but that Statement is defective in information which later correspondence would have furnished, and have served to explain more fully the state of the question. I cannot, therefore, accept that opinion as a settlement of the question at issue until fuller information has been laid before the Attorney-General. For that purpose a copy of this letter and a statement of the case, to be laid by myself before the Attorney-General, under the 37th section of the Audit Act, has under this date been I have, &c., forwarded to the Crown Solicitor.

Précis of correspondence between the Auditor-General and the Under Secretary for Finance and Trade on the subject of the mode of dealing with the "Advance to Treasurer," as annually voted by Parliament.

1. Letters from the Auditor-General to the Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

The points taken in the Auditor-General's letters of the 19th, 25th, and 30th January and 1st February last were the following :-

1. That the issue of the Advance Vote should in future, like other Votes, be regulated by the directions of the 11th section of the Audit Act.

2. That the Advance Vote being granted for exigences that may arise during the whole of a year, very special circumstances would need to be shown for its issue in full during any one month.

3. That the practice of transferring the whole Advance Vote, £200,000 (which means drawing that sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund), to a Trust Fund account unnecessarily reduces the balance at the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus so far misleads as to its condition.

4. That such a draft is not justifiable, inasmuch as it cannot be shown that a service has been rendered constituting a claim for which the Treasurer, by the Governor's warrant, can legitimately draw a cheque in terms of the 13th and 14th clauses of the Audit Act, and for which he can produce an acquittance entitling him to a discharge by the Auditor-General.

5. That the drawing of a cheque, or the power to draw a cheque, for a sum of £200,000, or any sum, except for a service actually rendered, is a condition of things obviously fraught with danger, and if placed in the Trust Fund the use of the money would not be subject to all the restrictions which surround the application of the public revenue by the Constitution Act and otherwise.

6. That, in view of the above points, the usual certificate of legal availability for the whole amount of the Advance Vote must be withheld, except under a legal opinion that a cheque can be drawn in terms of the Audit Act, withdrawing such whole amount from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and placing the same to the credit of a trust fund for operation as hitherto.

7. That the effect of such mode of operation has been that transactions have occurred which could hardly be correctly classed as legitimate, in view of the terms in which the Advance Vote is granted; in short, that they have been of an irregular and unsatisfactory character, and admittedly so by both the Treasury and Audit Departments.

8. The operation referred to involves the certification of Warrants for the issue from the Trust Fund on its transfer to it of the Revenue Vote or of any recoups to it. The Auditor-General's letters do not mention the issue of second Warrants, although, of course, it is implied that the transfer to the Trust Fund being objected to, no Warrant beyond the first for operating the Advance Vote would be certified.

#### 2 Statement of case for opinion of the Attorney-General, enclosed in letter from the Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

The points taken by the Treasury are :---

1. That the Auditor-General's objection to the continuance of the system of dealing with the Advance Vote, which has prevailed for twenty years or more, would make it impossible for the Treasury

to carry on its business without infringing the terms of the Audit Act. 2. That the object of the transfer of the Treasurer's Advance Vote (£200,000) to the Trust Fund is to enable it to be used for payments uncovered by appropriations of Parliament, or by the Governor's Warrants for such appropriations.

3. That when such payments are replaced the money so recovered becomes reissuable as Trust Funds, which it could not be if replaced to the credit of the Advance Account, if dealt with as a Revenue

Account, but reissuable only to the extent of the sum transferred, that is of the vote of £200,000. 4. That it is of no great consequence whether the Auditor-General declines to sign a warrant for the whole vote or not, but that he is clearly wrong in declining to sign a second or more warrants for the issue of the money so transferred to the Trust Fund, or for the reissue of the sums replaced to it on adjustment of advances made from it.

5. That if such replacements be not reissuable the Treasury would be unable to meet the expenses usually chargeable to the Treasurer's Advance Vote, that is to say for services unprovided for by appropriation, or for new services on the Estimates awaiting appropriation, and thus frustrate the intention of Parliament.

6. That the Auditor-General is bound by the Audit Act to sign the warrants forwarded to him by the Treasury on the sole ground of funds being legally available, either under appropriation of the revenue by Parliament or by balances at the credit of Trust Fund Accounts.

7. That some means must be found to enable the Treasurer to use the recoups, if the Auditor-General declines to sign warrants for the purpose.

# 3. Opinion of Attorney-General on case submitted by the Treasury.

The opinion of the Attorney-General is given upon the following questions :----

1. As to whether the 11th section of the Audit Act should be complied with in respect of the Treasurer's Advance Vote, or whether the whole vote should be paid or credited to the Treasurer in one lump, and gives his opinion in favour of the former alternative, and agrees with the Auditor-General's first point, and to which the Treasury takes no exception, conditionally on being allowed to reissue recoups. 2. As to whether the Treasurer should be allowed to draw against his advance up to the limit of

the vote of £200,000 only, or be allowed to draw any number or amount of cheques either for original drafts or for drafts against refunds provided he never draws more than £200,000 in all, and is of opinion that the practice of allowing refunds to be drawn upon up to any amount within a balance represented by the full amount of the vote as placed in a Trust Fund is not illegal and may be continued. 3. As to interpretation of the term "unforeseen," the Attorney-General has afforded some valuable remarks and definitions which may be applicable to some but not to all of the transactions

hitherto arising in the manipulation of the Advance Vote.

4. The nature of the Treasurer's Advance Vote Account, being similar to that of a bank cus-tomers' overdrawn account, it may be kept in that manner, and that the Treasurer may draw cheques to any amount against the balance at the credit of the account arising from re-credits, but not beyond the limit of £200,000.

I desire to state further that in my judgment there was no necessity to use the Advance Vote in this case, inasmuch as the payment was provided for by statute, and also by the temporary Supply Acts, and the Governor's Warrants for the same.

Whether, however, the payment of the 2nd March, was correctly or incorrectly made from the Advance Vote, the mode adopted of now making it a charge on the Consolidated Revenue Fund, as it should have been originally, will not provide the Advance Vote with a credit in "Over Issues" of £252 for any other service than that for which it was originally paid, viz .:- For further payments to Members of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works in the same way as any other "Over Issue" is limited to the service in which it occurs. If the transfer in question was intended to provide an open credit of £252 on account of the Advance Vote, it should have taken the form of a transfer of the expenditure to the funds provided by the Act 53 Vic. No. 11, and thus relieve the Advance Vote, and the warrant for the same of the charge.

I understand that the temporary use of the Advance Vote for the purpose in question arose from the supposed want of a warrant sufficient to cover the amount, and that on obtaining such warrant the transfer now objected to was made. If so, and in any similar case, there would be virtually two warrants for the same issue from the Public Account; but, by the operation of the principle stated in the previous paragraph, the second warrant becomes a substitute for so much of the first warrant as has been temporarily (whether rightly or wrongly) used, and leaves it-the first warrant-operative to that extent for the purpose for which it was certified.

A book transfer, made of course on the basis of a warrant, is therefore all that is necessary in this and similar cases; and I would, therefore, urge upon the consideration of the Treasurer that such a transfer be substituted for the cash entries of the 13th instant, relieving me of the necessity otherwise of disallowing said entries. If this course be approved of, it would be most desirable that it be adopted before the present quarter's accounts are made up for publication in the Government Gazette.

# Payment of £252, 13 March, 1894.

The Treasury, New South Wales, Sydney, 6 April, 1894. I am directed by the Colonial Treasurer to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 28th ultimo, and to inform you, in reply, that the payment in question was made in the first instance from the Treasurer's Advance Vote, pending the obtaining of a Warrant for issue under the Act 53 Vic. No. 11, for "Remuneration to Parliamentary Public Works Committee."

When the Warrant had been obtained the payment was debited thereto, and the amount credited to "Advance to Treasurer" in "Over Issues Account." Had the amount been credited to the Treasurer's Advance Vote, Consolidated Revenue Fund, it would not, in terms of the Audit Act, be available for I have, &c., reissue.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 6th instant in reply to mine of 28th ultimo, and to request that you will have the goodness to express my regret to the Treasurer that the course proposed by my letter in regard to the mode of dealing with the sum of £252, therein referred to, has not met with his approval.

I desire to point out for the Treasurer's further consideration that instead of my proposing (as seems to have been assumed) to credit the amount in question to the Treasurer's Advance Vote, Consolidated Revenue Fund, which, as stated in your letter, would have precluded its reissue, the course I proposed was to *transfer* the *expenditure* made (erroneously, as I contend) under the Warrant for operating on the Treasurer's Advance Vote of 1894 to the Warrant for payment of "Remuneration to Parlia-mentary Public Works Committee." The effect of such book transfer is exactly what appears to be desired, viz., to make the amount so transferred available for issue under the original Warrant for any purpose to which it was legitimately applicable, or, in other words, the Warrant and not the Vote becomes credited with the sum transferred to a Warrant given for the purpose to which the original payment was devoted. As stated already in my former letter, by the process adopted by the Treasury two Warrants have been used for the same issue from the Public Account.

It may be as well to recall attention in connection with this matter to the fact that the Warrants certified by me and signed by the Governor are so signed only for the issue of moneys from the Public Account to persons for services rendered by means of cheques drawn on the Bank keeping the Public Account, and such Warrants are not therefore applicable for transferring moneys in correction of erroneous or inadvertent entries. If, therefore, the sum in question (£252) remains as credited to Over Issues, no Warrant can properly be passed for operating upon it as such credit, and in the circumstances, as already explained in my former letter, I regret that I shall feel obliged to disallow the entries of the 13th ultimo in respect to it.

#### MEMORANDUM.

#### Subject :- Treasurer's Advance Vote.

### The Treasury, Account Branch, Sydney, 27 April, 1894.

I HAVE consulted with the Auditor-General, and he is desirous of knowing our objection to the course proposed by him. In the first place, there is a great objection to filling our books with transfers, rendering the adjustment of the quarterly and annual statements a matter of great difficulty. And I may point out that this system of transfer could only be applied to payments from the Revenue Vote of Advance to Treasurer on account of other Revenue Votes. The payments on account of Trust Funds and in anticipation of Loan Votes could not be adjusted by transfers, as the Cr. transfer would be shown in the Revenue balance-sheets, and the Dr. transfer would be shown either in the Loans or Trust Fund balancesheets, so that though the credit would be shown in our Revenue Appropriation Ledger, there would be no corresponding debit, and a discrepancy would be created. This would be obviated by making the adjustment by a cash payment and receipt. In the case of an advance from the Revenue Advance Vote of (say) £300 for a specific service, and that service being carried out for (say) £250, there would have to be a cash repayment of £50. This could not be brought to the credit of the Vote except as a repayment, and then could not in terms of the Audit Act be reissued. It is therefore placed to Trust Fund Over Issues Cr. Advance to Treasurer, and is, I think, available for reissue for any service authorised to be charged to Treasurer's Advance Vote.

In connection with this point, take for instance the British and Australian Cable Subsidy Account (Revenue Vote), which has been exhausted. A further payment of some £600 has to be made, to be eventually recouped by recoveries from the Colonies concerned. The payment has been temporarily charged

charged to the Treasurer's Advance Vote, but as the recoupments are made I propose that they should be credited to the Over Issues Account referred to above, so that the Funds of the Advance Vote which have been temporarily used should be available for other purposes of the Vote.

The payments in anticipation of Loan Votes should be treated in the same manner.

Supposing that £100,000 was required immediately for an unprovided Loan Service, and that the Treasurer's Advance Vote was used to make up that sum, and the £100,000 is subsequently voted on the Loan Estimates, how could that amount be made available for the purposes of the Treasurer's Advance Vote, except through an account in Trust Fund, such as I propose?

The payments on account of Trust Fund Accounts should be similarly adjusted.

There may be an objection to use the Over Issues Account in Trust Fund for this purpose, but if that objection be sustained an account with another designation can be opened in Trust Fund.

#### The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 1st instant, in reply to mine of the 9th ultimo, respecting the mode of dealing with sums recovered in adjustment of payments made from the Treasurer's Advance Vote, and to request that you will be so good as to inform the Colonial Treasurer that having read the memorandum of the Treasury Accountant enclosed with your letter, I am unable to see that in any of the cases stated there need be the slightest difficulty in adopting the course I have already shown in my former letters to be the one which, in my judgment, is the proper one in the circumstances.

In the first place, it seems to have been overlooked that the sums placed at the disposal of the Treasurer by the Parliament, although necessarily provided by the Revenue Fund, has always been considered available for Services ultimately chargeable to any Fund, whether Revenue, Trust, Loans, or any other. This has palpably been the case when the sum was transferred *in globo* to a Trust Fund, under which it was used for *any Service*, while ultimately the whole amount had to be replaced to the Revenue from the several Funds or Services to which it had been temporarily applied. This being so, the Warrant issued for drawing upon the Treasurer's Advance Vote, and *from the Public Account*, is held to be applicable to payments of all kinds made in anticipation of funds not available at the time, and is not, as treated in the Accountant's memorandum, a Revenue Vote in the sense of an *Appropriating* Vote, and for this reason, that the whole amount is to revert to the Revenue Fund after serving its temporary purpose. Hence, instead of charging the *Revenue* Account with all the payments made under the Warrant for operating upon the Treasurer's Advance Vote, those payments only should be so charged as are intended to be ultimately paid from it, and any other payments should in like manner be at once charged to the Fund or Service where ultimately it may be intended that the charge is to remain.

Thus in the case stated of the British and Australian Cable Subsidy Account if the excess over the Revenue Vote has to be recovered from other Governments, the £600 should appear as an excess payment posted to Trust Fund under the head of "Other Payments," as is done in the Revenue Fund Account, if to be covered by a Vote, as a payment from the Revenue Fund—in either case the payment of the excess is covered by the Warrant. If the recoup be by cash received from other Colonies, and so credited to the Trust Fund as "Advances repaid," the amount should, at the same time be credited to the Warrant relieving it of the amount which, so to say, it had been charged with to meet a payment for which at the time there were no other means of meeting. On the other hand, if the recoup be by a Vote, a Warrant issued under such Vote would cover the original amount temporarily drawn from the Public Account under the Warrant for the Treasurer's Advance Vote, and so relieve the latter Warrant of its charge for the temporary issue.

By this course, which is equally applicable to the other case supposed of temporary issues for Loan Services, the Warrant would at length be restored to its original amount, and die a natural death. The number of transfers would be reduced instead of increased, and only appear on what would be necessary, perhaps, for convenience, a Subsidiary Warrant Account for this particular purpose. All the payments and credits would occur naturally in their proper place, and obviate the anticipated difficulty of adjusting the quarterly and annual statements.

In the other case suggested of a repayment of a sum issued beyond requirements, such repayment would of course have to be dealt with as an over issue under whatever branch of the Public Account such over payment occurred, and under the specific head of service to which the original payment was charged. At the close of the year the balance of issue under the Warrant for operating upon the Treasurer's Advance Vote that might remain unrecouped, would then, as now, appear under the Revenue Account as "Other Payments," Treasurer's Advance, either as one sum, as now, or separately, as from Revenue, Trust, or Loan Services, and would thus correspond with the amounts shown (if any) as "Other Payments" under the Trust Fund or Loan Account with the balance as for Revenue purposes.

# The Auditor-General to The Crown Solicitor.

Sir,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 25 May, 1894.

I have the honor to enclose a statement of a case on which I am desirous of obtaining the opinion of the Attorney-General to enable me to comply with the directions of the 37th section of the Audit Act of 1870. The recent opinion given to the Treasury, you may observe, does not cover an important part of the question raised by me with that office, probably because it is not touched upon in the Treasury Statement of the case. I have, therefore, stated the whole question from my point of view, and enclose with this a copy of a letter I have addressed to the Treasury, covering a *précis* of the correspondence, up to the 1st February last, for reference. It may be useful to add, by way of illustration, an actual case which has formed the subject of correspondence with the Treasury subsequently to the 1st February last. On the 1st of March a sum of £420 became payable to the members of the Parliamentary Public Works Committee, under the Statute 53 Victoria, No. 11, the Governor's Warrant then in the Treasurer's hands was short of the amount required by £252, that is for the specific service. At the same time (the date of actual payment having been the 2nd March) the Treasurer had a Warrant for the Supply Bill for February, and also the Warrant for a portion of his Advance Vote. Instead, however, of using his Supply Warrant as he might have done, the £252 was paid from his Advance Vote Warrant.

Several days afterwards the Treasurer obtained a further Warrant for £500 under the Act 53 Victoria, No. 11, to pay members of the Committee, and by that Warrant drew a cheque for £252 not in

favour of the members (who had already been paid), but to transfer £252 to a Trust Account in favour of his Advance Vote for the purpose of being used *for any service*. In ordinary course the Treasurer will ask me for a Warrant to draw this £252 simply as so much cash, without reference to the fact that he has drawn it for payment of members of the Committee, but for which he can produce no acquittance in terms of the 14th section of the Audit Act. To avoid this complication, I have suggested that on obtaining the Warrant for £500 above mentioned, instead of drawing another cheque for £252, all the Treasury required to do was to make a book entry transferring the expenditure in the first instance to the Warrant just mentioned, and relieve his Advance Vote Warrant of the amount. By this process the Treasurer's cash book and the bank account would be clear of the double transaction and the Treasurer's Advance Vote have, at the same time, all the benefit of a recoup, without swelling the Public Account beyond its legitimate dimensions, either in receipts or disbursements.

May I request the favour of an early reply.

### CASE FOR THE OPINION OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

Subject :- Transfer in globo from the Consolidated Revenue Fund of the amount of the Treasurer's Advance Vote, £200,000, to the Trust Fund, and its subsequent manipulation in the manner of a Bank customer's overdrawn account.

THE "Audit Act of 1870" was passed to regulate the receipt, custody, and issue of the public moneys, besides providing for the audit of the public accounts.

Section 10 directs the Treasurer to pay "into the bank keeping the Government account all moneys received into the Treasury," to an account to be called "The Public Account" (without distinction of funds contributing such moneys or constituting such account), such moneys to be disposed of "not otherwise" than directed by subsequent sections.

Section 11 directs that such moneys shall be drawn from "the Public Account" only upon an instrument setting forth the Treasurer's estimated requirements of money for the public service during one month after preparation of said instrument, which must be signed by the Treasurer, countersigned by the Auditor-General, and approved and signed by the Governor. Section 12 directs that the counter signature of the Auditor-General is to depend upon the sums

set forth in the instrument, prepared in the form of the second schedule, being ascertained to be legally

available for, and applicable to, the service or purpose mentioned in such instrument. Section 13 directs that the instrument, being so prepared and finally signed by the Governor (thus becoming a "Warrant"), the Treasurer may issue drafts or cheques upon "the Public Account," such drafts or cheques to be sufficient authority to the bank to debit the said "Public Account," with the amounts

mentioned therein, "and no moneys shall be drawn or paid out of the said account in any other manner." Section 14 directs that no draft or cheque drawn upon the "Public Account" shall be issued, "except" in payment "of such accounts as form part of expenditure which shall have been duly authorised," and, at the time of paying every such account, the Treasurer shall obtain from the persons to whom the same was payable acquittances under their hands.

The object of the sections above quoted was to prohibit the issue of the revenue of the Colony, under any less authority than a Vote of Parliament, and to protect the Governor from issuing his Warrants to draw upon the Public Account, except on the independent certificate of the Auditor-General, as set forth in section 12

To provide for certain disbursements which section 12 would prevent being made in the ordinary way, such as expenses arising out of emergencies which could not be foreseen, such as Flood Relief, Flood Repairs, Quarantine expenses, rise in prices through prolonged drought or otherwise, Parliament grants the Treasurer power to draw upon the revenue to the extent of £200,000 during the year, or until such drafts, if made, be replaced by Votes for specific services, or otherwise, as circumstances may determine.

The terms of the Vote are-Advance to Treasurer to enable the Treasurer to make advances to public officers, and on account of other Governments, and to pay expenses of an unforeseen nature, which will afterwards be submitted for Parliamentary Appropriation. The whole amount to be adjusted not later than the 31st December (1895), £200,000; and the Vote forms part of the Annual Appropriation Act of 1894, the operations on which are made subject to the provisions of the Audit Act of 1870, by section 16. To give effect to the Advance Vote—to enable the Treasurer to exercise the power so given him—it has been the practice to certify at his request a Warrant for drawing the whole amount of £200,000 from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, as soon as available. Whereupon the Treasurer drew a  $\pounds 200,000$  from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, as soon as available. Whereupon the Treasurer drew a cheque for the whole amount of  $\pounds 200,000$  as revenue money from "the Public Account," and relodged the same to "the Public Account" as Trust Moneys. That being done the Treasurer asked for and obtained a second Warrant for drawing the whole amount of £200,000 from "the Public Account." Under this second Warrant only did the Treasurer begin to draw cheques in payment of services rendered for which there was no appropriation, although the money provided for such services was Revenue Money—not Trust Money. Further, when the Treasurer exhausts the power of drawing cheques given him by the second Warrant, and has by Vote of Parliament or otherwise, recovered and replaced the amount of those cheques, or any portion of them, it has been the practice to certify further Warrants for the reisene of a second Warrant to the reissue of such replacements, or in other words to renew the power given by the second Warrant to the extent to which it was exhausted, but restored by replacements. The replacements are in the great bulk

bulk of cases made by drafts upon Votes taken to cover cheques *drawn* and *paid away from* "the Public Account" for services rendered. Such Votes are, of course, only available by Warrants specifically certified in the usual way, but the cheques drawn by the Treasurer under such Warrants are not used for payments of services rendered at all, but for transfers of so much money to the credit of his Advance Vote.

Thus, for the final settlement of claims provided for by the Advance Vote, no less than three Warrants have been employed, each Warrant being given for drawing the same money, and if recoups occur more than once during the life of the Annual Vote so many more Warrants would have to issue. By this arrangement the actual payments charged to the Advance Vote, instead of £200,000, have appeared in the Treasurer's accounts as more than *double that sum annually* over and above the repayment annually from the Trust Fund to the Revenue Fund of £200,000 in replacement of the original transfer from it. The Auditor-General contends that only cheques drawn for payment of services rendered are legitimately chargeable to "the Public Account," and for which an acquittance can be produced from the person or persons rendering the service, and drawn of course pursuant to the Governor's warrants.

That such cheques, when drawn against the Warrant for operating on the Treasurer's Advance Vote, may be posted to any fund which contributes to "the Public Account" according to its certified character.

That when a Warrant becomes available for drawing from any fund to cover a cheque temporarily drawn under the Advance Vote Warrant, this latter Warrant should be relieved of the amount of said cheque by transferring the expenditure represented by it to the former, or its proper Warrant for the final charge to "the Public Account" under whatever fund or head of service it properly belongs.

This principle of adjustment secures to the Treasurer the full exercise of the power given him analogous to a cash credit given by a bank to a customer until the next annual Vote for his advance without the numerous transfers and adjustments which have so long disfigured the Public Accounts.

The Auditor-General, therefore, considers that when he has certified to a Warrant covering the whole of the Treasurer's Advance Vote whether in one sum or preferably in portions, under the 11th section of the Audit Act, such Warrant is all sufficient for the purpose, and that he ought not to be called upon to certify any other in whatever shape recoups of cheques drawn under it may be credited otherwise than to the Warrant itself.

The Auditor-General respectfully solicits the opinion of the Attorney-General as to whether or not he is right in his contention as set forth in the five foregoing paragraphs. Department of Audit, 25th May, 1894.

Subject :- The Auditor-General's objection to transfer the whole amount of the Vote "Advance to Treasurer" from the Consolidated Revenue Fund to Trust Fund in toto.

OPINION.

HAVING given consideration to the somewhat troublesome questions submitted to me, I have come to the conclusion that the Auditor-General is in the main right in his contention.

The practice has been, it appears, for the Treasurer, upon the passing of the Appropriation Act, to obtain from the Auditor-General a certificate to a Warrant for the full amount of the Treasurer's Advance Vote, £200,000. He has then exhausted this Warrant at once by drawing a cheque for the same sum upon the Public Account; and he has then paid this cheque into the credit of the Public Account, which accordingly has been left exactly as it was before. At the same time he has, in his Treasury books, debited "Treasurer's Advance Account" with £200,000, and has credited "Treasurer's Advance Account Trust Account" with the same amount. He has next proceeded to operate upon this Trust Account by fresh Warrants and cheques, the earlier Warrant, as I have said, being regarded as exhausted by the £200,000 cheque.

This course seems to me to involve proceedings which, if not actually illegal, are at least questionable. The drawing of a cheque for the mere purpose of making a cross entry and opening a Trust Account may not be forbidden by section 14 of the Audit Act, but it is, at any rate, to be avoided where it is not absolutely necessary. Here it seems to me unnecessary. The Public Account in the Bank must no doubt be kept in accordance with the Act, but the Treasurer can keep his own books as he likes. Whether he chooses to call the account now in question "Treasurer's Advance Account" or "Treasurer's Advance Account Trust Account" can matter very little; the name can neither enlarge nor restrict his rights; he can pass the same entries in the one as in the other; his powers depend upon the nature of the thing, not upon the name attached to it. He can, therefore, open an account in his books quite as well without as with the preliminary Warrant and cheque which it has been the custom to draw out, and can operate upon it in exactly the same way.

Further, when money drawn under a Warrant containing items under the Treasurer's Advance Account has, by Vote of Parliament for the specific service, or by refund, or otherwise, become available for recoup of that account, it has been the practice to obtain a further Warrant, to draw under it a cheque on the Public Account, and to pay such cheque in to the Public Account, again leaving that account as if the cheque had not been drawn at all. Entries have then been passed in the Treasurer's books, debiting the special head of service, and crediting the "Treasurer's Advance Account Trust Account."

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This course seems to me to be open to the same doubt as the other. The cheque is not drawn to pay any account, for the account has been already paid and the proper acquittance obtained; it is drawn merely to be paid in again, and to make cross-entries in the Public Account corresponding with crossentries in the Treasurer's books. But, as I have already said, these entries can be made in the Treasurer's books just as well if they do not, as if they do, appear in the Public Account. Let me illustrate:— Salaries to the amount of, say, £1,000 fall due before they are voted. A warrant is therefore

made out by the Treasurer containing the item "Treasurer's Advance Account,  $\pounds 1,000$ ." The Auditor-General having satisfied himself that there is  $\pounds 1,000$  available under the Treasurer's Advance Vote, certifies that the said sum is "legally available for and applicable to" that head of service. The cheque is then drawn, the salaries paid, and acquittances obtained. Some time afterwards the Legislature votes the £1,000 for the payment of these salaries. A warrant is then drawn up, under the proper head of service, for the £1,000, but no cheque is wanted, because the salaries have been already paid. The better course now, I think, is that suggested by the Auditor-General, viz., to apply the former cheque and acquittances to this later warrant, to which they now properly belong, and to recredit the item to the former warrant and to the Treasurer's Advance Account in the Treasury books. Very probably there may be some awkwardness about this, but the system could, I have no doubt, be adjusted to it, and it would be much more logical and consistent with the wording of the Audit Act.

Again, some service has to be performed which is not yet provided for, and the precise cost of which is not known. A warrant and cheque for, say, £50, are drawn under the Treasurer's Advance Account, and the cash is forwarded to the proper officer. The service becomes unnecessary, or costs less than was anticipated, and a refund comes to the Treasury, whence it goes to the Public Account. This refund can then be recredited to the warrant, and to the Treasurer's Advance Account in the Treasury books, and becomes again available, without any fresh warrant or cheque.

I answer the Auditor-General's questions as follows :---

- 1. I do not say that cheques drawn merely to be paid in again-merely as vouchers, and not to draw money out or to pay any account-are prohibited by section 14. A mere authority to the Bank to make a cross-entry in the Public Account-which is all that the cheques complained of aremay not be cheques "issued "-notwithstanding the use of the word in the prior section-within the meaning of section 14, which seems only to contemplate cheques which are drawn really to pay accounts and to get acquittances. Suppose a sum of money were paid into the Public Account by mistake. It seems absurd to say that a cheque could not be drawn to rectify the error without violating section 14. However, I think it is safer, and more in accordance with the intention of the Act, to draw no cheques except for the actual payment of accounts, unless good occasion arises for doing so.
- 2. If I understand this properly-of which I am not sure-I think that cheques, when drawn under a Treasurer's Advance Account Warrant, may be charged first to that account, and afterwards, under a fresh warrant, to the specific head of service, as soon as that is available.
- 3. I think that this would be the preferable course.
- 4. It seems to me that the Auditor-General is right in supposing that the freedom of operating on the Treasurer's Advance Account would not be hampered by this method. If it could be shown to me that it would be hampered I should consider that fact a strong argument against the propriety of the course now suggested. The Treasurer has a legal right to operate upon that account, as explained in my former Opinion, and if he cannot do so under the proposed method that method stands condemned.
- 5. I certainly think, as at present advised, that this view is correct.

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I wish to add that the questions raised are mixed questions of book-keeping and law. As to the law, I do not say that it is actually illegal to draw a cheque for a cross-entry, or to certify a second warrant when the cheque under the first has been used for a mere cross-entry. But I do say that doubt is avoided, the apparent intention of the Act more closely adhered to, and a more logical and consistent system set up by the method now suggested than by the existing practice.

#### Instrument No. 213.

INFORMATION is requested as to whether any, and if so what, sums have been raised under the Act 56 Vic. No. 24, as there are doubts, in view of clause 7 of the Act quoted, whether in the absence of moneys actually raised for the purpose a certificate of legal availability ought to issue. THE question raised on these instruments has been referred for the opinion of the Attorney-General. Pending a reply, it is suggested that a minute of the Governor and Executive Council be obtained to apply so much of the moneys raised under the Funded Stock Act of 1892, 56 Victoria No. 1, as may be required to meet this and other demands under the Loan Acts 56 Vic. No. 24 and 55 No. 35, and thus give effect to clause 8 of the Act quoted, namely, 56 Vic. No. 1.

Clause 8 of the Funded Stock Act of 1892 runs thus:—"All sums of money raised by the sale of stock shall be carried by the Colonial Treasurer to the credit of the General Loan Account, and shall be applicable only to the purposes of such Loan Services as have been or may hereafter be authorised by Parliament." Is it necessary to obtain Executive authority when the law is so emphatic as to the application of the money raised by sale of stock ?—J.J.H., 8/12/93.

I regret the Auditor-General should have submitted this matter to the Honorable the Attorney-General without giving the Treasury officers an opportunity of putting their views also before him. The clause 7 referred to was inserted in the Loan Act of 1888 by me at the instance of the Auditor-General, but it was not intended to cover the position now taken by the Auditor-General. The Loan Fund Amalgamation Act provides that moneys raised by Loan under any Loan Act shall be available for Loan Services authorised by any Act. It would be an unbusinesslike operation to pay interest on borrowed money which could not be used and at the same time borrow further sums to carry out works. Notwithstanding a similar clause to that quoted has appeared in each Loan Act since 1888, this is the first time the Auditor-General has demurred to signing warrants so far as I am aware. If the warrants are not signed we shall be put to serious inconvenience, as claims from contractors are always urgent.—F.K., 8/12/93.

# The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Remark on Reply, Treasury, No. 93/750, to Auditor-General's Memorandum of 7th December, 1893.

As the question referred to the Attorney-General affects the Auditor-General's own action under the Audit Act, it is not clear on what ground the Treasury claim to interpose. The Auditor-General is clearly of opinion that the application of any moneys raised under the Funded Stock Act 56 Victoria No. 1, in terms of clause 8, must interfere with any action that may be found necessary to take under the Loan Acts affected by that clause, and consequently it is of the utmost importance that there be an authoritative sanction to the specific application of the funds raised as indicated in clause 8.

As such an authority must sooner or later be furnished, it is again requested that a minute of the Governor and Executive Council be obtained as early as possible and thus give effect to clause 8.

The Auditor-General would feel obliged by a sight of the papers on which clause 7 of the Loan Act of 1888 was inserted at his instance.

# MEMORANDUM.

# The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade to The Auditor-General.

WITH regard to the clause inserted in the Loan Bill prepared by me in 1888, I am unable to find any papers in the matter. I am perfectly certain, however, that it would not have been inserted had not someone suggested it; and I was under the impression and believed it was so inserted at the instance of the Auditor-General. I shall be glad to hear from that officer that he did not make such a suggestion. As, however, difficulties have arisen thereunder not contemplated by me, the clause will be eliminated in future Bills. It was intended to settle the matter of the application of Loan moneys once and for all by the Loan Act Amalgamation Act of 1879; and as the clause now referred to would seem to be contrary to the provisions of that Act, it was an error to allow it to be inserted. It is somewhat remarkable that,

236

after signing warrants during the past five years without question as to the Acts under which moneys were raised, the Auditor-General should suddenly discover a legal technicality which, in his opinion, necessitated a reference to the Attorney-General.

Respecting this same reference, I may point out that the Treasury officers are more concerned in the signing of a warrant than the Auditor-General is or can possibly be. Consequently, being the persons most concerned in the matter, it surely would not be too much to expect that an opportunity of expressing their views should have been afforded, the more especially as opinions on ex parte statements are given with diffidence, and are liable to be qualified.

An Executive minute has now been prepared, not because it is thought necessary, but to expedite the signing of the warrants, the non-signing of which compels the Treasury to defer payment; and contractors are already murmuring over the delay in the settlement of their claims. 19/12/93.

I have the honor to request that you will have the goodness to submit, for the opinion of the Attorney-General, the enclosed statement of a case arising out of the terms of the 7th clause of the Loan Act of 1893, 56 Victoria No. 24, in connection with the 5th clause of the same Act and with the 12th clause of the Audit Act of 1870.

Seeing that no Loan has been raised under the Loan Act of 1893, I have considerable doubt as to how far in those circumstances I should be justified in certifying to the Governor that any amount which the Treasurer may set forth in any instrument in the form of the Second Schedule to the Audit Act of 1870 is legally available or applicable for the purpose for which it may be asked under the Act 56 Victoria No. 24.

It is right to say that hitherto such certificates have been issued with respect only to the fact that an appropriation has been made by Parliament for the sum certified to, and without respect to the question whether or not Loans have been actually raised for the purposes of such appropriations, and also in the belief that the Loan Fund Amalgamation Act, 42 Victoria No. 16, allowed of such certificates so long as any Loan money was supposed to be on hand for issue.

My attention, however, has been drawn to the fact that whatever may have been the intention of the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act, the operation of that Act is expressly excluded from being applied to the Act 56 Victoria No. 24 by the 7th clause already referred to. The same limitation clause exists also in all the Acts subsequent to 48 Victoria No. 26, excepting 52 Victoria No. 16.

Copies of Audit Act and Loan Act of 1893 enclosed for reference.

May I request your earliest attention to this matter.

#### CASE for the opinion of the Attorney-General.

Subject :- Effect of the limitation clause No. 7, Loan Act of 1893, in connection with clause 5 of the same Act, upon the interpretation of the terms "legally available or applicable," as employed in clause 12 of the Audit Act of 1870.

THE Loan Act of 1893 authorises the raising of sums of money not exceeding £879,806, for application to services specified therein (clause 1). All sums borrowed thereunder are to be appropriated and

to services specified therein (clause 1). All sums borrowed thereunder are to be appropriated and applied as required to the several services and purposes specified (clause 2). All payments made by the Treasurer of such sums under the warrant of the Governor "shall be charged upon and payable out of the sum so borrowed or applied" (clause 5). Clause 7 enacts that "Nothing in this Act, or in the 'Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879,' shall authorise the use of any sums of money borrowed thereunder for works or services other than those named therein, and approved by Parliament in terms of the 'Public Works Act of 1888.'" Clause 12 of the Audit Act of 1870 contains the following proviso, viz. :—" Provided that in case the said Auditor-General shall find that the sums therein mentioned or any of them are not then legally available or applicable to the services or purposes therein set forth he shall return the said instrument to the Treasurer for correction, attaching thereto a paper setting forth in writing the sum or sums not found by him to be legally available or applicable as aforesaid." No Loan having been raised, so far as shown by the Treasury Accounts, pursuant to the Act

OPINION

#### OPINION of the Honorable the Attorney-General.

I AM of opinion that the Auditor-General will be justified in certifying to the Governor that the sums asked for by the Colonial Treasurer in the form of the Second Schedule to the Audit Act for issue under the Act 56 Vie. No. 24 (the Loan Act of 1893), are "legally available for and applicable to" the services authorised by that Act.

The Loan Act of 1893 must be read with the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879 (42 Vic. No. 16), for the terms of the last-mentioned Act seem to me to render such a course necessary unless the expressions contained in the later Act are so very strong as to amount to an implied repeal, and the question whether an implied repeal is intended by the Loan Act of 1893 appears to find an emphatic answer in the negative in the terms of section 7 of this Act, which, to my mind, carefully imports the "Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879" as a prime factor in the consideration of the application of Loan Funds. By section 3 of that Act, the terms thereof are made applicable to all loans to be raised under the authority of any special Loan Act "hereafter,"—*i.e.*, after the Act of 1879—"to be passed," and the "Loan Fund" may be applied to the services in any (then) future Act. This section, then, would apply to the Act of 1893 unless expressly, or by necessary implication, excluded, and section 7 of the Act of 1893 indicates the intention not to exclude but to import the whole Act.

Some difficulty may be raised by the terms of section 2 of the Loan Act of 1893, but looking at the strong prevailing intention of the two Statutes taken together, I think the provision at the end of this section must be read as directory to the Treasurer in respect of the keeping of his accounts, and whatever its operation may be as to the use of the loan authorised in 1893, when raised, it does not, in my opinion, prevent the application of portion of the General Loan Fund in the manner desired.

Section 5, on the whole, presents no difficulty in the way of the construction I adopt.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 22nd instant relating to the case submitted to Mr. Attorney-General Barton, and his opinion thereon, in which you state that the case as put, and the opinion founded thereupon, implies the existence of loan funds on hand, however raised, and you desire to know further whether, in the event of there being no balance of cash to the credit of the General Loan Account, or in the event of that account being overdrawn, you would still be justified in issuing a certificate of legal availability or applicability.

I may state that I am inclined to think that your view is the correct one, namely, that the Loan Acts do not provide for any such contingency as mentioned above, but only apparently for action after moneys are raised as authorised thereby, and that a warrant of the Governor could not properly issue until loan moneys were in hand sufficient to meet it.

It will be noticed that the Loan Act in question (56 Vic. No. 24) authorises the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to raise by sale of Debentures or issue of Stock certain sums of money, and these sums are to be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, placed to a separate credit, and appropriated and applied as required. Section 5 then provides that the Treasurer shall issue and pay "the said several sums for the purpose mentioned," in such manner and in such proportions as the Governor by Warrant may from time to time order and direct.

The amount of the payment so made shall be a charge upon, and payable out of the sums "so borrowed or applied as aforesaid."

Under these provisions it seems to me clear that the Warrant is not to issue until the sum upon which it is charged, or out of which it is payable, has been borrowed and placed to the credit of the Loan Account as directed by the earlier section of the Act.

The provisions of the Audit Act, relating to the issue of your certificate, seem to point to the same conclusion. It provides (section 11) that all moneys "paid into the Bank" shall be drawn in a particular manner, namely, "A certain instrument in the form in the Second Schedule, setting forth the amount required, and this is to be signed by the Treasurer, and countersigned in the form prescribed by the Auditor-General (section 12)." Before countersigning, the Auditor-General is to ascertain that the sums therein mentioned are then legally available.

These provisions seem to show, that before countersigning this instrument the moneys should be standing to the credit of the account, otherwise it can hardly be said that they are legally available.

However,

However, as the matter was dealt with by the late Attorney-General, and it is no doubt of some importance, I should prefer that the above be not taken as a final opinion, but I would recommend that the question be referred through the Honorable the Colonial Treasurer for the consideration of the Honorable the Attorney-General. If this is done, and all papers are sent to me, I will take steps for bringing the case under the immediate notice of the Attorney-General, as the matter is apparently an I have, &c., urgent one.

The introduction of the 7th clause into the Loan Act was not, so far as I can remember, suggested by me. The probability is that it was considered necessary in view of the Public Works Act of 1888. The clause had apparently been included in the Act 52 Victoria No. 16, but withdrawn while it is retained in the Act 52 Victoria No. 17. Whether eliminated or not in future Loan Bills as it stands it may still in some form be necessary in view of the Public Works Act of 1888.

I am glad to find that a minute has been prepared for the Executive Council in the matter of the 8th section of the Act 56 Victoria No. 1, and hope that you will be in a position to forward it to me I have, &c., before the close of the year.

I enclose his reply, from which you will perceive that he is of opinion that before countersigning an instrument in the form of the Second Schedule to the Audit Act for the issue of moneys raised by loan, those moneys must be standing to the credit of the account, otherwise it can hardly be said that they are legally available; and this view entirely coincides with that I have recently been led to entertain by a study of the several Loan Acts. Mr. Smith is, however, desirous of having his opinion confirmed by the Attorney-General, but in the meanwhile I shall feel bound to withhold my certificate whenever the Loan Fund is exhausted. I desire, at the same time, to state my firm conviction that until moneys are actually received for the purposes of a Loan Services Act and credited to the General Loan Account, the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act cannot be legitimately made to say that moneys raised under any Loan Act may be applied to services for which no money has been raised and placed to their credit.
