

OF THE

AUDITOR-GENERAL

ON

THE TREASURER'S STATEMENT OF THE RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE OF THE CONSOLIDATED REVENUE FUND, AND OTHER MONEYS, FOR THE YEAR 1890.

(Under Act 33 Victoria No. 18).

1. The accompanying Statements of the Treasurer's Receipts and Disbursements during the year 1890 were received for examination on the 25th March, and were returned for correction and suggested amendments on the 22nd June. The Statements were received back from the Treasury on the 24th July, amended as required, except in one case of small amount, which could not well be corrected until this year, and I have now the honor to submit those Statements of the Public Accounts for 1890 to the Legislative Assembly, with the following Report and explanations, as directed by the 38th section of the Audit Act of 1870.

GENERAL STATE OF THE BALANCES.

2. The year's transactions show in gross the following results in respect of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, the Loans Fund, and the Trust Fund, as forming in combination the General Public Account of the Colony, viz.:—

3. It may be convenient to notice here that with the opening of the year the conduct of the banking business of the Government was placed on a new footing, the contract with the nine associated Banks having expired by effluxion of time on the 31st December, 1889. Correspondence respecting the change was laid before the Legislative Assembly on the 10th December, 1889, from which it may be gathered that no new contract was to be entered into.

There is accordingly now no agreement with the Banks individually or collectively. The Government deals with the Banks in the same way as any private individual keeping a banking account, and the new arrangement would appear to have secured a considerable advantage to the Public Account over that previously existing under contract with the nine associated Banks and the London and Westminster Bank in London.

THE DEFICIENCY DEBT AND REDEMPTION ACCOUNT.

6. The Deficiency Debt, which forms the basis of the "Treasury Bills Deficiency Act of 1889," was computed to amount to £2,608,236 12s. 10d., as set forth in the Colonial Treasurer's Estimate of Ways and Means for the year 1889. Upon that basis the Act 53 Victoria No. 9 authorises Treasury Bills to be issued, bearing interest at 4 per cent. per annum, to an amount not exceeding £2,600,000, as occasion may require, with the proviso among others that all sums of money raised by the issue of Treasury Bills under the Act shall be carried to and form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

- 7. By a Treasury Memorandum, dated 14th July, 1890, the deficiency was reduced to £2,523,883 16s. 6d., but, on a careful examination of the figures making up that sum it is found that they come somewhat short, both in the expenditure and in the sums claimed as a set-off against it. Following on the lines of the Treasury Statement, and carrying the Account down to the end of 1890, the correct total would appear to be £2,503,785 14s. 3d., subject to a possible reduction on a reserved liability of £10,645 8s. A memorandum showing how the amount is arrived at is given in Appendix B, but as the Treasury are not disposed to accept the amended figures it is considered proper that the correspondence on the subject should be placed in that Appendix.
- 8. During 1889, as formerly reported, Treasury Bills were issued to the amount of £1,907,100, and the proceeds duly carried to the credit of the Revenue Account, leaving upon the Treasury Statement of 14th July, 1890, an apparent balance to be raised of £616,784. For that amount Bills were prepared in August, 1890, but were not negotiated. The Revenue Account was consequently not benefited thereby, there being no proceeds to carry to its credit. Notwithstanding the nominal value (upon negotiation) is taken credit for as part of the receipts on account of the Revenue.
- 9. The computation of the deficiency above quoted commences with a cash overdraft at 31st December, 1886, and assumes that the Revenue Account was to close at that date, subject to outstanding assets and liabilities being realised and discharged, and that the Revenue Account from the 1st January, 1887, was to be kept distinct and free from all items affecting that for 1886 and previous years. But as the Revenue Account cannot in strictness be absolutely closed at any date, under any existing legal provision, it may be of service to show here the progress of that Account, as a cash account only, in gross to the end of 1890, on the same principle on which the actual overdraft at 31st December, 1886, is made the starting point of the Deficiency Statement, and so to arrive at the balance under similar circumstances to that given at the close of the year 1886. The following are the figures:—

10. Inasmuch, however, as the overdraft was temporarily relieved at 31st December, 1889, by the proceeds of Treasury Bills to an extent of £1,907,100, the actual cash overdraft at 31st December, 1890, was reduced apparently to £182,525 6s. 7d.

The redemption of the Treasury Bills was to be effected by the application thereto of £150,000 annually from the Consolidated Revenue Fund—the first payment to be made on the 31st December, 1890, to the credit of a Special Trust Fund Account in a Bank doing the Government business—and so on annually until the said Treasury Bills are finally extinguished. Out of such Special Trust Fund the Colonial Treasurer is directed to "pay off and redeem" such Treasury Bills from time to time, so far as there may be moneys at the credit of the said Special Trust Fund Account.

- 12. Towards complying with that provision a sum of £150,000 was, on the 30th of December, drawn from the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and placed in the Australian Joint Stock Bank; but there is no entry of the reissue of that sum, while, by the Account given at page 51 as that of the Treasury Bills Redemption Fund, credit is taken for the redemption of three Treasury Bills, to the aggregate amount of £150,000—those three Bills being a portion of those prepared but not negotiated. It is obvious, therefore, that as no money was ever received for those Bills there was no recipient for the nominal value of them, except the Consolidated Revenue Fund, to the credit of which that nominal value had been placed. The result of the transaction, or rather of the Treasury entries, is that, although in compliance with the Act, the Revenue Fund paid £150,000 to an Account from which that sum has not since been drawn and paid away to an actual holder of negotiated Bills to that amount, the sum in question must be now either at the credit of the Special Trust Fund, or it has found its way back to the Consolidated Revenue Fund.
- 13. The effect of the operation is simply that a credit having been taken for £616,784 without cash to represent it, the apparent credit balance on that account

account is stated as £434,258 13s. 5d., at the 31st December, with a reduction of the unnegotiated Bills from £616,784 to £466,784, the difference between this latter sum and the balance augmented thereby being the cash overdraft of £32,525 6s. 7d., stated above.

CONDITION OF THE REVENUE ACCOUNT.

15. It thus appears that treated as a Cash Account the Consolidated Revenue Fund proper was overdrawn at 31st December, 1890, to the extent of £32,525 6s. 7d., with a liability for redemption of Treasury Bills issued to the amount of £1,907,100, or an excess over the cash overdraft at 31st December, 1886, of £653,043 17s. 3d., or in other words that at the close of the year the Revenue Cash Account was in debt to the amount of £1,939,625 6s. 7d.

16. Deducting from both sides of the account of cash operations, during the years 1887 to 1890, the items that have been taken into consideration as belonging to and completing the deficiency Statement upon the Accounts for the year 1886 and previous years,—the receipts and payments in gross for the period 1887 to 1890 result in a balance credit of £557,310 5s. 8d., and consequently in a reduction to that extent of the cash overdraft at 31st December upon the Revenue Account as a whole. In other words, the figures given above may be restated thus;—

17. The Revenue Account has, however, credit for the balance of temporary cash payments unrecovered at 31st December to the amount of £535,864 17s. 1d. for the Centennial Park, General Post Office Approaches, Treasurer's Advance Vote, and other minor items, as shown in paragraph 2.

Deducting the amount from the above recoverable sum, £3,795 6s., which belongs to the Deficiency Account, there remain to the credit of the Account 1887 to 1890, as temporary recoverable issues, £532,069 11s. 1d., which, with the above stated contribution to the deficiency of 1886, £557,310 5s. 8d., make a total balance credit of £1,089,379 16s. 9d. as the result of the receipts and payments limited to the cash transactions proper to the years 1887 to 1890 inclusive, upon the assumption that the Revenue Account is to be dealt with as clear from the 1st January, 1887, of all intromissions in respect of assets and liabilities prior to that date and in respect of issues and adjustments of a temporary character since.

On the other hand, as was the case to a smaller extent in 1889, there was an overdraft on the account of the Railway Commissioners at the Australian Joint Stock Bank for working expenses, &c., of £116,665 12s. 3d., most of which was chargeable to the Revenue Account. This might have been adjusted within the year under the Supplementary Vote of £123,350, passed on the 20th December, but it would, of course, have occasioned an increased overdraft on the Revenue Account for so much of the amount due to the bank as was chargeable to it.

- 18. Under the conditions above explained the current revenue is, of course, chargeable with such claims as may accrue in connection with any service sanctioned by Regulations, by Statutes, or by the Annual Appropriation Acts, in addition to those already satisfied up to the close of the year 1890. In Appendix A is given, as usual, as full a statement as can be ascertained of the liability incurred for the year, and of the contingent balance which remained to be met at 31st December. So long as the existing system of appropriating the revenue continues there must always be the uncertain element of outstanding charges, and the want of finality thus arising gives occasion for apparent discrepancies in Statements of Revenue and Expenditure, when such Statements are made up to different dates, and upon estimates instead of actualities, which are not always easy of a popular explanation. The only satisfactory annual Account of the Public Income and Expenditure is one based upon an appropriation confined to sums actually payable out of the current revenue within each year, any surplus or deficiency that might thus appear upon an account stated being carried forward to the following year's account.
- 19. The Appropriation Act for 1890, having followed so closely upon the Appropriation Act for 1889, contains no supplementary items for previous years, and is in this respect almost unique; but a large number of Services for 1890 required supplementary funds, which were thus thrown forward into the Appropriation Act for 1891. That Act was passed on the 20th December, 1890, and consequently very many of the supplementary items contained in it, which had previously been paid out of the Treasurer's Advance Vote, or were waiting Parliamentary sanction for payment, appear in the Accounts now under review. The amount of those supplementary items for 1890 and previous years was £585,599 18s. 8d.
- 20. There appears also in the appropriations for 1890 a new arrangement in regard to votes for Public Works, which partially extends the provisions of the

18th section of the Audit Act, beyond services for fixed establishments, to special votes for Public Works remaining unexpended, by the following condition attached to the gross votes for all branches of the Public Works and Services, under the Department of the Secretary for Public Works, numbered 190 to 196, viz.:— "Irrespective of dates of claims, and subject to such alterations within the limit of the total vote for each branch as the exigencies of any case may demand from time to time, the excess on any item being available for a deficiency on any other, exclusive of salaries."

- 21. This provision was understood to mean that any item in the Schedule to a gross vote might be exceeded, so long as it created no excess upon the total vote, whereas the liberty to vary the amounts of the items is limited to the use of any excess of appropriation for one item to meet a short appropriation for the service of another item. Thus if each Scheduled item required the full amount provided for it no excess of expenditure upon either of them could be met, except by an additional vote, but should such an excess of expenditure not come to account until the similar vote for the following year became available, that excess would become payable out of the new vote. Should, however, by such process, the total vote for (say) Roads and Bridges be found insufficient to provide for the completion of all the works embraced in the Roads and Bridges Schedule for any year, it would of course be necessary to ask for a vote in extension of the sum originally set apart for the Roads and Bridges service. But it might not be necessary to obtain such extension in every case of a deficiency in a subordinate line of the Detailed Schedule of proposed expenditure. In connection with this subject attention is invited to paragraphs 6 to 8, page 109 of my Report upon the Public Accounts of the year 1883.
- 22. The principle underlying the provisions of the 18th section of the Audit Act is that the whole amount voted by Parliament as Ways and Means may be applied, as the exigencies of the Public Service may render necessary, to any voted service within the total grant of Ways and Means, subject only to any variations in the amount of the expenditure from the estimated proportions as voted in Committee of Supply, being sanctioned by the Governor in Council and reported to Parliament at the earliest opportunity.
- 23. Although not stated in the condition above quoted, I considered it necessary, nevertheless, to obtain the authority of the Governor in Council for the variations allowed by it, and a copy of the first and only authority of the kind issued in 1890 is given in the *Appendix* C. Several others have been granted since, but they will come more properly under notice in the Report upon the present year's Accounts.

THE TRUST FUNDS ACCOUNT.

- 24. The balance at the credit at the ordinary Trust Funds has improved during the year to the extent of £94,226 19s. 7d., and now shows a gross total of £2,987,845 2s. 10d., of which £2,336,627 12s. 3d. are represented by securities lodged in the Treasury chest, £600 by Debentures on account of the Lunacy Trust, in the Commercial Bank of Sydney, and the remainder by a working cash balance of £650,617 10s. 7d. in the General Public Account.
- 25. A considerable increase of funds has also accrued in the separate accounts of the Master in Equity and the Master in Lunacy, the year closing with a joint credit balance of £394,146 17s. 9d., as against £281,865 17s. 6d. on the 31st December, 1889, £235,000 being invested in Treasury Bills.

26. The Civil Service Superannuation Account exhibits an increased credit of £36,529 18s. upon the year—the gross receipts having reached £98,054 3s. 9d., the gross disbursements, £61,524 5s. 9d., and the augmented balance, at 31st December, having been £398,649 2s. 3d., of which £310,000 were invested in Treasury Bills. The detailed list of the respective recipients of pensions and gratuities have been omitted this year from the Treasurer's Statement. So far as the pensioners are concerned, their names and annual pensions are recorded in the Blue Books, and it does not appear to be necessary to report them year by year in these Accounts. A list is, however, given in Appendix D of the new pensions that have come upon the pay list during the year, and of those which have ceased by death.

On comparison with the Account of 1889 it appears that the amount paid within the year for pensions was increased by a sum of £14,721 5s. 9d., while the gratuities were less by £4,154 1s. 10d. than in 1889. The ordinary income credited in 1890 amounted to £83,228 9s. 6d., and the ordinary charges for pensions and gratuities amounted to £56,064 8s. 6d., thus showing a nominal margin of £27,164 1s. to credit on the year's ordinary receipts and payments.

The annual rate of authorised pensions, exclusive of those provided from Schedule B, at 31st December, was computed at £53,293 13s. 2d. The annual rate of new pensions that came on charge during 1890 was £13,379 19s. 9d., while there fell in through death pensions to an annual amount of £1,445 1s. Further information as to this fund is given in the Annual Reports of the Civil Service Board. The Report for 1890 was laid before Parliament on the 29th July.

27. The pensions and gratuities paid from the Police Superannuation Fund aggregated £15,293 18s. 2d., showing a very small increase over the figures for 1889. The income also produced very nearly the same amount as for the previous year, or about one-half of the annual liability, the difference as on former occasions being made good by a transfer of surplus funds from the Police Reward Fund Account.

The combined accounts show a total income of £15,630 1s. 7d., with a total expenditure of £17,174 Ss. 8d., and a joint balance credit of £40,898 13s. 9d. at 31st December, 1890, or a reduction of £1,544 7s. 1d. upon the similar balance at the same date of 1889.

28. In the Railway Stores Account there occurs a payment of £4,812, being the cost of machinery imported for a trial electric tramway between Waverley and There being no vote for such a service the payment was challenged as not a proper charge upon the Railway Stores Account. Although made a Trust Account for convenience of working upon the principle of a cash credit, the capital for the Railway Stores Account was provided by two loan votes, making £300,000 in all, for the purpose of paying for purchases of rails and other material in bulk required for voted services, and to be distributed thereto as issued. The funds at the credit of that Account should not therefore be employed for purchases on account of services in anticipation of their being provided for by votes, and the sum in question was accordingly disallowed in the Treasurer's Accounts. The payment was made in July, 1890, the order for the machinery having of course been given some months at least prior to that date. Provision was made in the Loan Act of 1890, passed on 20th December, for Expenses of Experiments in connection with Electric Trams, but the transfer of the charge of £4,812 to that vote was only made quite recently.

- 29. This is but a smaller example of what occurred in the Accounts of 1888, when a sum of £85,000 had to be drawn from the General Loan Account to replenish the Railway Stores Account, and thus enable it to bear temporarily the cost of rails purchased for a then unauthorised line of railway. The General Loan Account was still a creditor for the £85,000, at the close of the year, but efforts are now being made to replace that advance.
- 30. It has also been found desirable to establish a new Stores Account for Railway Construction Services, to relieve the General Railway Stores Account of transactions that create embarrassment between the Accounts for works under the Railway Commissioners, and for construction purposes under the Engineer-in-Chief for the construction of new lines of railway. For this purpose a loan vote of £200,000 was taken in the Temporary Supply Act 54 Victoria No. 19, and confirmed in the final Act 54 Victoria No. 33, but it was not acted upon until March of the present year, when, as in the old account, it was made a separate Cash Credit Trust Account in terms of the vote.

THE TREASURER'S ADVANCE ACCOUNT.

- 31. The Treasurer's Advance Vote for 1889 was recredited to the Revenue Account in sufficient time to allow of its being adjusted within the prescribed date, the 31st December, 1890. Owing, however, to the exhaustion of the Advance Vote for 1890, pending the passing of the Appropriation Act for 1891, with its large Supplementary Services for 1889 and 1890, considerable drafts were made upon the funds, which had accumulated for the adjustment of the vote for 1889, and were applied to meet pressing current claims. As the annual advance to the Treasurer is understood to be given as sufficient for, and is held to be available only for, the exigencies of the year for which the vote is granted, with an allowance of twelve months' time to adjust the same, the drafts referred to have been dealt with as wanting the sanction of Parliament, and have, accordingly, been excluded from the Certificates of Discharge to the Treasurer. The disallowance on that head amounts to £81,136 15s. 1d.
- 32. The corresponding vote for 1890 was subjected also to heavy drafts for services in anticipation chiefly of provision being made for the same by a Loan Act. To recoup the Advance Vote for 1890, for the amount so issued, a Temporary Supply Act—the only one of the year—was passed in October (54 Victoria No. 19) including a provision for further payments in anticipation of sums to be raised by loan. Of the amount so provided, the Treasurer's Advance Account obtained credit for £75,939 12s. 7d. At the close of the year the Advance Vote for 1890 showed a credit balance of £42,350 15s. 7d. In Appendix E will be found a Statement of the Services to which the remainder of the vote had been applied, but not then adjusted, amounting on the whole to £157,649 4s. 5d.

GENERAL LOAN ACCOUNT.

33. The only addition to the credit of the General Loan Account during the year was the balance of the last loan of three and a half millions, negotiated in July, 1889, viz., £2,026,210 8s. 2d. Full particulars of that loan were given in last year's Report. With that addition there became available for Loan Expenditure during 1890 (subject to an exception stated further on) a total sum of £4,208,235

18s. 9d., out of which there was expended £2,859,218 13s. 3d., leaving at the close of the year a cash balance of £1,349,017 5s. 6d. The details of the expenditure are given at pages 65 to 73. They include payments to the amount of £2,769,016 3s. 3d., for which no loan has yet been raised, and similar remarks apply to this anomaly in the General Loan Account as were made in previous Reports.

- 34. It may be noticed that in these Accounts a number of services are now quoted as paid for under the Special Acts required by the Public Works Act of 1889, in connection with the Acts authorising the raising of loans to meet the cost of carrying out those services. A considerable amount had, however, been expended under the Acts 48 Victoria No. 26 and 52 Victoria No. 17, prior to the passing of the Public Works Act of 1888, or to otherwise obtaining proper authority for it, and also prior to the passing of Special Acts authorising the works described therein to be constructed.
- 35. An illustrative case occurred in relation to the construction of a line of railway from Culcairn to Corowa, for which a sum not exceeding £210,000 had been authorised to be raised by the Act 48 Victoria No. 26. The construction of that line had been negatived by the Legislative Council. It was, however, subsequently sanctioned by the Special Act 54 Victoria No. 3, passed 6th August, 1890, but at a lower cost, viz., £188,765. Nevertheless, a payment of £83 5s. was made for lithographing plans in connection with that Service on the 23rd June previous, and charged as an expense under 48 Victoria No. 26.

This was challenged, on the ground that the Act 48 Victoria No. 26 gave no authority for it in the circumstances, and that the account could only be allowed to pass as a charge on the Act 54 Victoria No. 3, and then upon the joint sanction of the Colonial Treasurer and the Secretary for Public Works. That authority was subsequently supplied. (Vide Appendix F.) To legalise that class of expenditure it is necessary that Parliamentary sanction should be given in some form or other. So far as can at present be readily ascertained, the amount so expended irregularly is £156,901 0s. 4d. Details are given in Appendix G.

36. Some difficulty also occurred in arranging the Warrants asked for by the Treasury for issues under the Acts referred to, but a portion of the difficulty has been met by the special clause No. 9 of the last Loan Act, 54 Victoria No. 33. Although that Act was not passed until the 20th December, 1890, yet no provision is contained in it for the expense of constructing a bridge over the Lachlan at Cowra, a work which had been submitted for the necessary inquiry, and was subsequently authorised to be constructed by the special Act, 54 Victoria No. 6, at a cost of £26,538.

While an absolute authority is provided for carrying out such Public Works as the above by special Act of Authorisation, under section 16 of the Public Works Act of 1888, no definite provision for funds is made to enable the constructing authority to proceed.

37. The Loan Act of 1890, authorising the raising of a further loan of £7,021,757 was passed on the 20th December, the chief items being £2,267,375 for Railways and Tramways, £1,418,759 for Water Supply and Sewerage Works, and £2,007,800 for paying off 5 per cent. Debentures maturing in 1891 and 1892. The introduction into this Act of a clause (3), intended doubtless to settled the disputed question,

question, which formed the subject of correspondence with the Treasury respecting the balance at the credit of the Old Loans' Account, has drawn attention to a certain looseness of expression which has characterised the Loan Acts of recent years in regard to the appropriation of moneys raised by loan.

Strictly construed, the Loan Act of 1890 does no more than authorise "the raising of a loan" to such amount as may be required for, but not to exceed, the several sums respectively set against certain Public Works and Services therein enumerated, and, when such loan shall have been raised, "the placing of the same to the credit of 'The General Loan Account.'" There are no words of appropriation at all of the sums raised to the Services named, and this is a defect which is found in many preceding Loan Acts.

- 38. The "Public Works Loan Act of 1884," quoted in clause 9, in like manner omits any appropriation of the sums authorised to be raised by it, while clause 9 of the "Loan Act of 1890" distinctly appropriates portions of such sums, but quotes them as if already "appropriated" instead of "raised," as correctly quoted in the commencement of the clause.
- 39. Reverting again to clause 3, which commences with the words, "In addition to any of the appropriations hereby made, &c." (a statement evidently an inaccurate one), it may be seen at once that, instead of making the balance of the Old Loans Account available for the Services of the Loan Act of 1890, by a reduction of the total sum to be raised as in a former Act, 36 Victoria No. 2, the clause really puts the amount in a position in which it cannot be used for expenditure, either for new Services or for increase of sums authorised to be raised for such. The whole amount of those old balances is moreover directed to be transferred to a new fund called "The General Loan Fund," a fund distinct from any hitherto recognised in the Public Money Acts.

To utilise the amount in the way intended it will be necessary to materially amend the above quoted clause 3, which might easily have been made to apply directly towards the renewal of the old Debentures, in connection with which the unexpended balances arose, or, still more properly, towards their absolute redemption, so far as the amount would go, instead of perpetuating a debt of already thirty years standing.

This question is more fully stated in correspondence given in Appendix H, with the opinion of the Λ ttorney-General, which was sought by the Treasury on the points raised, and which substantially confirms the views above stated.

The transfer, it may be observed, was not made until this year, but the subject falls naturally to be noticed now in connection with previous remarks. Copies of the vouchers constituting the transfer are given with the correspondence, showing that the amount has been actually placed to the new account entitled "The General Loan Fund."

40. In future Loan Acts, as indicated in paragraph 40 of last year's Report, it is most desirable that there should be a distinct appropriation clause, as in the early Loan Acts, and accompanied by directions as to the disposal of any unexpended balances found to be in excess of requirements, and also of any surplus funds that may arise from the favourable terms on which a loan may happen to be negotiated.

- 41. An example of this latter case occurs in the last loan of July, 1889, which was raised to cover part of the Act, 48 Victoria No. 26, and the whole of the amount authorised to be raised by the Act, 52 Victoria No. 16. The latter Act was passed exclusively for the renewal of loans falling due in 1888, 1889, and 1890, to the amount in all of £1,390,600. The loan for this purpose having been negotiated at a premium there results a sum of £10,413 15s. 5d. over raised as stated at page 102. A reference to the Act 52 Victoria No. 16, will show that there is no provision for such a contingency, and the presumption is that the amount should be transferred to the Consolidated Revenue Fund as has been the case more than once in former years—there being no appropriation to which the money can be applied. It would perhaps, be a more legitimate application of such surpluses, either arising from expenditure short of estimate, or for premiums over principal of loans negotiated, to place them to the credit of a Loans Redemption Fund to be applied, so far as it might go, to the redemption of debentures as they matured. This, however, would require the sanction of Parliament.
- 42. The Public Debt for Loan Services shows a reduction through the operations of the year to the amount of £595,000, which is thus accounted for—

- 43. Classified under the same general heads of service as given in Returns of 1888 and 1889, the net total expenditure for services provided for by loans to the end of 1890, reached the sum of £47,607,770 5s. 4d. A return showing that amount in annual divisions and in continuation of the statement presented with the accounts of 1888, is given in the *Appendix* I up to the 31st December, 1890.
- 44. It must be remarked here, however, that owing to a variety of causes there occur a great many payments, chiefly for Railway Services, that, after a while, have been discovered to be properly chargeable to votes differing from those under which they were originally paid—some Revenue, and some Loan Votes. To adjust these irregularities numerous transfers have to be made, and in many cases the sums have to be credited to the "Over Issues Account," in which, not infrequently, unexpended balances arise, and so to some extent vitiate the accuracy of the expenditure as at first stated. This is especially the case when the corrections are made in a year subsequent to that in which the discrepancies are found to exist.
- 45. The Statement D, at page 96, shows that a total sum of £40,831 18s. 4d. had thus been recredited to Loan Services, and not reissued at the close of the year. In reference to one item in that Statement, viz., £320 3s. 10d. construction of Tramways, 46 Victoria No. 23, an illustration occurs of the difficulty of fixing payments, or transfers, to a particular head. Under that head certain transfers had been reported as made by the Treasury, which, if allowed to stand, would have barred the payment of an account for a larger sum than the balance at credit would admit of. To meet the difficulty the transfers were cancelled by the Treasury as made in 1890, and brought forward again in 1891. By that means a credit balance appears of £320 3s. 10d. instead of an excess.
- 46. The state of the General Loan Account at the 31st December, 1890, may be thus summarised:—

47. It may be proper to notice here that, prior to the passing of the Loan Act of 1890, a sum in all of £246,635 15s. 5d. was advanced by the Consolidated Revenue Fund Proper for Sundry Services which will be found specified at the foot of page 49, but was replaced to the Revenue before the close of the year, as shown at page 21.

With the exception of the last item (otherwise authorised by Act 43 Victoria No. 3) for Sydney Sewerage Works, the sanction of Parliament was given for those advances by the Temporary Supply Act 54 Victoria No. 19. The items included in

that Act, making up £320,261 in all, were subsequently duly covered by the Loan Act of 1890. A reference to the Treasurer's Advance Account Appendix E will show that, over and above the direct expenditure from the General Loan Account, there had been advanced, in anticipation of a future Loan Act, sums amounting to £55,792 14s. 2d.

THE RAILWAY ACCOUNTS.

- 48. Following upon the correspondence given in Appendix J to last year's Report, respecting the question of the personal signatures of the Railway Commissioners to the Accounts of Revenue and Expenditure, placed by the "Government Railways Act of 1888" under their sole control and responsibility, the Governor in Council, at the instance of the Minister for Railways, authorised the Accountant and the Chief Paymaster to the Railway Department to act jointly as the Accounting Officers for Railway Receipts under the Audit Act of 1870. Pursuant to that authority the Attested Accounts and Remittance Vouchers have been passed under the joint signatures of the two officers named. Nevertheless, the arrangement is inadequate to meet the strict requirements of the Audit Act in connection with the Government Railways Act of 1888.
- 49. The authority referred to was limited to the Accounts of Collections, but, as the question was raised also as to the Expenditure documents, a subsequent authority was granted by the Governor in Council, upon a minute of the Minister for Railways, appointing the Accountant alone to be the Accounting Officer for the Railway Expenditure, within the provisions of the Audit Act of 1870. This is an unsatisfactory and, to some extent, an unnecessary arrangement, in view of the provisions of the Railways Act. The correspondence on the subject is given in Appendix J, continuing that contained in Appendix J, to Report on Accounts of 1889 [vide page 156.]
- The cash credit arrangement made in 1889 [vide Appendix D to previous Report] was abandoned early in 1890, and a cash advance of £100,000 was placed in the Bank, under the signatures of two of the Railway Commissioners, and upon a Bank acknowledgment that the amount was placed to their credit. The Treasury minute making the change also extended the application of the advance beyond the payment of wages to "general purposes," and it would thus have been available for discharging all claims chargeable against the Vote for Working Expenses. This is as it should be, but nevertheless a number of claims other than for wages were paid direct by the Treasury. It is to be regretted, when the change of the form of the account was made, that the method of accounting for the Railway Working Expenses Vote, indicated in the correspondence above referred to, was not adopted as affording a better basis for the operations of audit than that which now exists.
- 51. In consequence of the close relationship between the Railway and Tramway Services it is, at certain points, next to impossible to accurately separate the receipts and payments, at least so far as the Treasury Accounts are concerned. It seems, therefore, to be a better course to state the figures for both Services combined in one. This is the more necessary, as the vote for working expenses is now included in one sum for Railways and Tramways.

The proportion of the above receipts contributed by Votes of Parliament, or by other sources, for the value of work done by the Railway Department, and brought to account during the year, amounted to £103,926 6s. 3d. [vide Appendix K], a decrease upon similar credits in 1889 of £28,339 11s. 3d.

52. The relation of the Railway income to the expenditure during 1890 shows still a considerable balance in favour of profit, although somewhat less than that for 1889, the gross receipts having exceeded the gross payments within the year for working expenses by the sum of £965,703 19s. 10d. The gross Cash transactions within each year (now including the Tramway Services) from 1884 to 1890, are as follow, viz.:—

53. The local inspection by this Department of the Railway Station Accounts of passenger and goods traffic has been extended during the past year to 242 stations, but it was found impossible to overtake the 43 remaining stations open for traffic until early this year. Very good results have been obtained by the Inspectors' visits, but with the exercise of every vigilance, it is never quite safe to say that the accounts are absolutely correct—the ingenuity of dishonest minds, if baffled in one direction, ever devising new schemes for defeating the most rigid examination. To meet, in some measure, new devices of the kind, the known mode of procedure by Auditors requires to be varied by what may be termed traverse and retrospective lines of examination. The adoption of such unexpected tests of the operations of those in charge of stations during the past year has been productive

productive of the best results,—notably in one case, which led to the prosecution of the station-master and the goods porter—the former being sentenced to three years' imprisonment.

- 54. In twenty-four cases it was considered necessary to report the condition of matters to the Railway Commissioners as more or less unsatisfactory, and it has been noticed that the number of this class of cases has of late increased considerably. The Commissioners are not slow in acting upon the reports sent in by this Department, and indeed it is a source of great satisfaction to be able to state that, for the most part, in all branches of their accounts, the Commissioners attend promptly, through their officers, to the numerous queries and representations which arise out of the examination of so large a mass of documents as the Railway Service necessarily requires for the record of its transactions.
- 55. The gradual extension of the Railway and Tramway Service throughout the Colony, and its connection with the Railway Services of the adjoining Colonies, will necessarily augment considerably the work connected with the audit of the Railway Accounts, both of receipts and of expenditure. In the meantime, the staff of Inspectors attached to this Department will have to be strengthened to cope, as successfully and as efficiently as hitherto, with the rapidly-increasing collections of Railway Revenue at the local stations throughout the Colony. The intervals between the visits of inspection are at present for many stations too wide to allow of that inspection being so advantageous as it might be, and as it has already in many cases proved to have been, to the Railway Revenue.
- 56. A list of cases is given in *Appendix* L in which additional rates of tolls, or variations in existing rates, were found in operation by the Inspectors without the previous authority of the Governor in Council having been obtained, but which were supplied as promptly as possible in answer to queries by this Department.
- 57. As noted on former occasions, the amount of the actual cash receipts, as credited to the Public Account, and the amount debited in the Railway records as earnings for any year, do not, of course, quite correspond. After a most careful test by my Inspectors of the accuracy of the monthly balance statements compiled by the Railway Traffic Auditor it has been ascertained that the combined accounts of the Railway and Tramway earnings stand as follows at the close of the year:—

The amount stated as for special credits and Refunds (£20,234 7s. 11d.) does not pass through the Treasury Accounts, as it would be almost impracticable to subject them to that process, but they are not allowed to pass until the documents justifying them are produced and thoroughly scrutinised. They number some thousands in the course of a year, and it is noticed that, probably owing to the exercise of such scrutiny by this Department, much greater care is observable than formerly in the Railway Department in dealing with cases of this kind.

Deficiency Account of 1886 and previous years.

The Auditor-General points out that the account for 1886 and previous years, as prepared by him, differs from the account prepared by the Treasury, to the extent of £20,098 2s. 3d, which is accounted for by the Auditor-General having taken into account sums repaid in 1887 and subsequent years, on account of advances made in 1886 and previous years.

It may be pointed out, however, that since the year 1878 repayments to the credit of votes have not been taken in reduction of the expenditure, as I think they should have been, but have been credited

to revenue, under the general heading of Miscellaneous Receipts.

In the year 1887 these repayments amounted to the sum of £23,904 6s. 8d., and this sum will be found in the total of the revenue and receipts for that year, certified as correct by the Auditor-General. Had the Auditor-General objected to this sum being included in the receipts for the year, as he now says part of it was for 1886 and previous years, he should, I think, have pointed it out.

But, even allowing the Auditor-General to be correct, the account is not so bad as at first sight

appears.

It can hardly be contended that repayments for services of the years 1882 and previous years should be taken in reduction of a deficiency which did not occur until long after, as such repayments, if properly dealt with, would have gone to increase the balance at the credit of the account for 1882 and previous years.

In examining the statements of repayments, I find the following sums repaid on account of services of 1882 and previous years, viz.:—

I may be allowed to state that the account for 1886 and previous years is practically closed, there being but one outstanding claim, and, as the deficiency has been met by Treasury Bills, I fail to see that any good purpose could be served by reopening the matter. The account has disappeared from the Ways and Means; part of the deficiency has been redeemed by a charge of £150,000 on the revenue of last year, and, although, strictly speaking, the repayments should have been credited, yet, for the reasons stated, I do not think the account should be disturbed.

Sir,

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, covering a copy of a minute respecting a difference of £20,098 2s. 3d., shown to exist in the Treasury Statement of the Deficiency Debt, from a computation made by me. I have the honor to request that you will have the goodness to express to the Colonial Treasurer my regret that I cannot concur in the views set forth in the minute referred to. Revotes of votes lapsed in previous years are always charged to the year in which or for which the revotes are given. The £10,000 vote referred to was distinctly voted for, and has been paid as a service of, 1889, and is, moreover, adopted in the Ways and Means for 1890 (dated 4th December, 1889) as for the year 1889. It cannot therefore now be drawn in on any ground as a part of the account of 1886 and previous years.

Again, the repayments in 1890 on account of Services, 1876 to 1882, include a repayment on account of the Free Public Library to the amount of £2,314 6s. 6d., while an expenditure of £3,676 10s. 10d., on account of which the repayment is made is charged in 1890 as a part of the Deficiency Debt.

As to the remaining small items, it is obvious that the overdraft at the close of 1886 would have been less if these items had been known and brought to account, whether in 1882, or in any other year prior to 1887, and being now known they are fairly and very properly taken into account in ascertaining what the real position of the account was at 31st December, 1886.

The statement as to a change in the mode of dealing with these repayments does not appear to me to have any bearing on the question now at issue, and, so far, I see no reason whatever to alter my computation, carried out, as it is, on the same lines as that of the Treasury; but I quite agree that no further debits or credits beyond the year 1890 should be taken to alter the Deficiency Statement, as amended by my memorandum enclosed in letter of 26th May last.

I fail to see that the 18th section of the Audit Act can have anything to do with the matter, these items being for special votes for Public Works and not for fixed establishments.—J.P. The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

I have no alternative but to disallow all excesses over individual items, except under the authority of the Governor and Executive Council distinctly applying a saving on some other item under the same heading to meet the excess of expenditure.—E.A.R., B.C., 22/9/90. The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Subject:—The following clause in the Appropriation Act of 1890:—"Public works and services (irrespective of date of claims, and subject to such alterations within the limit of the total vote for each branch, as the exigencies of any case may demand from time to time, the excess on any item being available for a deficiency on any other)."

THE above clause (which appears for the first time in an Appropriation Act) provides that any excess on one head of service under the Works Department can be covered by any balance available on any other head, providing they are under the same branch. The Auditor General insists that each case must be approved by the Governor and Executive Council, as provided for under the 18th section of the Audit Act. (See query attached.)

The word "Item," as used by the Auditor-General in his queries is not correct, that term signifying a separate amount voted, and is given a number, whilst, as he applies it in these cases, it is only a subheading under the item, and embraced in a schedule not referred to in the Appropriation Act, but only in the Estimates, and kept as a subsidiary account. The 18th section (copy herewith) referred to deals only with fixed establishments, special services, and works being excluded therefrom. To transfer from one head to cover excess on another, would lead to confusion and be utterly valueless. Say we transfer from B to cover excess on A, in due course we have charges on B and it becomes exhausted; we have then to transfer from C to cover excess on B, and so on, without any end being obtained.

So long as the whole sum voted under the "Item number" is not exceeded, the law, as laid down

by the Audit Act, is carried out.

I would suggest that this Minute be referred to the Under Secretary for Public Works, who may be able to say with what view the clause in the Appropriation Act herein quoted was inserted.

Audit Act of 1870 (section 18).

"If the exigencies of the Public Service render it necessary, the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall have power to authorise the application of any balances under the head of any services for fixed establishments, other than special votes for public works remaining unexpended, for the purpose of supplementing any votes for other services found insufficient to meet the requirements thereof. And a statement of all such applications of balances, as well as copies of all minutes of the Governor-in-Council relative thereto, shall be submitted by the Auditor-General to Parliament, within seven days if in Session, and, if not, within seven days after the commencement of the next ensuing session."

My dear Mr. Barling,

Department of Audit, Sydney, 7 October, 1890.

Your note of 3rd instant has only just reached me. When I stated to you that I thought an authority at the last of the year might be sufficient for you varying the sums on the Road Schedules, I did not think of the immediate difficulty I should have with the Treasury payments as they occur from day to day, and which I found myself obliged to disallow as you may see by the papers now returned. Having looked again very closely into the matter I see clearly that you are not entitled to overdraw any item under a total vote for any branch until you can show a saving on some other. Otherwise as you may easily see, a portion, if not the whole, of certain sums of money appropriated to specified roads and bridges must of necessity disappear altogether, and this will not likely be allowed to happen without inquiry in Parliament. Mr. Pearson's minute does not cover the case.

Minute Paper.

Department of Public Works, Roads and Bridges Branch, Sydney, 11 October, 1890. The only sub-head on our estimates we can rely upon having a saving at the end of the year is the amount for minor roads under Department as per Schedule D No. 2 (£370,000); on this we shall have a balance of at least £100,000, which will more than cover the excesses on other schedules.

It is suggested that Executive authority be obtained for charging such excesses against the balance above referred to.

Subject: - Road Votes, 1890.

Department of Public Works, Sydney, 15 December, 1890. For the reasons set forth in the accompanying papers, I have the honour to recommend, for the approval of His Excellency the Governor and the Executive Council, that the sum of £100,000, being the estimated saving on account of subvote of £370,000 for Minor Roads, Schedule D, on the estimates of this Department for 1890, be appropriated for the purpose of covering the cost of urgent road and bridge works which would be otherwise chargeable to the subvote for contingencies and unclassified roads.

This authority is asked in pursuance of the proviso which appears in the Appropriation Act for

this year, and is to the following effect:-

"Public Works and Services, irrespective of dates of claims, and subject to such alterations within the limit of the total vote for each branch as the exigencies of any case may demand from time to time, the excess on any item being available for a deficiency on any other."

The necessity for this transfer is due to the excessive expenditure caused by the severe rains and

consequent floods which visited the Colony during the year.

Memorandum on papers, query, 29th July, 1890, Voucher No. 2,377.

Department of Audit, Sydney, 14 October, 1890.

The construction of the line of railway from Culcairn to Corowa was negatived by the Legislative Council, and could not be carried out under 48 Victoria No. 26, nor until a specific Act authorising it was obtained, under the provisions of the Public Works Act of 1888. The Act 48 Victoria, No. 26, now gives no authority, therefore, as an appropriation, and as an authority to borrow it cannot be held to exceed the amount quoted in the new Act 54 Victoria, No. 3, £188,765, as the authorised cost of constructing a railway line from Culcairn to Corowa. The difference between the sum of £210,000, quoted in the Act 48 Victoria, No. 26, and that of the Appropriating Act, 54 Victoria, No. 3, or £21,235 will require to be written off, or possibly with other sums in a like position, may need to be dealt with by Act of Parliament. The payment is stated to have been part of the expense involved in letting the contract under the authority given by the Act 54 Victoria, No. 3, but the expense was incurred and the amount paid before the authority of Parliament was obtained. It cannot, therefore, be allowed to stand as a legitimate charge against the Act 48 Victoria, No. 26, nor can it be now transferred from its position of an unauthorised payment to the position of a charge against 54 Victoria, No. 3, except on the express sanction of the Treasurer and the Secretary for Public Works.

The papers are again submitted for the required authority.

APPENDIX H.

Interpretation of clause 3 of the Loan Act of 1890, 54 Vic. No. 33.

Sir,

I have the honor to point out, for the information and consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, that according to the wording of clause 3 of the Loan Act 54 Vic. No. 33, the balance of the old Loans Account is to be transferred to the credit of a fund hitherto unknown in the public accounts, but assumed

to exist as "the General Loan Fund."

The effect of that operation is to establish a new account, distinct from the "General Loan Account," to the credit of which all moneys raised by the authority of Loan Acts subsequently to 42 Victoria No. 16 have hitherto been directed to be placed, and clause 2 of the Act 54 Victoria No. 33 is in

If, as is possible, it was not intended to open a separate account, and the quotation of a new fund was an unintentional inaccuracy, a transfer to the General Loan Account would have the effect of simply creating an extra credit to that account of a sum that cannot, as the clause stands, be applied to, nor used for, any of the services specified in the first clause until properly appropriated as Parliament may direct. It will be observed that the Act 54 Victoria No. 33 authorises the raising of a loan, for such sums as may be required, to meet certain specified services, not exceeding the several sums set against each, up to the amount in all of £7,021,757, and makes no provision for that amount, in whole or in part, being reduced by the balance at the credit of the "old Loans Account." On the contrary, that balance is made to appear an additional appropriation for the services already limited to the total above quoted, and to the several sums making up said total, an arrangement which it must be presumed was not contemplated by the introduction of the clause 3 in question. In a former case, where a surplus of loan money was utilised for loan services, the amount to be raised by a certain Act was reduced by such surplus, while the sums voted and applied to services were retained at their full amount, including the amount of surplus. The Act referred to is 36 Vic. No. 2.

In another paper I have called attention to the inadequacy of the language of certain Loan Acts (and the Act now in question is open to the same objection) to express a direct appropriation or application of the moneys borrowed under their authority to the services specified. A comparison of the wording of the Acts prior to 35 Victoria No. 5, of those 35 Vic. No. 5 to 41 Vic. No. 7, of those 43 Vic. No. 11 to 45 Vic. No. 22, and lastly of 46 Vic. No. 23 and 48 Vic. No. 26, will show marked differences of expression and a growing looseness of language respecting the application of moneys raised by loan to the Public Service, until now it is left to be inferred instead of being directly stated, what is to be done with the money after it has been placed to the credit of the General Loan Account. In the meantime, the amount, now constituting a General Loan Fund under vouchers dated 12th instant, will have to remain untouched until an amending Act be passed in due course, conveying a properly-defined appropriation or application of the sum in question.

Memorandum.

The Treasury, New South Wales, 13 February, 1891.

The Auditor-General, in the accompanying letter, dated 30th January, 1891, with respect to clause 3, of the Loan Act, 54 Victoria No. 33, points out in the first place that the balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account has been authorised to be transferred to the credit of a fund, which has hitherto been unknown in the Public Accounts.

In the second place the Auditor-General states that this balance, if credited to the General Loan Account, cannot be used until properly appropriated by Parliament, and in the third place he refers to the absence of a specific appropriation or application of the moneys authorised by the Loan Act, 54 Victoria No. 33, and previous Acts. Regarding the first matter I may state that the General Loan Fund, specified in clause 3 of the Act referred to, is identical with the General Loan Account, the General Loan Fund being the fund created by moneys raised under Loan Acts, and the General Loan Account being the formal method of keeping and exhibiting the condition of such fund. An analogy of expression may be found in the terms "Consolidated Revenue Fund," and "Consolidated Revenue Account," both of which are used by the Auditor-General in his report on the Public Accounts for the year 1889, pages 128 and 129, sections 3 and 6.

Moreover, the balance has been actually transferred to the credit of the General Loan Account. That the fund existed at the date of the transfer is evident from the fact that there was a large balance at the credit of the Account.

With respect to the second matter, it appears to me there is a clear appropriation of the sum authorised to be transferred, as the clause states, "the money shall be applied towards meeting the services authorised by this Act." (54 Victoria No. 33.)

The Auditor-General states, however, that there is authority in the Act for raising the whole sum required for the purposes specified therein without this balance. There is nothing in the Act, however, precluding a less sum being raised than that authorised, the amount to be raised therefore can be less the balance of the Old Loans Account transferred.

With reference to the changes which have occurred in the wording of the Loan Acts, I find that the Loan Acts, prior to the Act, 35 Victoria No. 5, expressed an appropriation or application of the moneys borrowed to the respective purposes for which the same were raised under the Acts. The Act, 35 Victoria No. 5, and all the Acts up to 41 Victoria No. 7, precluded the application of the money raised thereunder to any other service.

For instance, the moneys raised under the Act 35 Victoria No. 5 could not be used for Loan Services authorised under 36 Victoria No. 2, 36 Victoria No. 17, or any other Loan Act. In consequence of this strict law with respect to loan moneys it followed that there were at times large sums in the possession of the Government, on which interest was accruing which could not be used, and more moneys had to be raised for carrying out Loan Services under other Acts. This unsatisfactory state of affairs lasted from 1871 to 1879, when the Government, hampered by the restrictions in the Loans Acts, passed an Act amalgamating the Loan Funds raised under the Special Acts, 35 Victoria No. 5 to 41 Victoria No. 7, and providing for the establishing of a General Loan Account, so that moneys borrowed under any of the Acts stated, or under any future Loan Acts, could be used for Loan Services—the only restriction being, "that no portion of the money included in such General Loan Account shall be applied or used for any purpose other than services authorised to be provided for by Loans."

In the years 1879 and 1880, each of the Loan Acts contains a clause, as follows:-

"All sums borrowed or authorised to be applied under this Act, shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, and shall be by him placed to the credit of the General Loan Account."

In the Loan Acts of 1881 it was directed that the money borrowed should be placed to a separate

credit to be called, "the General Loan Account."

In the Public Works Loan Act of 1883 the words "or authorised to be applied" were omitted, because as I take it such appropriation was a restriction, inconsistent with the terms of the Loans Fund Amalgamation Act of 1879, which authorised the application of money raised under any future Act to any Loan Service.

From the year 1883 to the present time no variation has occurred in the wording of the Loan

Acts, respecting the disposal of the moneys to be raised thereunder.

As the matters brought under notice by the Auditor-General seem to me to involve questions of the true construction of Acts of Parliament, I would suggest the papers be referred for the opinion of the Honorable the Attorney-General on the points raised.

Copy of Opinion of the Attorney-General.

I HAVE, as carefully as possible, considered the letter of the Auditor-General, of 30th January, 1891, and the memo. of Mr. Kirkpatrick, of the 13th February, 1891, and I am unable to ascertain at all definitely from these papers the points upon which my opinion is desired. A properly-drawn précis should always be submitted, and it should set forth as specifically as possible the questions upon which my advice is sought. It is very inconsistent, and gives me a great deal of unnecessary trouble, when, as in the present instance, papers are merely sent without such a précis as I have indicated. As far as I am able to understand the matter and the Act I have come to the conclusion that the expressions respectively used in sections 2 and 3 of 54 Vic. No. 33, "the General Loan Account" and "the General Loan Fund" mean substantially the same thing, and that the unexpended balance of all money raised by way of loan under all Acts authorising the raising of loans prior to the Act 35 Vic. No. 5, and standing in the books of the Treasury at the credit of an account known as the "Old Loans Account" are transferred to the credit of the General Loan Account, and may be used without any further appropriation by Parliament, for the carrying out of the respective works, and for the several purposes specified in the Act 54 Vic. No. 33, and that any further sums which may be required for such work and purposes can be raised under the provisions of that Act, and if the money authorised to be raised under 54 Vic. No. 33 is not sufficient the amount transferred from the Old Loans Account may be used in addition. G. B. SIMPSON, A.G., 7/3/91.

It is, no doubt, very desirable that great particularity of expression should be used in Loan Acts, and the observations of the Auditor-General appear to me to be entitled to serious consideration .-G.B.S., 7/3/91.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 23rd ultimo, covering copy of opinion by the Attorney-General upon the matters submitted for the consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, in my letter of 30th January last, and to state now, for the information of the Treasurer, that as I read it the Attorney-General's advising goes no further than this: that if the proceeds of a Loan negotiated under the authority of the Act 54 Vic. No. 33, should fall short of the £7,021,757, named as the limit of the amount to be raised, the money on hand at credit of the Old Loans Account may be used to meet the deficiency. The Attorney General does not say that in so using the money in question the specific sums set opposite the respective services for which a loan is to be raised, are to be increased; and that is the point I contend for as an inadmissible course without the assent of Parliament.

By a very great strain of interpretation it might possibly be argued that the amount of the Old Loans balance may be distributed as a pro rata addition to each service specified in the Act 54 Vic. No. 33, but it is hardly possible that such a view could be seriously entertained. The use of the money as a part of the total loan proposed by the Act quoted does not, of course, require any further authority

from Parliament than that already implied by clause 3.

Referring to my minute of 26th March last on Treasury paper marked 90/142, Railways, I have the honor to request that you will invite the attention of the Colonial Treasurer to the still open question respecting the signatures to vouchers in connection with the expenditure for the Railway Service under the Railway Act, 51 Victoria No. 35.

The question of signatures to the attested accounts and receipt vouchers having been disposed of by the minute of the Governor and the Executive Council, No. 90/30, confirmed on the 22nd July last, those accounts will now be accepted by me on the joint signatures of Messrs. Wickham and Bryant, although I am still of opinion that the arrangement is inadequate to meet the requirements of the Railways and Audit Acts.

With respect to the expenditure, however, there is no authority given for the obligatory receipts to account for advances placed to the credit of the Railway Commissioners being signed by Mr. Wickham, pro Commissioner. I must repeat that such signature is not a satisfactory one, and would suggest that as the expenditure is by Statute placed under the control and management of the Commissioners, there is not the same necessity, as in the case of ordinary heads of Departments, for taking their personal obligatory receipts to account, and that the banker's acknowledgment of the receipt of the moneys placed to the Commissioners' credit be held, and I am prepared to accept it, as a sufficient acquittance for the Treasury, provided that the Treasury inform the Commissioners, once for all, that they must furnish acquitted accounts to the Treasury or to this office for their disbursements of such moneys within a limited period after the advances have been placed to their credit. I shall feel obliged by an early answer, as it is desirable to have this matter settled before the close of the year.



OLD LOANS ACCOUNT.

(MINUTES RESPECTING DISPOSAL OF BALANCE AT CREDIT OF.)

Ordered by the Legislative Assembly to be printed, 24 July, 1890.

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

I have the honor to request that you will have the goodness at your earliest convenience to submit, for the consideration of the Treasurer, the following observations and suggestion in regard to the Old Loans Account, on which at this date there is a balance unexpended of £132,326 0s. 4d.

That balance ought to stand as a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, in accordance with the

several Appropriation Acts out of which it arises.

The statement of those Old Loans Services, prior to the Act 35 Victoria No. 5, which introduced a new system of account for receipts and expenditure under Loan Appropriations, was made a separate one purely for convenience in keeping the accounts, yet, while the sum of the Old Loans has existed and has appeared as if a separate fund, the amount at its credit at any time has always been and is now legally a part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

The amount now at credit of the account is the remnant of the proceeds of debentures to the amount of £450,000, issued in 1870 to balance up all previous loans to that date, without regard to whether the amount was actually wanted or not, a by no means provident arrangement, for it covered (besides a multitude of small balances which at the time could not have been wanted) three whole appropriations for a sum in all of £55,000, viz.:—£20,000 for a Wesleyan College; £10,000 for District Courts, Sydney; £25,000 for a Penitentiary.

The first of these services was provided for thirty-four years ago by the Affiliated Colleges Act as a contingent liability of the Revenue, but has never been applied for, and the second and third have never

been carried out although voted, the one twenty-seven and the other twenty-four years ago.

A glance at the latest Ways and Means Estimates shows that there are none of the balances retained for expenditure, and forming the balance of £132,326 0s. 4d., that can now be required nor if required, but what could probably be met without much difficulty. At all events the original appropriations are now of so old a date (the latest now nearly twenty years old), that it becomes a question whether they ought now to be any longer considered to be operative without a new appropriation, either from Revenue or Loans.

I would suggest therefore, and strongly urge that the whole of this Old Loan Account be at once written off, and carried back to its proper position to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus so far reduce the nominal overdraft on that Account.

The Auditor-General's suggestion respecting the Balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account.

[Memorandum.] The Treasury, New South Wales, 15 August, 1889. I would be very glad to recommend the adoption of the course suggested and strongly urged by the Auditor-General in his letter of 31st July, namely, to write off the appropriations and balances of Appropriations for Loan Services provided for by Acts, prior to the Act, 35 Victoria No. 5, and transfer the sum of £132,326 Os. 4d. at the credit of the Old Loans Account to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, were it not that I consider such a proceeding would be a most improper one, and fraught with unpleasant and probably dangerous consequences.

In order to maintain the high position to which our securities have attained in the money market of the world it is necessary, I consider, that moneys raised by Loans should be expended on reproductive,

or on public works of a permanent character.

To make use of £132,000, borrowed for certain public works, for the purpose of reducing to that extent the overdraft on the Consolidated Revenue Fund, because the works for which the moneys had been raised had not been, and probably would not be, carried out, would, when known, have a prejudicial effect on the securities of this Colony.

In addition to this, however, the course suggested seems to me to be illegal. The Acts under which the loans referred to were raised, contain each a clause to this effect:—"All sums borrowed under this Act shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer, and shall be by him placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and shall be applied towards the respective purposes for which the same shall have been so raised, and shall be accounted for in the same manner as if they had formed part of the current

annual revenue of the Colony."

The moneys raised under the various Loan Acts referred to were not placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, but to the credit of an account called the Loans Account as a matter of convenience, and also because it was considered, and rightly too, I think, that by placing the money to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund it was probable some amount might not be applied towards the purpose for which it was raised. If, however, the Auditor-General's suggestion were adopted the moneys would not be applied as directed by the Acts; but in another way and for another purpose never contemplated when the Acts were passed.

The proper procedure under the circumstances would seem to be to apply the sums, not required for the purposes for which raised, for such other services as have been or may hereafter be provided for

by loans.

I regret that for the reasons stated I cannot recommend the adoption of the Auditor-General's suggestion.

Referring to your letter of 31 July, 1889, in which you "suggest, and strongly urge" that the balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account—amounting to the sum of £132,326 Os. 4d.—should be transferred to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, I am directed to hand you, enclosed, a copy of Mr. Chief Inspector Kirkpatrick's minute on the subject, together with a copy of the decision of the Colonial Treasurer, which, you will observe, is adverse to your proposal.

The Auditor-General to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

Sir,

I have to acknowledge receipt of a letter, dated the 7th instant, signed for you by Mr. Kirkpatrick, and enclosing a copy of a minute prepared by him, under date 15th August, 1889, respecting a matter which I considered it my duty to submit for the consideration of the Colonial Treasurer, by my present month.

I take leave to say, in the first place, that I consider I have reason to complain that such a minute as that penned by Mr. Kirkpatrick should have been sent to me at all, and sent it would appear by the direction of the Treasurer, containing, as it does, expressions of opinion that I had proposed a "most improper proceeding, fraught with unpleasant and dangerous consequences, illegal, &c.,"—language for which, as applied to the substance of my letter of 31st July, there are certainly no just grounds. The minute assumes that I proposed to expend the money in question for Revenue purposes. There is nothing in my letter to justify such an interpretation, nor any other than what I stated in my Report to Parliament on the accounts of 1883, and also in reply to a letter from the late Chief Inspector of Accounts, Mr. Thomson, dated in 1883, asking my views on this very subject. Holding, as I do, that the money always formed part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and that there were now really no liabilities attached to any necessity to keep it standing as a separate portion of the Consolidated Revenue Fund Account, it should, like any other balance of appropriation, be written off, and "so accounted for in the same manner" as any other "part of the current annual revenue of the Colony"—strictly in terms of the Acts under which the money was directed to be "placed to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund."

The suggestion that my proposal to state the accounts in accordance with the law would, "if known," seriously affect quotations of the Colony's securities on the London market, is surely far-fetched and imaginary. But if anything respecting the disposal of the comparatively paltry sum in question could have such an effect, it would, in my opinion, be the publication of a minute, which avowedly declares that the money borrowed under those old Loan Acts had not been dealt with according to law, for reasons which never existed when the loan expenditure was first made a separate statement, as a part of the Consolidated-

Revenue Fund Accounts, in the year 1856, and which seeks to justify the proceeding, while it proposes to dispose of the residue in a manner which the Acts containing the clause quoted, commencing "all sums borrowed, &c.," give no countenance to. I take it that the holders of, and investors in, our Colonial bonds chiefly concern themselves to be satisfied that their interest is punctually paid, and the principal met at maturity. Of this the lenders have had abundant experience during the last thirty years, and the fact is doubtless one main reason why our securities hold so high a place. If the holders of the remaining bonds in the old form of debentures were to hear that, instead of expending the few thousands that have accrued as savings on their loans in a sort of spendthrift fashion—perpetuating the debt, in fact—they were retained to redeem some of their bonds, their sense of the value of their securities would certainly be all the greater.

I had written thus far when I perceived, by the Votes and Proceedings, that the papers under reply had been laid upon the Table of the Legislative Assembly. I have, therefore, the honor to request that you will move the Colonial Treasurer to now have the goodness to supplement them by likewise

placing before the Assembly this communication.

Memorandum from The Consulting Accountant to The Under Secretary for Finance and Trade.

The Treasury, New South Wales, 4 August, 1890. I THINK it will be found, upon perusal of this letter (24th July, 1890), that the Auditor-General is in error when he states that there is nothing in his communication of 31st July, 1889, to justify the interpretation that he proposed to expend the balance at the credit of the Old Loans Account for Revenue Services.

In the concluding portion of that communication the Auditor-General "suggests, and strongly urges, that the whole of this Old Loans Account be at once written off, and carried back to its proper position, to the credit of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, and thus so far reduce the nominal* overdraft on that account."

The effect of this operation, if carried out, would be to pay Revenue obligations to the extent of £132,326 0s. 4d. out of Loan moneys, and this is the course which I still venture to think would be a most improper one, and fraught with unpleasant and probably dangerous consequences, and which I also venture to think would be an illegal course.

But as the Auditor-General now disavows the suggestion of any such course of action, the objections taken in my minute of 15th August, 1889, no longer apply; and, with a view to a settlement of the question, the Treasurer will probably consider the propriety of making provision in the next Loan Bill for the application of this unused balance towards meeting new Loan Services.
